From
Fr. Mark Livingston

I hope you're having a blessed Lent! Last week, on Wednesday, we met at St. Mary's and discussed the Mass and the Eucharist. As we look forward to next week, we consider Reconciliation. Our Family's communal penance service will take place at Holy Family on Wednesday, March 13, at 7 PM, which gives us a prime opportunity to engage in the dialogue of God's mercy, asking for pardon for what we've done to offend our relationship with Him and our brothers and sisters. Peace and freedom follow from God's pardon. We are blessed to have this Sacrament available to us, priests included! I try to go to Confession once a month. I need it.

In our readings this weekend, we hear about a mysterious Gentile leader, named King Cyrus of Persia, who was sent by God to liberate Israel from the oppression of and slavery to the Babylonians. He sets them free from their slavery and they are allowed to return to their ancestral homeland of Jerusalem. King Cyrus is a type of the Messiah; he foreshadows or pre-figures Jesus. Just as King Cyrus liberated the Jewish people from slavery to another nation, so Jesus came to set us free from the "foreign nation" of the dominion of darkness, sin, death and Satan, who took us captive at the Fall and continues to do so with each sin.

Jesus, we are told in our Gospel, is the remedy to the poison of sin and

death. Like any poison, it has slowly crept into our lives and almost seems to course through our veins, causing us to struggle and fall over and over. As the bronze serpent was lifted up and all who had been bitten by "seraphim," a word from Hebrew meaning "the ones on fire," referencing the Seraphim Angels primarily, but here, in the Gospel, it refers to the name of the serpents that were allowed to invade the camp because the Israelites had denounced the "Bread from Heaven" (manna). In other words, the ones that are on fire (demons, or fallen Seraph angels) and bring fire (sin and death) were allowed by God because of the people's choice to step away from God and denounce the Bread from Heaven, to bite the people, and many died. In his mercy, God gives them a remedy, if they believe. The remedy for their healing was to look upon their sin and the results of their sin and repent (the bronze serpent lifted up on the camp). Then they were healed. If they did not look at it honestly and repent, they would die.

Jesus is described in the Gospel as the new "serpent on a pole." This is a very odd image for Jesus. Remember, however, what St. Paul said to the Corinthians, "We beseech you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our

sake he made [Jesus] to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God" (2 Cor 5:20b-21). In other words, Jesus took on our sins and "became [our] sin" though he was sinless. We need to look upon our sin (Jesus on the cross) to be healed. To look upon our sin and to see that he took our punishment on himself so that we would be healed is to acknowledge his sacrifice of out of love for us and to be healed. He was sinless, we are not. We should be filled with gratitude and the desire not to sin anymore as we gaze upon the cross.

I remember when I was still immersed in a very sinful lifestyle a few years before applying to the seminary. I thought I was really good! After all, I hadn't killed anyone! This is not the measure of goodness! In fact, even people who have killed others, including abortion or in other ways, can be healed by looking honestly at themselves, acknowledging that we have greatly sinned, and accepting the need for a savior—Jesus. The measure of goodness is how closely we adhere to and walk with the Holy One, Jesus, not how "good I've been" without him. As I came more fully to this understanding, I realized more and more just how much I needed God's mercy, not my self-righteousness. I had hurt God and many people deeply. So, I went to Confession for the first time in over 10-15 years. All the past sins that I thought were no big deal were really big and were lies from the Evil One and my self-righteousness. After that roughly one-

hour-long confession, I felt free! I could breathe again. I didn't want to rely on my own strength any more. I only wanted Jesus. Still, I did not feel completely at peace. I kept remembering all of the people I had hurt and I realized what God was calling me to do. He had convicted me to reach out to the people I had hurt so deeply (when practical and available) and ask for their forgiveness. I met with, called, emailed or messaged them all and, after reminding them what I had done to them, I asked them to please forgive me. Nearly all offered me their forgiveness. It was so freeing, and humiliating, but I didn't care about ego anymore; I just wanted to set things right. I'm still not perfect—far from it, in fact—but I know the mercy and love of the Perfect One and He is more than enough.

This Wednesday (and any time, really) we have an opportunity to receive God's mercy and love and to walk away free in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Will you take advantage of it? If it's been 40 years, 30 years, 20 years, 10 years, 2 years, whatever, God's merciful, understanding love awaits you in Reconciliation, especially at Holy Family on Wednesday, March 13, at 7 PM. See, believe, repent, and be healed.

Be assured of my prayers and God bless each and all of you!

Kinder-Garden Corner

We are in the season of Lent, and in Kindergarten we have been using this time to help us to "Grow in Jesus."

When Lent began, we talked about what this season in the Church means and why it is so important to take an active part in it. We talked about sacrificing, giving, and growing in our faith. To help us to do these things, each week the Kindergarteners take home a sheet with a flower petal on it. Each day, with the help of their parents, the Kindergarteners pick something to do for Jesus. They may choose a sacrifice - not watching TV or giving up a favorite snack or treat for the day. They may choose to do an act of kindness - playing with someone who looks lonely, calling grandparents to visit, helping with a chore, or telling people in their families they love them. They may also choose prayer and quiet time with Jesus. Every Friday the kids bring their petal into school. They have colored them in - some one color, some with designs - all different, all unique, like my Kindergarteners. We share the petals with the class, and the children beam with pride when their petals are shared. At the end of the day, the petals are hung on a giant flower we are "growing," so that we can see how we are "Growing in Jesus." The children are so proud and they get so excited, anticipating when it will reach the top and sides - and what if it gets too big?

Kindergarteners have a wonderful way of helping adults put life in perspective. As we continue our journey through Lent and prepare for Holy Week, I encourage you to take time to reflect on your Lenten journey. Are you growing in Jesus? Will your flower get too big? Are you enriching your relationship with our Lord?

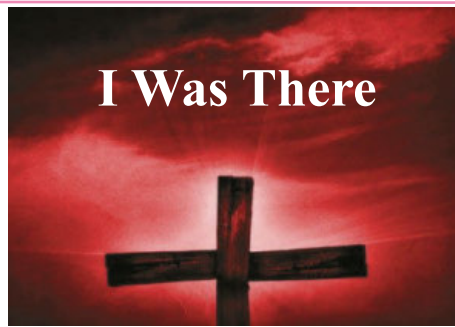

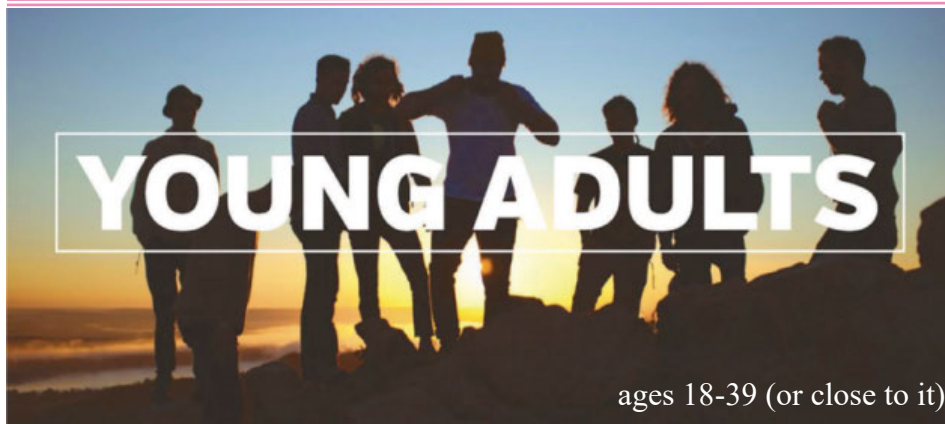

Q: In Matthew 27:26 we read that, from the cross, Jesus cried out: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Yet John 3:16 -17 reads: *God so loved the world, he gave his son. Then goes on to say that God sent his son.* Why then if God "sent" and "gave" his son did he then forsake his son?

A: With Sacred Scripture, there are many levels of understanding to be gleaned from its passages. Jesus is quoting from Psalm 22. In quoting the first line of Psalm 22, Jesus intends for all to understand the whole of this Psalm applies to him as it is then being fulfilled.

This Psalm prophesies of an afflicted man who is downcast, his garments are divided as they cast lots for his clothing. It reads that his hands and feet are pierced, and he was ridiculed in his suffering. Certainly, the Jewish officials, who memorized sacred scripture, recognized this passage. Our lessons here? We can be so enticed by power and prestige, as these Jewish leaders were, that we can put these things ahead of our own eternal salvation. Another lesson in this passage is about victory, even though the circumstances are dire, victory follows. Psalm 22 is also an important lesson about suffering itself, because it is about trust in God's deliverance.

St. Paul wrote: "For our sake God made him to be sin who knew no sin" (2 Corinthians 5:21). In Isaiah 59 we read: "your iniquities have separated you and your God, and your sins have hidden his face from you. If sin separates us from God, and Jesus became sin by taking on our sin, there was a barrier between God

There are thousands of cursillistas, as we are called, in Michigan and millions around the world including bishops, ordained clergy and lay people. Pope Francis is a cursillista and he promotes it openly.

Cursillo is considered a lay movement. A lay movement that is run by Catholic lay leaders along with the clergy.

On a weekend lay people witness to their faith in presentations and the clergy present the doctrinal talks. It is a weekend of fellowship, information, beautiful liturgies, prayer, meditation, singing, and a lot of merriment. It is a special time with the Lord. Time when you can relax, enjoy, be waited on, and have a private room with your own shower. There are no expectations of you but to enjoy, learn and absorb all that the Lord has planned for you.

I made my weekend in 1975 at Sacred Heart Seminary. I feel very strongly about this movement because of the way it changed my life. Being Catholic became very real to me. My faith and love of Jesus soared in ways I never thought was possible. I take immense pleasure in sharing this treasure with everyone I know, especially with the community in which I worship.

the Father and God the Son, while he hung on that cross.

The Blessed Trinity is eternal, they exist outside of time and space and this is beyond our ability to comprehend. We can only know what God reveals to us, even then we still cannot fully understand. Both the humanity and the divinity of Jesus were fully present in the Garden of Gethsemane where Jesus prayed on the night of his betrayal and arrest (Mark 14:32-41). Jesus' despair in Gethsemane was so great that he sweat drops of blood (Luke 22:40-46).

Although the humanity in Jesus was facing something dreadfully terrible, the divinity of Jesus was facing something horrific. Something beyond our comprehension. A pure, holy, completely sinless son of God was about to become sin by taking on the sins of the world. This would then, according to the prophet Isaiah, put a barrier between Jesus and his Father. So, Jesus is also quoting the Psalm for his own sake. He

suffered great physical, mental, emotional and spiritual anguish, but would arise triumphantly.

Our Lord Jesus, who is fully God and fully man, suffered on more levels and with greater agony than we humans can understand. The Holy Spirit, that inspired the 22nd Psalm, looked down through time and saw the agony Jesus would endure and knew what his response would be. All three persons of the Trinity knew full well what lay ahead. The lesson here is that God's abundant love for us knows no boundaries.

Psalm 22 also gives voice to the pain and grief that we all experience. This also serves to remind us to call on the Lord in our times of despair. The God who loved us so much that he paid the cost for our redemption will certainly deliver us.
