"A man sowed good seed in his field" (Matthew 13: 24-43)

Throughout my priestly life I have learned to tell and listen to many stories. For sure, and thanks to the mandatory confinement, we had the opportunity to listen once again to our parents and grandparents those stories that make our family the first place where God manifests himself. Pope Francis asks us every time to

listen to our grandparents as he used to do to his grandma Rosa. He also asked in the past to taxi drivers to make an effort to his clients' stories and even called them to exercise the "ear apostolate." Today the crowds of the Gospel are attentive to the words that came out of the mouth of Jesus. These words or parables were the way Jesus used to explain about the nature of the Kingdom of Heaven.

I particularly like to see the positive side of the parables since Jesus insists in this parable that " someone sowed good seed." I agree with Pope Francis when reading this parable speaks of "God's patience." There is no doubt that along with the good seed planted there is bad seed that also grows. In other words, Jesus is addressing the problem of evil. We would be blind if we say that there is no evil in the world, but our faith encourages us to see and hear the good things that so many people do to us. Just as the signs of pain were multiplied by the pandemic, it is no less true that the signs of love, gratitude and solidarity also multiplied. My fellow Jesuits in Brooklyn gave money to the poor on our island while some Jesuits in Manhattan came out each night to clap the doctors and nurses who cared

for the coronavirus patients. Several female parishioners came with money to help other vulnerable members of our community. At the same time when needed parishioners received some help or relief, they cried with joy. Gratitude in the time of pain and suffering ... The patience of God and his mercy are related in today's readings for us to listen. The book of wisdom teaches us that God's mercy gives us "a good field for hope to flourish." The Holy Spirit helps us in our human imperfection, says Saint Paul. In the parable of the grain and weed, Jesus teaches us that God is patient and makes the sun rise over the just and the unjust. So let us ask for the grace to be good and to stay away from those things that do not make us love

<u>BACK TO MASS!</u> Our parish re-opened following the guidelines of the Archdiocese and the requirements of the State of New York, with 25% capacity. There is **no change** in our Mass schedule (Sunday/Weekday). Our Church is open for Baptism, Confessions, Weddings, and Funerals and we are able to use the church from 9:00AM to 4:00PM for private prayer. We are all required to follow the guidelines:

- 1. Wear a mask at all times in the Church, including the confessional.
- **2.** Observe the 6 feet distance. (SOCIAL DISTANCING)
- **3**. Sit in designated areas and follow the signs posted around the the church.
- **4.** Receive Holy Communion only in the hand. (Ministers & priests sanitize their hands before distributing Holy Communion) We continue praying for all who are affected by CoVid-19, their families and all who provide the very best care. May the good Lord help us find prevention and cure for the coronavirus.

Please make sure to follow all the precautions that we outlined and thank you for continuing to support the parish and for the cooperation as we are planning for a safe return.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (RE)REGISGTRATION FOR NEW/RETURNING STUDENTS 2020-21: In order to create smaller than usual classes for the 20-21 Religious Education school year, we are asking parents to (re)register your children as soon as possible. All classes will continue to be offered on the same days and we are preparing for blended learning with a staggered schedule in order to be in compliance with social distancing. Once your child is registered, the schedules will be communicated to the parents. In order for your children to receive First Holy Communion or Confirmation, they must attend two years of consecutive preparation in any religious education program. You can register your child/children by filling out the enrollment form on our website (olmcsi.org), uploading any required documentation and paying the required fees. Your may call or email us with any additional questions. Enrolling your children in our program every year helps secure them a solid, joyful foundation in the faith and helps qualify them to receive their sacraments on time with their peers.
