"The Lord is Kind and Merciful" (Psalm 103)

The psalms were created to be sung by the chosen people. Many of them sing sorrows and others manifest the victory that the Lord gives to all who trust in Him. In this Psalm 130 we can see that the very nature of God is described as being "kind and merciful." As a new "people of God "we can find in our lives the kindness and mercy that comes from that which is their source, God our Lord.

The first reading tells us about the history of the beginnings of the reign in Israel. God granted the desire to his people and gave them a king; however, Saul was unfaithful to the Lord's command and God chose the young David for his replacement. Of course, as in all the changes of destiny, envies were provoked and thracians were felt. The interesting thing is that David does not let himself be carried away by negative feelings but is able to forgive Saul. In some way the behavior of King David is a preannouncement of the values of the Kingdom of God established by Jesus who asks his disciples to love enemies and be compassionate even with those who persecute us. The Lord is always "kind and merciful."

In this age that social media imposes challenges on us, perhaps the only and best of these is to live the "golden rule" that Jesus gives in his disciples in today's Gospel. That is, to do good to others even to our enemies and lending without expecting anything in return. In our society that seems to live for personal fulfillment away from the pain and anguish of the poorest, Jesus presents us with the model of universal solidarity that includes those who do not accept us and even offend us. Prayer can be the beginning of a new society where no one feels excluded.

Jesus, the mercy of God himself, teaches us to love and to be kind. We cannot continue to propagate hatred and vengeance if we say that we are members of the body of Christ, who with his death and resurrection sealed the covenant of love. The call to forgive enemies is not a commandment but that which makes possible our similarity with God the rich Father in "mercy and kindness"

Remember the Catholic Bishops' "Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy" which calls for "full, active, conscious participation" of the whole assembly. We should not be a passive audience. ASH WEDNESDAY SCHEDULE – Wednesday, March 6th is Ash Wednesday which marks the beginning of Lent. Ashes will be distributed at the 8am & 12:05pm Masses. There are also two Spanish masses that evening at 6pm & 8pm. It is an important day in the Christian calendar as it marks the first day of fasting, repentance, prayer and self-control that will be required during Lent. All are invited to accept the ashes as a visible symbol of penance.

SIX WEEK LENTEN SERIES – Fr. Roselli is offering a 6 week Lenten series starting on **Thursdays** starting **March 7th** at 10:30am in the Fr. Miguel Meeting Room. It an opportunity for you to grow closer to God by deepening your experience of prayer and faith during this Holy Lenten Season. Registration is requested in order to prepare the proper amounts of reading materials. Participants need not worry if they cannot make every meeting, you may come to as many days as your time allows.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS - Beginning Friday, March 8th, we will have Stations of the Cross on Fridays during Lent immediately following the 12:05pm mass. The Stations of the Cross is a Lenten devotion that offers witness to Jesus' Passion and Death. At each station we use our senses and our imagination to reflect prayerfully upon Jesus' suffering, Death, and Resurrection, and to simply experience the visual images to reflect on Christ's love for us.
