From the Desk of Fr. Dan

T. S. Eliot wrote a beautiful poem in 1927 about the "Journey of the Magi." Amid the chaos of Europe after the First World War and amid the massive shifts of political structures in Europe he chose to write about the visit of these wisdom figures (kings or wise men by tradition) to the homeless infant Jesus and his family. According to Matthew's Gospel, these wisdom figures traveled from the grand palaces of highly developed cities and states to visit an abandoned garage in Bethlehem, a backwater town. Eliot's poem plays on this contrast, on the difficulties of travel, and on the absurdity of this voyage from the perspective of the others in the group who did not share the wisdom of these Magi.

At the end of the poem Eliot contrasts the idea of death and birth:

...were we led all that way for
Birth or Death? There was a Birth, certainly
We had evidence and no doubt. I had seen birth and death,
But had thought they were different; this Birth was
Hard and bitter agony for us, like Death, our death.

I am struck by the resonance with Dostoevsky's understanding of love as a "harsh and dreadful thing." This birth celebrated in Christmas is a joyous event, but it is not without pain, hard and bitter agony. This is true of the birth of an actual child, but it is also true of the spiritual new birth we are invited to in Christmas. In realizing God's profound love for us in the middle of our messiness, we are invited to the hard and bitter agony of realizing that we are loved. In realizing this we must let go of those obstacles to God's love. We are invited to let go of the security that comes with comfortable fears and resentments. Eliot continues:

We returned to our places, these Kingdoms,
But no longer at ease here, in the old dispensation,
With an alien people clutching their gods.
I should be glad of another death.

As we celebrate the feast of the epiphany, of what false gods must we let go? Where is God's love inviting us to new freedoms and deeper love of all of God's people? How is God inviting us to the liberation of joy, the liberation of knowing God's love in all we encounter? In this new year, where is God inviting us into the uncomfortable, uneasy awkwardness of falling into God?

Turn over a new leaf for a greener 2019. Small changes yield big results. Some suggestions to get you started ...

- BRING YOUR OWN BOTTLE Your own reusable water bottle filled with NYC tap water keeps plastic bottles out of the landfill.
- **BAN THE BAGS** Carry your own reusable shopping bag and reduce the volume of plastic choking our oceans, and littering our streets.
- Move Beef to the Margins Make your next burger a Portobello, Turkey or Veggie burger. By choosing fish, chicken or a meatless meal instead of beef, you will be doing the environment (and your heart) a favor. Cattle feedlots contribute to deforestation and methane gas from livestock leaves a huge carbon imprint.
- **SWITCH TO CLEAN ENERGY** You can make a big impact on the environment by switching to clean energy. Three clean energy providers the Environmental Ministry likes: OnForce, CleanChoice Energy, Green Mountain Energy.
- ENJOY CREATION Walk down the Heilbrunn Cosmic Pathway at the American Museum of Natural History, and while you are there, take in the exhibit on Climate Change in the Gottesman Hall of Planet Earth.
