From the desk of Fr. Dan

This weekend in the readings we read the familiar admonition

"Why do you notice the splinter in another's eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own?" (LK 6:41)

This calls out the most dangerous temptation among prophetic communities like our own. It has focused my prayer on the areas in which our community needs to grow: attention to our participation in structures of racism and able-ism. I have been asking myself: How is our community being invited to greater understanding of God in whose image we are all created?

As I write this we are remembering the seventh anniversary of the killing of Trayvon Martin, a young unarmed African American student who was shot and whose murderer was not convicted. This was one of the episodes that began the prophetic work of #BlackLivesMatter.

In her article "What Black Lives Matter Can Teach Catholics about Racial Justice" in the Feb. 1, 2019 issue of America Magazine, Olga Segura speaks about the outstanding work of Catholic activists in the past who have been in the center of the most important social movements of the 20th century. However, she also points to the reluctance and failure of the Church to address the structural sin of racism in the US. How are we being called to address the structures of racism in our own parish community?

As a Lenten prayer tool, I would also invite you to check a video of a Song called "Several Last Words of the Unarmed" by the University of Michigan Men's Glee Club available on line. It is a powerful and haunting use of the final statements of unarmed individuals who were killed on our streets. It is a distinct reminder of the meditation on the Seven Last words of Christ, a traditional Catholic prayer tool in Lent and Holy Week.

This weekend we are also holding a workshop that will address the sin of prejudice against people with disabilities. It is not a matter of welcoming people with disabilities. It is a matter of creating a culture of belonging for all people. We are blessed with a wide range of abilities in our parish community. How do we be certain that all belong and are valued?

This Lent, I would invite us to a deeper sense of transformation. In Lent we are to strip away all that interferes with our ever-deeper relationship with God. What do we need to strip away for our longing for God to be as great as God's longing for us? Our longing for God cannot be complete if we fail to recognize the image of God in all our neighbors regardless of race or ability level.

It is good and important that we, as a Xavier community, are prophetic in our welcome. There is much that we do well, and that serves as a prophetic call to reform the sinful structures of the larger Church. However, let us not allow that to become complacency. We as a Church, and as a parish need to be better at creating a community of belonging. We need to address the structures of racism in our parish. We need to address the structures of ableism in our parish. Let us use this penitential time of Lent to strip away the structures of sin in our own community so that we might not be accused of hypocrisy in calling out the structures of sin in the larger Church and society.
