



Let us learn about Jesus and his disciples, for whom he gave them the call of Jesus that led them to leave everything behind. The disciples, once they decided to follow Jesus (no one is required to follow them) left their families, jobs and villages. They did not look back and their dedication was total. Today we are the disciples called to build the Church that is a common home for all and where no one feels rejected. That through prayer, liturgy and an apostolic life we also walk with Jesus on his way to Jerusalem.



FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"Jesus wants us to leave everything and follow Him" (Luke 9: 51-62)

We return to the ordinary time and with it to the readings of "Cycle C" taken from the Gospel of Luke. The liturgical year invites us to follow Jesus on his way to Jerusalem. In today's passage Jesus clearly tells a potential disciple to "follow me." Elijah's similar calling to Elisha in the Old Testament. The divine call or "vocation" requires a total response of the whole person and all our will. However, some are willing to accept this invitation with all their heart while others for various reasons reject it. We, like the men and women of the past, are called to live according to the Gospel mandates. The call of Jesus challenges us. What is your answer?

The road or climb to Jerusalem will teach us the many ways to follow Jesus. From the Synoptic Gospels it is clear that Jesus is determined to "go up" to Jerusalem to face his future, that is, to fulfill the will of God. Saint Ignatius of Loyola asks those who want to follow Jesus to "discern" the ways of the Lord "or also to" seek and find the will of God." These two requests of Saint Ignatius should be in our minds and hearts every day to determine "the actions that most lead us to fulfill the ideals of the Kingdom." Ordinary time is a time in which all believers are called to live in the constant search for the will of God in our lives. One way to do this is to exercise ourselves in the practice of the Ignatian Review that motivates us to adjust our lives with the demands of Christ to his disciples who want to follow him.

For some of the disciples it is almost impossible to leave everything to follow the ideals of the Kingdom. For others as is the case of Elijah once they know what is asked of them, they are able to leave everything to reach the EVERYTHING. The first reading has a dramatic effect because it is not just leaving the past behind but breaking and even burning the past to start a completely new life facing God. Fortunately, we are not asked for dramatic changes in our lives, but it is possible that God expects a radical change in our lives. For Jesus, the important thing is to bear witness with our simplicity of life. Somehow we are tired of being preached to and not practicing. That is why one of the ideals of Pope Francis is that we should be "a Church of the poor for the poor."

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION - Processions are life's journey distilled. We move with companions, aware that Christ accompanies us, as we move to the altar for Communion or to the font for baptism, or carry a loved one to a place of rest. In Europe, the season of pilgrimage is beginning now, and tens of thousands of people are moving by foot on well-worn paths. Some take as long as six weeks to walk the last few hundred miles of the medieval pilgrimage route to the Shrine of St. James the Apostle in Compostella, in northern Spain. Those who make the journey by foot, hiking, or by bicycle, have a kind of passport stamped at villages and monasteries on the road. When they present this document at the cathedral, they are given the emblem of a pilgrim, the scallop shell of St. James. High over their heads at Mass, a huge botafumero twirls clouds of sweet incense through the cathedral. Cynics say it is to mask the odor of smelly feet. The pilgrims know better. Seeing through the clouds the happy faces of those they met along the road, they recognize a foretaste of the welcome into heaven, and the joy of meeting loved ones in the Kingdom of God. --James Field, Copyright (c) J.
