ABOUT THE LITURGY: The Gifts of the Magi

There is a joke that states that the Magi could not have been women, because, if they were, they would have asked for directions along the way, have arrived early enough to assist with the birth of the Christ Child, and have given much more practical gifts. (Indeed, in today's world, more practical gifts would include N95 Masks, Hand Sanitizers, and *Toilet Paper!*)

So why do we focus on gold, frankincense, and myrrh? They are symbolic, not practical gifts, that are meant to make a statement about the Christ Child. Gold is considered a sign of kingship, since it the most noble of metals: rare, long lasting, ever shining, and almost indestructible. Frankincense is considered a sign of divinity: a pleasant smell wafting up to the heavens, accompanied by our prayers and petitions, reaching the throne of the Almighty. Myrrh is also a resin, like frankincense, that be liquefied and mixed with oil used for anointing. Sometimes it was used to anoint a dead body, as Nicodemus does in the Gospel of Saint John as Jesus is taken down from the Cross. Including it in this list of the Magi's gifts is a reference to how Jesus will die for our sins.

If these gifts are symbolic of Jesus, then they also have significance for us, united as we are in baptism to the Risen Lord. As a kingly people, we rise above the fears and anxieties of this world confident in the Victorious One. As a priestly people, our lives can be a special offering to God whose will we seek to follow. As mortal people, subject to death, we live out the truth that Jesus has come into the world to be our Light and to destroy the power of sin and death.
