From Fr. Kishore Beezam

Palm Sunday is the sixth and last Sunday of Lent, and it marks the beginning of Holy week. Palm Sunday commemorates the triumphant entry of Jesus into Jerusalem, days before he was crucified. It demonstrates that Christ is the Davidic king that fulfilled this ancient prophecy: "He will reign on David's throne and over his kingdom, establishing and upholding it with justice and righteousness". (Isaiah: 9:7).

The first reading for the blessing of the palms is the recounting of the glorious entrance into Jerusalem. Everything seems to be going so well. The crowds come out, the adulation rises in great cheers, people take off their cloaks with an enthusiasm that we generally see only at sporting events and political rallies, All this to welcome this prophet, wonder-worker, challenger of author-They did not know that, in itv. Mark's gospel, Jesus began the journey to this triumphal entrance right after his transfiguration when he told his disciples of the destiny that awaited him. He walked toward that destiny not because it was easy, but because it was his mission. Along the way his disciples argue about places of honor, so they would have loved the roaring crowds and the outstretched cloaks. But Jesus told them that he came to serve, not to be served, to give his life for the many (MK: 10:45). So Jesus enters the city

in triumph knowing that it is a passing glory, while his disciples probably think they are riding a great wave.

The heart of the Palm Sunday celebration, however, is the other side of the coin, the side of suffering. We hear the reading of the Passion. Mark offers several interlocking stories, all of which point to the mission.

First, we hear about the woman who burst in to anoint Jesus and who is immediately criticized by all those gathered. Jesus puts them in their place: "Leave her alone", he says. He comes to the defense of the defenseless, the poor, the marginalized, those who have no name.

Second, we hear of the betrayal by Judas. The ends justify the means. Judas wants something, money or whatever, and Jesus is the means to the end. Morality is so easily sacrificed on the altar of achieving the end that one wants. Morality is sacrificed by convincing oneself that the end is a noble endeavor. That is the thinking of Judas and it is not far from how we are often tempted to still think.

Third, is the meal shared with his Apostles. It is the Passover meal which celebrates God's plan of liberation from what oppresses his people, and the making of the covenant (Exodus).

Jesus uses that meal to make a new covenant with his people. He knows that his time is limited, he knows that the Apostles still don't "get it" and will be weak once reality comes upon them (as the story of Peter's betrayal underscores), so he has to leave them something to sustain them in the darkness, in the valley, and he gives them and us as well, his very self, His body and blood. His Body, and His Blood which unites us, has given as both a cup of blessing and a cup of suffering. The cup unifies the joys and sufferings, the lights and shadows, of our lives and the life of the world. Jesus raises the cup and tells us that he or she who drinks from it will have life.

Then comes the time in the garden, Jesus began his public ministry in a desert and there he was tempted. Now at the end he is in a garden, and once again is tempted by the harshness of the fate that awaits him. Like at the beginning Jesus doesn't fall to the temptation of doing the easy thing, but accepts doing the right thing, namely the will of the Father and fidelity to the mission he has from the Father. It is that unshakable conviction that sustains him and moves him forward to the next scene, his passion and death.

The passion in Mark is the shortest of the gospel accounts but ends with something unique. The centurion looking on at "how he died," exclaims: "Truly this was the Son of The act of faith that pro-God". claims Jesus "Son of God" is only mentioned one other time in Mark, in the first verse which begins the Gospel, and now here because of the way he died. His death was the final culminating point of his mission. His death was the lesson of what "I came to serve" means, it is in his death that his life and ministry is understood, and this remains until today the touchstone of our own discipleship, our own call to service. "He who loses his life will gain it" (Mk: 8:35), "Where I am, there will my servant be" (Jn: 12:26). It is in his suffering and death that his "Son-ship" is fully revealed, and in our dying to self that we are lifted up into the same inheritance.

Let us not cause Jesus to weep over us, instead let us repent and weep over our sins remembering the Jewish saying: "Heaven rejoices over a repentant sinner and sheds tears over a non-repentant, hardhearted one".

We need to be fruit-producing, not barren, fig trees. God expects us to produce fruits of holiness, purity, justice, humility, obedience, charity, and forgiveness, instead of leading a barren spiritual life.

The lesson for us again in this Holy Week, is to have trust in God's mercy, in his providence. God's plans for us are all for love, for life, for our happiness and joy.

My dear family of parishioners, whatever crosses we carry in our lives, whatever hardships we face, we need to know that Jesus is walking with us. As we accompany Jesus and Mary throughout Holy Week, they are showing us the meaning of love.

Holy Week makes 115 "Witnesses" of our Lord's love for us. Let us ask for the grace this week, to testify to the love we have witnessed. Let us open our hearts to one another, as he has opened his heart for us. As we accompany Jesus and Mary on their final earthly journey together this week, let us say to God, as they did: "Not my will, but Thy will be done". May Mary our Blessed Mother go with us this week, as we carry our cross with her Son, that we might join him in his resurrection.

Finally, I would like to quote St. Andrew of Crete, "Let us imitate those who have gone out to meet him, not scattering olive branches or garments or palms in his path, but spreading ourselves before him as best as we can with humility of soul and upright purpose.... It is ourselves that we must spread under Christ's feet..." Amen.

I Have Called You Each by Name

There are several milestones or "firsts" in Preschool. It is such a gift to be a part of a child's school "first". The first drop off, the first friendship, the first field trip, the first art project, the first recess, the first school prayer, and the list goes on.

When learning something new, there is a natural progression. Name writing is no exception. It is personally one of my favorite Preschool "firsts". Beyond the letter formation, you realize as a teacher that the child is learning that print in general has meaning and that these specific printed letters have a special meaning which combine to form his/her name. There is great pride, hard work, and self satisfaction in this progressive process.

Our youngest learners begin by recognizing their names, identifying it in its totality or simply by the first letter. The next step is typically the mastery of writing the first letter. This is particularly exciting because now that special first letter appears on independent work such as the art center, the paint center, etc. The rest of the letters eventually fall into place with repeated exposure and practice. The ultimate goal is that by the end of Preschool, each child is writing his/her name confidently, proudly, and independently.

As adults, we sign or type our names several times during a day \sim mostly without excitement. For most of us, it is routine, but the next time you complete that mundane task, think about how special your name is. Think about how it was gifted to you by your parents and by God. Is it a family name? Part of a special story? Was it a Top Ten Baby Name of the year you were born? Or maybe it is a mystery that can be revealed by having a conversation with a parent or family member.

I have not thought about my name story in quite some time, but when I do, I smile. It brings me happiness because it was told to me throughout many years by my parents. My Dad was a huge fan

What Makes it "Holy" Thursday?

Around the world, most parishes will schedule opportunities for daily Mass, however, on Holy Thursday no daily Mass is offered. Instead, the bishop of each diocese will preside at a singular, special liturgy, the Chrism Mass. Chrism is the blessed oil used in the Sacraments. It is at this celebration that the Bishop consecrates the oils for use by the faithful under his care. He invites all the priests of the diocese to join him at this liturgy. Most of the deacons try to attend as well.

After the homily, all the priests in attendance are invited to stand and renew aloud the vow of commitment to priestly service that they professed on the day of their ordination. As you can imagine, it's quite moving.

Later that day, the season of Lent ends as the Holy Thursday Mass and the season of Triduum begins. Triduum (trid-oo-um) is Latin for "Three Days". That evening a few different things occur during Mass that only happen once a year. As the liturgy begins, you'll see a solemn procession of the consecrated oils our bishop has blessed that morning and hear the prayers sent along with oils.

We understand Holy Thursday to be the remembrance of the Last Supper, so it is a bit surprising that the Gospel is *not* one of the passages that describe the institution of the Eucharist. Instead, we hear the Scripture detailing what Jesus did *after* He blessed, broke, and shared His Body; He took off his tunic and washed His disciple's feet. He did so in a display of humility and servant leadership. After the homily, our priest, who just that morning professed his recommitment to God and His people, will likewise follow the model of Jesus and wash the feet of twelve members of our faith community.

Following Communion, the servers, deacon, and priest lead the faithful out of the church to a place where a specially constructed Altar of Repose has been prepared. It is here that the Blessed Sacrament will be enthroned for the faithful to spend some quiet time with Our Lord.


We recall that Jesus, who after washing their feet, invited his friends to come to the Garden of Gethsemane to accompany Him as he prayed; "*My soul is sorrowful even to death. Remain here and keep watch with me*" (Matt. 26:38)

However, they did not. They fell asleep. The Church allows us this special opportunity to demonstrate our willingness to stay awake and keep watch with Jesus.

If you've never taken advantage of this devotion, perhaps this is the year to do so. While we meditate on the truths of our faith, reflect on how our experience of Lent has been and prepare our hearts for the glory of Easter, there is no better place to do so than in the physical presence of our Lord.

The Altar of Repose at both Holy Family and St. Mary Mystical Rose will be open until midnight. Even if you did not attend the Mass, you are still welcome to come and keep Jesus company for a while.

While Holy Thursday is not a holy day of obligation, it is a holy day of *invitation*. Consider yourself invited.




