

“For just as through the disobedience of the one man the many were made sinners, so, through the obedience of the one, the many will be made righteous.” With these words, St. Paul reminds us of the salvation won for us by Jesus Christ. Do we want the salvation that is ours?

Our desire during this Lenten season should be to maintain one central point of focus - the remarkable truth of the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Too often in Lent we focus on the first two and neglect the third! The suffering and death of Jesus only makes sense in light of the resurrection so even in Lent we have to focus on the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus. We have to remind ourselves daily that Jesus freely embraced his suffering and death so that through the triumph of his resurrection all those who believe in him could live in the hope of everlasting life. We are sinners. We are not obedient to what God expects of us as sons and daughters of God. But through the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus, we have been reconciled to God and now have the hope of everlasting life.

Lent gives us the opportunity to look at those areas in our lives where we have not been obedient to what God expects of us. With God’s grace, we can diminish those areas in our life and grow in our obedience to what God expects of us. In this way, we show our gratitude to God for what Jesus Christ has done for us and we demonstrate our desire to know the salvation that Jesus won for us. What are the 2 or 3 areas in your life where you find it most difficult to be obedient to God’s desire for you? Is it a habit of dishonesty, a habit of foul words, a habit of inattentiveness to your spouse or to your children, a habit of gossip, a habit of inappropriate sexual activity? Where in your life do you struggle to be obedient to God? Focus on those specific areas in your life this Lent with the desire to express your gratitude for the hope that Christ has won for you and to express your desire to realize that hope in death. Remember each day the hope that is ours and live with the desire to realize that hope!
