~PASTOR'S NOTES~

I encourage everyone to sign up for FORMED.org. It is a FREE website about the Catholic Faith that includes movies, documentaries, books, audio talks lectures, etc. that can be downloaded to almost any device. We need about 40 people to sign up to avoid a parish fee of \$400. Once again, it is free to parishioners who sign up. Even if you do not know if you will use it, if you sign up it will be a big help to the parish. Just go to FORMED.org. If you have an account sign in and follow the instructions. If you do not have a FORMED account go to FORMED.org and look for "I belong to a parish..." then type in St. Columbanus Catholic Church and click on it, enter your name. Your email is your password so you don't need to create a new password and try to remember it. I did it and it was very simple to do. Remember it is FREE!

Just a reminder that the Knights of Columbus have a clothing shed in the rear church parking lot for clothing that will be used for the poor. Drop off clothing any time down the chute.

If you have been following the Church in the Catholic media you will know that there is a synod in Rome on the Amazon people. Unfortunately, the modernists in the church are using the synod to put forth options that are contrary to the constant teaching and practices of the Catholic Church. Paganism and pantheism are being promoted rather than proclaiming the truths of Jesus Christ.

The Vatican even hosted a pagan ritual worshipping false gods which was attended by Pope Francis who when he witnessed it said the Our Father then left.

St. Pope Paul VI once commented that the smoke of Satan had entered the church. We see that the devil seems to be having free reign in the church as the leaders of the church are pushing ideas that are opposed to authentic Catholic teaching.

Some have mentioned the fear of a looming schism or split within the church herself.

In the past faithful members of the church have been persecuted by those outside the church as we see in our own days



in the persecution of Christians in China and the Middle East. Now, however, those Catholics who want true teaching and worship are being ridiculed and persecuted by members of the hierarchy within the church. Faithful priests have been silenced while some lay people are not taken seriously and many lay members lack even the most basic knowledge of the faith.

Archbishop Fulton Sheen pointed out that when the Church gives up practices the secular culture will pick them up. People light incense and listen to Gregorian Chant at home or in their cars while the same has disappeared from our churches. The spiritual and supernatural are downplayed while a few years ago statues of angels was all the rage.

In 1969, then Fr. Joseph Ratzinger (the future Pope Benedict XVI) said, "And so it seems certain to me that the Church is facing very hard times. The real crisis has scarcely begun. We will have to count on terrific upheavals. But I am equally certain about what will remain at the end: not the Church of the political cult, which is dead already, but the Church of faith. It may well no longer be the dominant social power to the extent that she was until recently; but it will enjoy a fresh blossoming and be seen as man's home, where he will find life and hope beyond death.

We need to recover the beauty, truth, and goodness of the Catholic Faith in all its dimensions both spiritual and physical.

Many of the Saints from Our Lady to Padre Pio have asked that the Rosary be said daily to defeat the errors of the modernists within and outside of the church. During the month of the Rosary in October let us begin and continue praying the Most Holy Rosary.
