

WHO NEEDS PRAYER?

My little children, reflect on these words: the Christian's treasure is not on earth but in heaven. Our thoughts, then ought to be directed to where our treasure is. This is the glorious duty of man: to pray and to love. If you pray and love, that is where a man's happiness lies.

My little children, your hearts are small, but prayer stretches them and makes them capable of loving God. Through prayer we receive a foretaste of heaven and something of paradise comes down upon us. Prayer never leaves us without sweetness. It is honey that flows into the soul and makes all things sweet. When we pray properly, sorrows disappear like snow before the sun.

Prayer also makes time pass very quickly and with such great delight that one does not notice its length. Listen: Once when I was a purveyor in Bresse and most of my companions were ill, I had to make a long journey. I prayed to the good God, and believe me, the time did not seem long.

Some men immerse themselves as deeply in prayer as fish in water, because they give themselves totally to God. There is not division in their hearts. O, how I love these noble souls! Saint Francis of Assisi and Saint Colette used to see our Lord and talk to him just as we talk to one another.

How unlike them we are! How often we come to church with no idea of what to do or what to ask for. And yet, whenever we go to any human being, we know well enough why we go. And still worse, there are some who seem to speak to the good God like this: "I will only say a couple of things to you, and then I will be rid of you." I often think that when we come to adore the Lord, we would receive everything we ask for, if we would ask with living faith and with a pure heart.

EUCHARISTIC PRAYER: ROMAN CANON: PER IPSUM

Official Latin

Per ipsum, et cum ipso, et in ipso est Tibi, Deo Patri omnipotenti, in unitate Spiritus Sancti, omnis honor et gloria per omnia saecula saeculorum. Amen.

Official English

Through him, and with him, and in him, O God, almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor is yours, for ever and ever. Amen.

Literal English

Through Him, and with Him, and in Him, to You God, almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor, for ever and ever. Amen.

This final part of the Roman Canon begins with *Per ipsum* literally translated as "through the same." This is one of the most ancient prayers of Holy Mass. The *ipsum* connects us to the *quem* of the previous prayer and to the *Christum Dominum nostrum* at the end of the *Nobis quoque*. In fact, *ipsum* is a reflexive adjective which in English is rendered here as Him, with the antecedent being Jesus Christ. Notably, Latin had no third person pronoun except the reflexive pronouns. Demonstrative and reflexive pronouns and adjectives which serve as third person pronouns.

The words "Through Him (Christ)" are a powerful statement of Faith. Jesus Christ, true God and true man, is "the one mediator between God and man" (1 Timothy 2:5-9). The phrase is used twice in Saint Paul's letter to the Colossians (1:16-20): "[F]or in Him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through Him and for Him. He Himself is before all things, and in Him all things hold together. He is the head of the Body, the Church; He is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that He might come to have first place in everything. For in Him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through Him God was pleased to reconcile to Himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the Blood of His Cross."

The passage proclaims Jesus' divine and human natures. Meanwhile, Saint John the Apostle wrote: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was With God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being *through* Him, and without Him not one thing came into being" (John 1:1-3) In both passages, the word "through" is important because it distinguishes the God Father from Jesus as persons without denying their co-eternal equality in divinity as the one true God, especially in view of what is written in Isaiah 44:24: "Thus says YHWH, your Redeemer, who formed you in the womb: 'I am YHWH, who made all things, who alone stretched out the heavens, who by myself spread out the earth." Thus, when we use the ancient phrase, "through Christ our Lord," we recall Christ's role in Creation and Redemption. When we call Him Lord, we are calling Him YHWH, the name God revealed at the burning bush to Moses.

We pray the *Per ipsum* at the end of the Roman Canon because this is the point at which the gifts are offered to God the Father by the priest acting in *person* of *Christ the Head*. The priest indicates an act of offering, according to the rubrics, by slightly elevating the gifts over the corporal which is on altar. But, these gifts are offered not only through Christ, but also with Him and in Him. In fact, we also offer Christ to Himself and to the Holy Spirit in so far as They are, respectively, the Second and Third Persons of the Blessed Trinity. Thus, Christ is the one offered as living victim; the one who offers as High Priest; and the offeree as one of the Trinity. We, meanwhile, remember gratefully remember that He has become our brother (Hebrews 2:11) and that He identifies Himself with us as members of His Mystical Body, the Church (Acts 9:4; 1 Corinthians 12:27; Ephesians 1:23, 4:12; Colossians 1:18). As the priest elevates our Blessed Lord, we also recall the fulfillment of the prophecy of Malachi (1:11): "For from the rising of the sun to its setting my name is great among the nations, and in every place incense is offered to my name, and a pure offering; for my name is great among the nations, says the Lord of hosts."

As we offer Christ, we offer a divinely living victim. His Divinity cannot die. The Messiah, though He died in His Humanity on the Cross, rose in His Humanity and dies no more in His Humanity. By His own promise at the Last Supper, which He can fulfill because He is God, His saving death on the Cross at Calvary and His glorious resurrection are made present at each celebration of Holy Mass. Thus, we offer this Paschal Mystery to the Father as the only way we can give anything of worth back to the Father. The only human creature who can give God glory by His own merit is Jesus Christ since His human nature is inseparably united to his divine nature through His divine personhood. The Son of God acts properly from each nature, but in all His acts, the one who acts is the second person of the Trinity. The Church calls this unfathomable union the hypostatic union. The Baltimore Catechism teaches that if we ask Jesus, "Who are you?" He answers, "The Son of God." If we ask, "What are you?" He responds, "Divine and Human." Moreover, because of Christ's incarnation by hypostatic union, we can say that God died and was immolated for us, even though God as God cannot die. And yet, in saying this, we cannot say that Father or the Holy Spirit died and was immolated for us. Because the divine nature cannot die, Jesus is a living victim capable of giving us life even in death. This is why Jesus says, "Unless You eat my Flesh and drink my Blood, you cannot have life with in you." (John 6:53) The first man, Adam, was supposed to have eaten frequently of the tree of life to maintain immortality, but after sinning was barred from doing so. The Cross is now the tree of life and through Baptism and Penance we are again admitted to eat, not earthly food, but Jesus our heavenly food.

The *Per ipsum* refers not only to Christ, but also the Father and the Holy Spirit. Moreover, all "glory and honor" are given to the Father, through, with, in Christ. As we hear the word "glory" we are reminded of the hymn sung at the beginning of Holy Mass of which the first words *Gloria in excelsis Deo* were sung by the Angels announcing Christ's birth at Bethlehem (which means "house of bread"). As at the first Christmas, the Incarnate Son of God is present in our church upon the altar but hidden from our eyes in the form bread to give glory to the Father. Glory and honor are always possessed by God the Father, but also due to Him from His creatures. But only God-made-Flesh can truly give the Father perfect glory. And Christ, because He made us members of His Mystical Body, the Church, and because He is eternal, guarantees that through Him we can offer the Father perfect glory "forever."

The Holy Spirit is the eternal hypostatic Love between the Father and the Son. Fr. Enrico Mazza points out that acceptable worship is "in the Spirit and Truth" (John 4:24) wherein Spirit refers to the Holy Spirit and Truth refers to the Son of God. Further, the *Per ipsum* indicates that glory is given to the Father "in the unity of the Holy Spirit." This is actually a phrase of Saint Paul in his Letter to the Ephesians 4:3 wherein he says, "Make every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." Following this, he explains in Ephesians 4:4-6, "There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call, one Lord, one Faith, one Baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all." The Holy Spirit is the unity between Father and Son. And thus, in his temporal mission in creation, the Holy Spirit makes the members of the Church one. Thus, at the Last Supper, Jesus prayed that Christians "be one even as we are one" (John 17:21-23). The oneness of God is a unity of three divine persons. Noteworthy, is the fact that the first use of the word "one" (*echad*) in Scripture is in Genesis 1:5: "And the evening and the morning were one day." The next usage is in Genesis 2:24: "Therefore shall a man leave his father and his mother, and shall cleave unto his woman: and they shall be one flesh." The use of the Hebrew word "one," therefore, does not mean solitary. "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one" (Deuteronomy 6:4) does not exclude that the one God is a communion of three persons. The Church founded by Christ is also one, though as a creature she has many parts (1 Corinthians 12:12-27; Romans 12:4-5).

The Roman Canon ends with "Amen" a word used so often in our prayers and during Holy Mass. "Amen" is actually a Hebrew word, derived from a root meaning "truth" or "certainty." It indicates one's agreement or belief with some declaration. Some old Italian prayer books translated it così sia or "so be it." Jesus often said, "Amen. Amen. I say to you..." (John 5:24; 6:53; 14:2; 16:20) to emphasize the truth of what He was about to say, such as during the Bread of Life discourse. Revelation 3:14 even use "Amen" as a name for Jesus who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life (John 14:6). And when the saints and angels in heaven pray, they sing "Amen" (Revelation 4:9-10; 7:11). Jesus the Lamb declares, "Amen" (Revelation 5:2). The saints join Christ in saying, "Amen." (Revelation 5:13) In fact, "Amen" is the last word of the entire Bible in Revelation 22:21. How appropriate to say this word with love and devotion in all our prayers, but especially to conclude the Eucharistic Prayer.
