From the Pastor's Desk

This weekend we celebrate the thirty-second week of ordinary time. There are three more weeks in the liturgical year and the tone of the readings will become more apocalyptic, asking us to reflect on the final judgement.

Today, we reflect on our belief in the resurrection of the dead, an appropriate follow-up to the celebrations of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day last weekend. We believe that death is not the final end to our existence and that we will be reunited with our loved ones in the resurrection of the dead.

Belief in the resurrection was controversial at the time of Jesus and fiercely debated by the Pharisees and the Sadducees. In fact, in the Jewish tradition, belief in the resurrection really only emerged about two hundred years before Jesus. The Book of Maccabees was accepted into the Church's canon of inspired books because of its testimony to belief in the resurrection as we hear in today's reading.

The back story to the Maccabean revolt has some application to our present day. The Jewish people had been restored to Jerusalem and allowed to practice their religion after the period of exile through the benign rule of the Kings of Persia, Cyrus and Darius. When the Macedonians under Alexander the Great conquered the Persian empire, they continued the policy of toleration. When Alexander was about to die, he divided his kingdom among his trusted lieutenants. Antiochus was given a portion and proceeded to raise an army and conquer Egypt and then Israel. Besides plundering the gold of the Temple, he issued decrees demanding that all people abandon their religion and offer sacrifices to his gods.

The two books of Maccabees recount the revolt which was ultimately unsuccessful. Toleration came with the Roman conquest.

Our faith and the ability to practice it is not under such dire and violent persecution in this country these days although there are many parts of the world where our Christian sisters and brothers suffer greatly. The challenges we confront on a daily basis are pervasive secularism which treats religious belief and practice with contempt and scorn and consumerism which tells us we need more of everything to achieve happiness even if it means exploiting others through unfair labor practices.

The list of issues crying out for justice seems never ending and, while we do a great deal to address many of them here in our parish community, the demands exceed out capacity to address them.

That's when we place our trust in God as the Maccabees and their followers did. Standing up for our beliefs as fearlessly as we can while knowing that, ultimately, salvation comes from our gracious and loving God, the God of the living and the dead.

The Maccabees stood up for their belief and, in defeat, proclaimed their trust in God. In these days when we may be discouraged, we press on, striving to work for justice, making a difference where we can, and turning our cares over to the God of all mercy. Our faith gives us perseverance in the struggle for justice for all.


