



### FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

#### "The way of Faith is open to All" (Romans 10: 8-13)

Once again we begin this Lenten season united with Jesus, the immolated victim for our salvation. This time is "the way of faith that is open to all" as the Letter to the Romans says. Indeed, on the last Sunday of Lent we will hear the same Jesus who, in facing death, reaffirms his faith in God. Today at the beginning of these Lenten days, Jesus places his trust in God the Father to resist the present and future temptation. Moses for his part expresses the faith that believers have placed in God while St. Paul preaches that whoever has faith will be saved.

The liturgy is rich in multiple rituals. The ritual establishes the importance of an action through repetition. Our Eucharist is an obvious example of this affirmation. Therefore, when examining the ceremony described in the first reading, we find similarities with our worship with the priest presiding from the altar while the people present their offerings and bow before the presence of the Lord and his salvific actions. The Lenten season is full of rituals such as the reception of the ashes on our foreheads, the washing of the feet and the prayer of the way of the cross. Through repetition these actions become an integral part of who we are and in concrete expressions of our faith.

Meditating on temptations rather than provoking a great fantasy could be a time to demonstrate that God and not the demon has control over the life of Jesus. The power of the evil wants to mandate, according to his crooked ways of thinking, a Jesus who lives His faith and does not accept but the will of His Father God. The tempter even uses the Scripture, but Jesus does not fall into his nets because it is more important for Him to manifest the preeminence of God. Jesus not only contradicts the arguments of the devil but affirms that God is the precedent of all including the demon. In simpler words, the God who comforts Jesus is the God of Life and not death and lies.

Today, but especially in the past, the desert was conceived as a lonely and dangerous place. The Israelites suffered hunger and thirst when they left Egypt and wandered through the desert. The fear of wild animals like the bandits who operated from the desert made it even more fearsome. That is why the rejected of society were condemned to a life of desert. With all of the above, it is easy to understand why the contemporaries of Jesus believed that the devil inhabited the desert.

When exposed to that place, Jesus is exposed to all its dangers, but after 40 days, He resists the temptations because he knows that His Father God is Lord of the Universe, even of the desert.

When we walk with Jesus in this Lent, we can live more intensely our faith in a God who is close and sustains us so as not to ourselves fall.
