



## **EUCHARISTIC PRAYER: ROMAN CANON: MYSTERIUM FIDEI**

#### **MYSTERIUM FIDEI**

- 1. Mortem tuam annuntiamus, Domine, et tuam resurrectionem confitemur, donec venias.
- 2. Quotiescumque manducamus panem hunc et calicem bibimus, mortem tuam annuntiamus, Domine, donec venias.
- 3. Salvator mundi salva nos, qui per tuam Crudem et Resurrectionem liberasti nos.

#### THE MYSTERY OF FAITH

- 1. We proclaim your Death, O Lord, and profess your Resurrection until you come again.
- 2. When we eat this Bread and drink this Cup, we proclaim your Death, O Lord, until you come again.
- 3. Save us, Savior of the world, for by your Cross and Resurrection you have set us free.

#### THE MYSTERY OF FAITH

- 1. We announce your Death, Lord, and confess your Resurrection until you come again.
- 2. As often as we eat this Bread and drink this Chalice, we announce your Death, Lord, until you come again.
- 3. Savior of the world, save us, for you by your Cross and Resurrection have liberated us.

"The Mystery of Faith" is a pregnant phrase. Until Advent 1969, the words were part of the consecration of the Chalice, thus: "THIS IS THE CHALICE OF MY BLOOD OF THE NEW AND ETERNAL COVENANT, THE MYSTERY OF FAITH, WHICH WILL BE SHED FOR YOU AND FOR MANY FOR THE FORGIVENESS OF SINS." In the Post-Vatican II Missal, it is separated to break the silence after the elevation of the Chalice. In Greek, *mysterion* (μυστήριον) can mean a secret, incompletely known thing, or deeper hidden significance, especially something that can become known by believers. During the first century A.D. there were a proliferation of so-called mystery cults wherein potential members had to be vetted until they could be initiated by certain secret rites and become devotees of a pagan deity. Part of the process involved learning specific divine stories and teachings through secret rituals. In the New Testament, "mystery" almost always has a positive significance, except in some verses of Revelation and St. Paul's Second Letter to the Thessalonians where, for example, St. Paul speaks of the "Mystery of Iniquity." Jesus spoke of the "mysteries of the Kingdom of God" as truths which He shared with disciples but not with the crowds. (Mt 13:11; Mk 4:11; Lk 8:10) St. Paul used mystery in the singular or plural numerous times. Often, he used the mystery in the context of divine teachings by God or about God. Notably, in 1 Corinthians 4:1, he used the mysteries to refer to the sacraments. Thus, he says, "Let a man so account of us, as Christ's Ministers and Stewards of God's Mysteries." It is a duty of the apostolic office to celebrate the "mysteries" or sacraments. Ever since, Greek speaking Christians have continued to use the word "mysteries" for the sacraments. St. Paul reinforced this meaning in Ephesians 5:32 when he said: "This is a great Mystery: but I speak concerning Christ and the Church." Here the Mystery being explained is the Sacrament of Holy Matrimony which is an outward sign of Christ's and His Church's mutual love unto death. In his Letter to the Colossians, St. Paul says that Christ our God is "the Mystery." (1:27; 2:2; 4:3) St. Paul, in 1 Timothy 3:9, also used the phrase, "Mystery of Faith" with reference to deacons "holding the Mystery of the Faith in a pure conscience." Seven verses later he spoke of the "Mystery of our religion" as being a confession of Faith in Christ's Incarnation, Resurrection, and Ascension. Thus, the word mystery is multivalent, but is appropriately spoken within the context of the consecration of both the Bread and Wine since Christ our God is truly present in the Sweet Sacrament which we acknowledge by Faith, adore with our bodies, and love with our souls. The phrase Mysterium Fidei had been present in the Roman, Ambrosian, and the defunct Gallican Rites by the 6th century.

In the Roman Missal of Paul VI, the words "The Mystery of Faith" no longer come immediately after the word Covenant. Instead, they were used in a novel way for the Roman Rite as a proclamation of the presence of the paschal mystery and an invitation to a response by the congregation. The Congregation for Divine Worship had indicated in the official publication of the Holy See called the *Notitiae* that *Mysterium fidei* is an invitation to the people and that it could be omitted if the people are not present at Mass. The phrase "the Mystery of Faith" introduces three possible formulas for the congregation, patterned on the Eastern Rites which usually have ritual words inserted by the congregation after the consecration of each species. The first, possible response is, "We proclaim your Death, O Lord, and profess your Resurrection until you come again." anticipates the next part of the Roman Canon, the *Unde et memores*. The significant difference is that this acclamation introduces into the Roman Canon a prayer addressed to God the Son rather than to God the Father. Thus, the Memorial acclamation becomes an act of Faith in Christ really and truly present upon the altar, although hidden from all our senses except hearing. When this option is used, it adds an eschatological element to the Roman Canon by referring to Christ's Second Coming in glory. The formula, itself seems to have been adopted from the Syriac Rite where after the consecration of the wine, the priest says: "Do in remembrance of Me when you partake of this sacrament, commemorating My death and My resurrection until I come," while the congregation responds: "Your death, our Lord, we commemorate, Your resurrection we confess and Your second coming we wait for. May Your mercy be upon us all." It may also be patterned on the prayer said by an Ambrosian Rite priest after the consecration of the Chalice.

The second option, "When we eat this Bread and drink this Cup, we proclaim your Death, O Lord, until you come again," uses a biblical phrase while adding the eschatological element. The verse comes from verse 25 of 1 Corinthians 11:23-27 wherein St. Paul explains that he celebrates the Holy Eucharist since Jesus handed it over to him and the Apostles. The acclamation following St. Paul refers not to "Bread" and "a Cup" but to "this Bread" and "this Cup." Bread refers to the Body of Christ, since Christ calls Himself the Bread of Life. (John 6) Cup refers to the Cup of Christ's Blood (although for some odd reason the current English translation of the Roman Rite uses "cup" rather than the word "chalice" as in the consecration form). Therefore, this memorial acclamation is deeply biblical, and also found in the Byzantine and Coptic traditions. It is in the Spanish Mozarabic Liturgy, however, spoken by the priest. In the Byzantine Liturgy of St. James, the priest celebrant says: "This do in remembrance of me; for as often as you eat this Bread, and drink this Cup, you show forth the Lord's death, and confess His Resurrection, till He comes." In the Coptic Liturgy of St. Basil, after the consecration of the wine, the priest speaks in the name of Jesus, "For every time you eat of this Bread and drink of this Cup, you proclaim My Death, confess My Resurrection, and remember Me till I come." The congregation responds to Jesus, "Amen. Amen. Your Death, O Lord, we proclaim; Your holy Resurrection and Ascension into the heavens, we confess. We praise You, we bless You, we thank You O Lord, and we entreat You, O our God." Unfortunately, for those who are not well-catechized and not familiar with 1 Corinthians 11:23-27, this acclamation's mention of "Bread" can work to erode Faith in Christ's real presence. St. Paul's words, however, leave no doubt, especially in His warning in verse 27: "Therefore, whoever eats this Bread or drinks this Cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty of (sinning against) the Body and Blood of the Lord."

Finally, there is the third acclamation option: "Save us, Savior of the world, for by your Cross and Resurrection you have set us free." This sentence is deeply rooted in the Roman tradition. It is a modification of a previous prayer of the Roman Rite used on Good Friday: "Savior of the world, save us, who by Your Cross and Blood have redeemed us, help us, we pray to You, our God. (*Salvator mundi, salva nos, qui per crucem et sanguinem redemisti nos, auxiliare nobis, te deprecamur, Deus noster.*)" The new formula replaces the word "Blood" for "Resurrection," replaces "redeemed" with "liberated," and eliminates the final petition for divine aid. There is no reference to the coming of Christ in glory.

The memorial acclamation seems to be a post Vatican II effort to facilitate a communal act of faith by the congregation after the consecration, following Eastern Rite models. It has potential. However, anyone who compares the present Roman Rite practice with the practice of one of the Eastern Rites will feel that the congregations' response flows more organically in the latter. In fact, the Roman Rite's threefold option often leaves the choice of the acclamation to the priest of music director meaning that congregation has to guess which is coming. Moreover, when it is sung, it is invariably accompanied by music which requires an awkward musical introduction. The singing of it, itself is problematic because the Eucharistic prayer as a whole is not sung.

It should be pointed out that while the traditional Roman Rite, did not have a memorial acclamation, it did develop something like it. In the traditional rite, the Roman Canon is prayed by the priest in a low voice since he is speaking to God. In the sung High Mass, the priest would recite the "Holy Holy…" (*Sanctus*) and continue into the Roman Canon as the choir sang the "Holy Holy…" But, they choir would go silent after the first "Hosana in the Highest." This highlighted the sacredness of the consecration, although the bell would alert everybody of the sacred moment. After the elevation of the Precious Blood, the choir would then resume with the "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord," announcing that Christ was indeed present.

The Mystery of Faith is Jesus Christ Himself; True God and True Man; Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity really and truly present in the Holy Eucharist as the sacrificial Victim once slain for our sins who is risen from the dead and at the right hand of God the Father as our High Priest; the Just and Merciful Judge who will come again in glory raise the bodies of those who die in His sanctifying grace to the never ending joy of eternal life.
