EUCHARISTIC PRAYER: ROMAN CANON: UNDE ET MEMORES

Unde et memores, Domine, nos servi tui, sed et plebs tua sancta, eiusdem Christi Filii tui, Domini nostri, tam beatae passionis, nec non ab inferis resurrectionis, sed et in caelos gloriosae ascensionis: offerimus praeclarae maiestati tuae de tuis donis ac datis hostiam puram, hostiam sanctam, hostiam immaculatam, Panem sanctum vitae aeternae et Calicem salutis perpetuae. Therefore, O Lord, as we celebrate the memorial of the blessed Passion, the Resurrection from the dead, and the glorious Ascension into heaven of Christ, your Son, our Lord, we, your servants and your holy people, offer to your glorious majesty from the gifts that you have given us, this pure victim, this holy victim, this spotless victim, the holy Bread of eternal life and the Chalice of everlasting salvation.

Wherefore, O Lord, we, your servants and your holy people of the same Christ, your Son, our Lord, also mindful of so great a blessed Passion, and a Resurrection from the dead, but also a glorious Ascension into heaven: offer to your well-known majesty from your own gifts given, this pure living victim, this holy living victim, this unblemished living victim, the holy Bread of eternal Life and the Chalice of perpetual Salvation.

The *Unde et memores* begins with the word *Unde* meaning "whence" or "from where." This connects this prayer with the Institution Narrative and its Consecration immediately preceding it. The third word *memores* which means "mindful of," or "bringing to mind," or "remembering," puts us in the biblical tradition of ancient Israel celebrating the Passover which was not merely a profession of faith or commemoration of the past, but in some way a making present of the past event. At this point of Holy Mass, the crucified and resurrected Lord Jesus Christ who sits at the right hand of the Father has become really and truly present. The *Unde et memores*, thus, names His Blessed Passion, Resurrection, and Glorious Ascension. Christ's sacrifice has already been accepted. At Holy Mass, Christ is not sacrificed again. (Heb. 10:12-14) Yet, these glorious theandric acts of Jesus in His Death, Resurrection, and Ascension are of infinite power and infinitely pleasing to the glorious majesty of the Father. We human beings, however, are finite, mutable, and time-bound. We need to apply the Paschal Mystery to our lives. We need the grace of Christ's sacrifice and glory in our own lives. Thus, at Holy Mass, we "plug ourselves in" to His eternal heavenly offering of Himself to God the Father on our behalf, so that the grace of the divine paschal events can now be applied to us present, and so that we can offer ourselves with His Sacrifice and make ourselves pleasing to God thereby, at each Holy Mass. The grace of the Passion of Christ is applied to us in so far as we have disposed ourselves by Faith, Hope, Charity, and contrition for our sins to receive grace upon grace.

Note that "we (nos)" is further defined as "your servants and your holy people" (servi et plebs tua sancta). On one hand, the phrase can signify the clergy (servi) and laity (plebs tua sancta) together. Clergy and laity are one but, because of his ordination, the priest acts in the person of Christ the head, for which reason the priest alone reads the prayer and not the people. On the other hand, servi can mean all Christians since we are all servants of God the Father and also of Jesus Christ, God's Son and our Lord who are striving only to do our duty. But, God has elevated us from mere servants to sons and daughters by baptismal grace. Thus, from another perspective, we are also God's holy people with a holiness given to us as a free gift from God. We are holy when we are in the state of sanctifying grace. Sanctifying means holy-making. It is the grace given to us at baptism with the infused theological virtues of Faith, Hope, and Charity. As long as we avoid mortal sin, we remain in His grace. If we have the misfortune to lose sanctifying grace by mortal sin, we can hope to regain it through repentance in a sincere sacramental confession. Significantly, it is the first bishop of Rome, St. Peter, who in 1 Peter 2:9, writes, "But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for His own possession (genus electum, regale sacerdotium, gens sancta, populus acquisitionis), so that you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light;...." By participating in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, we are proclaiming the excellencies of Christ saving Death, Resurrection, and Ascension for our sake and our unmerited special relationship to Him.

The prayer specifies that we offer "to the well-known majesty (praeclarae maiestati)" of the Father "from the gifts [that He has Himself] given [to us] (de tuis donis ac datis)." According to Enrico Mazza maiestas means glory but understood not as glorious praise given to God by His creatures, but the great glory God possesses from all eternity. The word praeclarae is the same word as that with reference to the Chalice at the consecration. De tuis donis ac datis is an ancient phrase echoed in the ta sa ek tōn sōn of the Byzantine Anaphora of Saint Basil. In this prayer, we offer (offerimus) only because Christ the High Priest first offered Himself and made us members of His Body, the Church, capable of offering through Him. We unite ourselves to Christ's own offering of Himself in the Paschal Mystery. There is nothing we can offer God that is worthy of God, except God Himself. The Son of God, who became one of us, alone is the suitable offering, infinitely perfect in every way. So, like children we can only give our Father what He first gave

As the fulfilment of all the Old Testament *hostias* (living victims), Christ is the *salutaris hostia*, the saving living victim, pure, holy, unblemished. *Hostia* is the word from which we get Host. However, we do not mean an inanimate piece of Bread. Moreover, while bread and blood were used in the Old Testament, the Son of God Incarnate is "the holy Bread of eternal life and the Chalice of everlasting salvation." (Ps 116:4; Jn 6:35) By the repetition of the word "this" before "*hostia* (living victim)," this prayer makes it clear that Jesus Christ is really and truly present Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity upon the altar and that one offering of Jesus is being made in an unbloody manner. In the previous rubrics no longer used, the priest would point to Christ present upon the altar, not with a finger, but in a typical Roman way, with the hand, but reverently making the Sign of the Cross five times while doing so, to indicate the Sacrifice of the Cross is present.

Finally, Christ is called the Bread of (eternal) Life recalling His own discourse in John 6. He is also the Chalice of everlasting salvation as this was predicted in Psalm 116:4 which reads "I will take up the chalice of salvation, and I will invoke the name of the Lord." The Holy Mass is the Sacrifice of Calvary. But, the fullest participation in the sacrifice is to eat the slain victim. The Lord said, "Whoever eats My Flesh and drinks My blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up at the last day." (John 6:54) Thus, the *Unde et memores* succinctly makes clear the Sacrifice that becomes present in our midst and that we offer it as members of Christ's holy people. Whether or not we subjectively benefit from this offering, it is objectively pleasing to God.

SAINT BRIDGET OF SWEDEN'S PRAYER TO CHRIST OUR SAVIOR

St. Birgitta Birgersdotter of Vadstena (c. 1304 – 23 July 1374), is a Swedish noble, saint, mystic, mother of eight, and after she and her husband both decided to enter into religious life, she founded the religious order called the Bridgettines. In Jubilee Year of 1350, despite the plague, she made a pilgrimage to Rome. There she worked for reform of the members of the Church and especially tried to urge the Pope, then in Avignon, to return to Rome. St. Bridget is one of the six patron saints of Europe, together with saints Benedict of Nursia, Cyril and Methodius, Catherine of Siena and Teresa Benedicta of the Cross.

Blessed are you, my Lord Jesus Christ. You foretold your death and at the Last Supper you marvelously consecrated bread which became your precious body. And then you gave it to your apostles out of love as a memorial of your most holy passion. By washing their feet with your holy hands, you gave them a supreme example of your deep humility.

Honor be to you, my Lord Jesus Christ. Fearing your passion and death, you poured forth blood from your innocent body like sweat, and still you accomplished our redemption as you desired and gave us the clearest proof of your love for all men.

Blessed may you be, my Lord Jesus Christ. After you had been led to Caiaphas, you, the judge of all men, humbly allowed yourself to be handed over to the judgment of Pilate.

Glory be to you, my Lord Jesus Christ, for the mockery you endured when you stood clothed in purple and wearing a crown of sharp thorns. With utmost endurance you allowed vicious men to spit upon your glorious face, blindfold you and beat your cheek and neck with cruelest blows.

Praise be to you, my Lord Jesus Christ. For with the greatest patience you allowed yourself like an innocent lamb to be bound to a pillar and mercilessly scourged, and then to be brought, covered with blood, before the judgment seat of Pilate to be gazed upon by all.

Honor be to you, my Lord Jesus Christ. For after your glorious body was covered with blood, you were condemned to death on the cross, you endured the pain of carrying the cross on your sacred shoulders, and you were led with curses to the place where you were to suffer. Then stripped of your garments, you allowed yourself to be nailed to the wood of the cross.

Everlasting honor be to you, Lord Jesus Christ. You allowed your most holy mother to suffer so much, even though she had never sinned nor ever even consented to the smallest sin. Humbly you looked down upon her with your gentle loving eyes, and to comfort her you entrusted her to the faithful care of your disciple.

Eternal blessing be yours, my Lord Jesus Christ, because in your last agony you held out to all sinners the hope of pardon, when in your mercy you promised the glory of paradise to the penitent thief.

Eternal praise be to you, my Lord Jesus Christ, for the time you endured on the cross the greatest torments and sufferings for us sinners. The sharp pain of your wounds fiercely penetrated even to your blessed soul and cruelly pierced your most sacred heart till finally you sent forth your spirit in peace, bowed your head, and humbly commended yourself into the hands of God your Father, and your whole body remained cold in death.

Blessed may you be, my Lord Jesus Christ. You redeemed our souls with your precious blood and most holy death, and in your mercy you led them from exile back to eternal life.

Blessed may you be, my Lord Jesus Christ. For our salvation you allowed your side and heart to be pierced with a lance; and from that side water and your precious blood flowed out abundantly for our redemption.

Glory be to you, my Lord Jesus Christ. You allowed your blessed body to be taken down from the cross by your friends and laid in the arms of your most sorrowing mother, and you let her wrap your body in a shroud and bury it in a tomb to be guarded by soldiers.

Unending honor be to you, my Lord Jesus Christ. On the third day you rose from the dead and appeared to those you had chosen. And after forty days you ascended into heaven before the eyes of many witnesses, and there in heaven you gathered together in glory those you love, whom you had freed from hell.

Rejoicing and eternal praise be to you, my Lord Jesus Christ, who sent the Holy Spirit into the hearts of your disciples and increased the boundless love of God in their spirits.

Blessed are you and praiseworthy and glorious forever, my Lord Jesus. You sit upon your throne in your kingdom of heaven, in the glory of your divinity, living in the most holy body you took from a virgin's flesh. So will you appear on that last day to judge the souls of all the living and the dead; you who live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit for ever and ever. Amen.





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
