

TRUE LOVE IS THROUGH CHRIST

It is not only true that all natural categories of love - such as parental love, filial love, marital love - can be infused with the spirit of [Charity] caritas, it is also true that they can fulfill their innermost genius only if they are transformed in Christ. Great though the difference between the categories and themes of natural loves and the love of God and one's fellow man, even when they have been transformed in Christ, natural loves can and should be transformed by Christ, and God can glorify and fill them with the splendor of caritas. However, when this happens, they do not lose the qualities of the category they belong to - do not cease to be marital love or filial love or love between friends. Instead, they achieve their innermost goal through their transformation; only then do they become true love.

Pope Pius XII pointed out in a marvelous way in an address in which he said to engaged couples, "Do not fear that when this transfiguration occurs, some splendor, passion or devotion may be lost. On the contrary, the supernatural does not destroy nature, does not cancel it out, does not change it, but perfects and transfigures it."

Dear friends in the Lord:

To commemorate the first public Mass being celebrated in the Crypt Church inside the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC on April 20, 1924, each diocese in the country has been asked to collect an offering to assist in defraying the expense of the Shrine Infrastructure Renewal Project which began last year at a cost of approximately \$20 million.

That Mass was a makeshift setting with bare concrete floors and exposed beams and around 3,000 people, including diplomats, attended. The altar was the one used by Bishop John Carroll, the first Catholic bishop of the United States, and it dated back to 1774. The Mass marked the official beginning of the Basilica's liturgical life and has been followed by over 800,000 public Masses in the 100 years since. It is a significant milestone in the history of the National Shrine, which serves as the preeminent Marian shrine and patronal church in the United States.

On a date I chose close to the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, I have asked our pastors to appeal to your generosity. This one-time collection will take place in all our parishes on Sunday, August 31, 2025.

Our involvement is crucial for the upkeep of the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, America's Catholic Church and it is good that we are able to participate. You can learn more at www.nationalshrine.org/history.

EUCHARISTIC PRAYER: ROMAN CANON SUPPLICES TE

Official Latin

Official English

Literal English

Supplices te rogamus, omnipotens Deus: iube haec perferri per manus sancti Angeli tui in sublime altare tuum, in conspectu divinae maiestatis tuae: ut, quotquot ex hac altaris participatione sacrosanctum Filii tui Corpus et Sanguinem sumpserimus, omni benedictione caelesti et gratia repleamur. (Per Christum Dóminum nostrum. Amen.)

In humble prayer we ask you, almighty God: command that these gifts be borne by the hands of your holy Angel to your altar on high in the sight of your divine majesty, so that all of us, who through this participation at the altar receive the most holy Body and Blood of your Son, may be filled with every grace and heavenly blessing. (Through Christ our Lord. Amen.)

We suppliants beg you, almighty God: command that these be borne by the hands of your holy Angel to your sublime altar in the sight of your divine majesty: so that as often as we will have taken the sacrosanct Body and Blood of your Son from this altar's participation, we may be filled with every heavenly blessing and grace. (Through Christ our Lord. Amen

Supplices and rogamus echo the same words of the Te igitur, however, this time, the priest says these words while bowing with his hands folded such that the tips of his little fingers are touching the altar. The gesture is reminiscent of promises made in the time of Biblical Patriarchs and by knights during the European Middle Ages. Moreover, the position is one of profound humility. Fr. Nicholas Gihr, in The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass (p.697) notes that the "thought of the unspeakable holiness of the gift," Jesus Christ, who has become ours, "arouses us to a consciousness of our own unworthiness." The declaration and posture of humility softens the following use of the imperative iube which means, "command!" said by the priest who commands God that haec, "these," (whose antecedent are the offerings of the Unde et memores), be brought to God's "sublime altar," "in the sight of [His] Divine Majesty." These offerings include our prayers, labors, sufferings, and good works, but "these" united to Christ Himself present in His Body and Chalice of Blood since Christ gives value to our personal offerings. Moreover, to bring our personal offerings to the "sublime altar" in heaven which far exceeds the dignity of our altar on earth causes our offerings to have greater dignity. A heavenly altar is meditioned in Isaiah 6:6 and in Revelation 8:5ff) St. Irenaeus writes, "In heaven there is an altar, to which our gifts and prayers are raised." (Adv. Haeres. 4,18,6) The use of "Maiestas" as a replacement for the second person pronoun also echoes the use of the same word in the Unde et memores.

To us today, it seems out of place that Christ's Body and Blood should be brought to the Father "through the hands of [His] holy Angel." Some have noted that because the word angel comes from the Greek word meaning "messenger," it does not necessarily refer to one of the spiritual creatures we call angels, but could in fact refer to Jesus Christ Himself as messenger from the Father as in the *Shepherd of Hermas*. The first Christians understood the "Angel of Great Counsel" in the Septuagint version of Isaiah 9:6 as referring to Jesus. The Byzantine Church still uses this title for Christ. On the other hand, since Christ sent the Holy Spirit, one might even argue that the "messenger" in question is the Holy Spirit. In fact, an earlier version of the Roman Canon cited by Saint Ambrose of Milan in his *De Sacramentis* uses "through the hands of Your angels" (*per manus angelorum tuorum*) which might include both the Son and the Holy Spirit. However, from a Liturgical and Biblical viewpoint, there is not difficulty with the angel being a spiritual creature.

In the *Sanctus*, we have already associated ourselves with the angels worshipping God in Heaven. The work of angels is to worship God and assist human beings to salvation, which includes helping us worship God. In Judges 6:20-24, an angel of the Lord instructs Gideon to prepare an offering and when he does "the angel of the Lord reached out the tip of the staff that was in his hand, and touched the meat and the unleavened cakes; and there sprang up fire from the rock and consumed the flesh and the unleavened cakes; and the angel of the Lord vanished from his sight." Several chapters later, in Judges 13:19-20, Samson's father, "Manoah took a young goat together with a grain offering and he offered them up to the Lord on a rock. ... As the flames rose up from the altar into the heavens, the angel of the Lord rose up from the altar in the flames as Manoah and his wife looked on. They fell prostrate on the ground." Additionally, we know from Scripture that the angels have a role in worshipping God and acting as mediators between God and human beings. In Tobit 12:15, the Archangel Raphael declares that he is one of seven who stand ready to enter to the glory of God, while Daniel 7:10 reveal that God is surrounded by myriads of worshipping Angels. And Revelation 8:3-4 indicates that the angels bring the prayers of God's holy people to God's altar in heaven with the phrase "the smoke of the incense of the prayers of the saints ascended up before God, from the hand of the angel." The angels are pure spirits who never had material bodies. Those who worship God are those who remained faithful when tested soon after they were created. Because angels are pure intelligence, superior to humans by nature, those who sinned could not repent.

Thus, the bad angels are not prowling around seeking to destroy souls. We call them devils or demons. That an angel would bring our offering to God's heavenly altar is a reminder of God's diversely ordered creation and God's transcendence. Cornelius Lapide in commenting of the book of Revelation suggests that the angel might be the priest's guardian angel. Others suggest the angel might be the guardian angel of the parish or St. Michael who is honored as the guardian of the Blessed Sacrament and of the Church militant. Hearing this petition invites as to pause and remember the angels, and our own guardian angel, surrounding us at Holy Mass. Finally, reinforcing the biblical notion of the activity of angels in the life and ministry of Christ, Jesus Himself said, "Amen, amen, I say to you, you will see the Heavens opened and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man." (John 1:51) Thus, the *Supplices Te* is rooted in Sacred Scripture and together with the *Unde et memores*, brings to our consciousness that Christ is *Hostia, Sacerdos, Altare* (Living Victim, Priest, Altar). (q.v. Easter Preface V) Just as the ordained priest is empowered to share in Christ's one priesthood (Hebrews 4:16) and to act "in the person of Christ," and the offering of bread and wine really and truly become Christ Himself (John 6:55), the church's altar upon which the sacrifice is offered represents Christ which is why kisses and other honors are given to it. The fact that the *Supplice Te* ends with "Through Christ our Lord" indicates that the Father generously allows a created Angel to participate in this worship through His Son. Thus, while in God's Providence angels have a mediatory role to play between God and man, it is Christ who is the one Mediator.

The second part of our prayer in the *Supplice Te* is that by our full participation in the liturgy, namely, having prepared ourselves to received the Body and Blood of Christ, we might benefit from our partaking by receiving God's blessing and grace. The blessing is not defined but may include both heavenly and earthly good things from God which have been asking for in our prayers. The grace we seek is the grace of perseverance in the state of grace by avoiding sin, especially mortal sin, (of course, we would never receive the Blessed Sacrament before going to confession if we were conscious of a mortal sin committed after our last good confession), an increase in sanctifying grace, and the actual graces we need to grow in virtue. As the priest says the final words asking for grace and blessing, he stands erect and makes the sign of the cross upon himself, visually indicating the power of grace to give us dignity as children of God. It hints at Luke 21:28 "[W]hen these signs begin to happen, stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand." The change in posture reinforces an eschatological element to the *Supplices Te* since while mindful of what Jesus anticipated at the Last Supper and accomplished on the Cross at Calvary on Good Friday, we also look forward to the eternal Day of the Lord in Heaven.

Finally, although the *Quam oblationem* is often regarded as an implicit *epiclesis*, that is, a calling down God's blessing (by His Holy Spirit). The Greek Orthodox theologian, Nicholas Kabasilas, (d. 1390) in his Commentary on the Divine Liturgy argues that the Roman Canon's Supplices Te is an implicit "ascending" epiclesis. He notes its position occurs after the words of Jesus, just as the explicit *epiclesis* of the Byzantine Eucharistic Prayers. As an *epiclesis*, the *Supplices* Te would be implicitly be asking for the Holy Spirit, referred to as Angel, to change the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ by asking that our offering be taken up to God's sublime altar (perferri sublime altare). Moreover, as an epiclesis, it also asks that we receive the fruit of our participation in the sacrifice which is graced union with God which is why as he says this part of the prayer, the priest blesses himself. Such a view, however, forgets that the Roman Canon is one of the most ancient Eucharistic Prayers, written before the Semi-Arian debates on the Divinity of the Holy Spirit. Thus, Byzantine era Eucharistic Prayers such as that of St. Basil or St. Gregory Nazianzen incorporate an *epiclesis* of the Holy Spirit to combat the heresy, while doing so was not necessary at Rome. Nevertheless, while it is fruitful for piety to cherish the words and try to understand them, we find that ultimately we must approach them with profound humility. And Pope St. Gregory the Great speaks for us when he writes in Book Four of his *Dialogues*, "For what right believing Christian can doubt, that in the very hour of the sacrifice, at the words of the Priest, the heavens be opened, and the choirs of Angels are present in that mystery of Jesus Christ; that high things are accompanied with low, and earthly joined to heavenly, and that one thing is made of visible and invisible?"
