#### MALLIA'S MOMENTS

For a month now I have been writing a series of articles designed to explain or make the case for God and subsequently, for our faith as Catholics. So far, we have looked at how we know there is a God, what attributes are found in God, how the Bible is consistent with and reveals a fuller image of God, about the two natures of Jesus and on the Trinity. If you missed any of the previous articles, I encourage you to look at the parish website where all previous articles can be found.

This reflection will be on our need for salvation or did Jesus have to die on the cross. At the center of the Christian faith is the understanding that through the passion, death, resurrection and ascension into heaven of Jesus we have been forgiven of our sins. But for some, there is the question; did Jesus really have to die?

Over the centuries this question has taken on different dynamics. At one point in time, we looked at the sacrificial nature of the death and now it seems that the question is more related to the suffering and was there not an "easier" way for our sins to be forgiven? The only way to understand the reason for Jesus having to die is to understand the nature and impact of sin.

It is simply providential that this article should be coming out just a couple of days before we enter into Lent. By now, you should have received my Lenten letter that I send out to all registered households each year. If you did not get one, please call the parish office and make sure we have your household registered. If you are over the age of 21 and have received the Sacrament of Confirmation, you should be registered on your own and not on your parent's registration.

In that letter I wrote about sin and how it enslaves us. Sin acts counter to our basic nature to do that which is good and right and it separates us from God and the community into which we have been baptized. For far too many people, sin is just a 'bad" thing we did and we just need to "make better choices." Our failure to grasp the impact of sin on our lives leads us to down-play sin, to not see the need for confession and conversion and even more it makes us morally numb.

Sin is not simply something that you do. Sin also can be those times when we don't do; like when we don't do what we know we are supposed to. We do not pray and go to mass. We do not help those in need. We do not try to correct an injustice. Further, sin can also be in our minds and hearts when we hold grudges, think evil thoughts about others or feel happy when something bad happens to someone we do not like. Not only must we look at what we did or did not do, but why we did or did not do it and the consequences of our action or inaction.

That is why when we consider why Jesus had to die, we must look all the way back to the story of creation and Adam and Eve. The eating of the fruit was not really the sin, because the command from God was that they not even touch the tree (it was not an apple by the way). Reviewing the story, you will notice that the serpent told them that if they ate the fruit that they would be like God. In other words, the temptation was to replace God in their lives with their own desires and wants. Like all sin, the heart of the original sin is arrogance. The thought that we don't need God comes at the cost of enslaving ourselves to sin and all that is evil. Notice in the story that Adam and Eve never ask for forgiveness, but actually seek to hide from God even when confronted by God who was seeking them out. Not unlike people today who do not go to confession; we try to hide our sin, diminish it to make it appear insignificant and in arrogance not seek to turn our lives from the sin we have committed. Each time we sin and do not repent, we further enslave ourselves to that sin and further separate ourselves from God.

When sin entered the world the relationship between God and people was completely altered. In the Genesis account of creation, we see how God intended our relationship to be. Adam and God talked each day, they walked through the Garden and Adam was a co-worker with God as a steward of creation symbolized by the naming of the animals. God further shows us the dignity of our relationship with other humans in the creation of Eve and how it was different than the relationship we had with the rest of the created order. From that intimate and loving experience of God, the Bible shows us how God became unknown and had to be revealed to people again. But what or who could possibly make things right again?

Because the sin was caused by humans, a human had to make things right with God. But, what could humanity do to again regain the relationship that once existed? No person could do that, the task was too great. In Jesus Christ, as I wrote about two weeks ago, we see the importance of the two natures of the full humanity and the full divinity. St. Paul and the Early Church rightly refer to Jesus as the "new Adam." St. Paul talks about how through one man sin entered into the world and through Jesus all were redeemed.

Jesus had to die not only to show us how much God loved us, but to help us understand the full impact of our sin. Jesus had to pay the price for our souls that had been enslaved to sin. Each time we sin, we are telling Jesus upon the cross that his love means nothing; that he died for nothing. Our attachment to sin as a pattern in our lives is our way of saying to God that he may love us, but we do not love him. Yet, we expect to go to heaven when we die though we sought no real connection with God while here on the earth. Who are we kidding? That is the greatest deception ever put forth that people have accepted.

Q. I heard a homily from a bishop in Kentucky whose opening statement was that heresy in the Church is a good thing. I was so taken aback after this proclamation that for the life of me I can't remember much of anything he said after that. How can anyone think heresy is good, especially a bishop? I should have asked him myself at the time, but it's too late now because he died several years ago.

**A.** Of course I can only give you my thoughts. I really have no idea what the bishop's point would have been. Perhaps he was speaking of the historical reactions of the Church to heresies as they have continually popped up over the last 2,000 years.

One of the first, and probably more notable heresies, was the Arianism heresy. Attributed to a man named Arius (256 - 336 AD), this heresy was based on a teaching that the Son of God did not always exist but was begotten within time by God the Father. This brought about the Roman Emperor Constantine to summon all the Christian bishops to the city of Nicaea in 325 AD. Today we know this as being the *Council of Nicaea* which, among other things, gave us the *Niceea Creed*. We recite the Niceea Creed at Mass today.

Aside from the Council of Jerusalem, which occurred around 50 AD (Acts 15) and is usually not counted as an ecumenical council, there have been 21 ecumenical councils. The most notable for us today would be the Council of Trent 1545 AD - 1564 AD, Vatican I 1869 - 1870 AD, and Vatican II 1962 - 1965 AD.

**Trent:** Affirmed Catholic doctrines against the errors of the Protestant Reformers; reaffirmed teachings on the role of the Bible and Tradition, grace, sin, justification by faith (but not by "faith alone"), the Mass as a real sacrifice, purgatory, indulgences, jurisdiction of the pope; initiated the Counter-Reformation; reformed the clergy and morals; promoted religious instruction; ordered the establishment of seminaries for the future training of priests.

**Vatican I:** Defined papal infallibility and primacy; condemned errors regarding the relationship between faith and reason (the council was cut short by war, its work to be taken up again by Vatican II).

Vatican II: Issued pastoral documents on the renewal and reform of the Church, intending to make the Church more effective in dealing with the contemporary world.

So, perhaps the bishop's homily was refereeing to the reaffirmation of our Catholic faith that has taken place when errors in teaching have developed down through the centuries.
