From the Pastor's Desk

The Feast of Corpus Christi is an especially Catholic feast celebrating, as it does, our belief in the actual presence of Christ in the Eucharist, the Body of Christ. In different times and places, the feast would be the occasion for a great procession through the neighborhood around the local church, the faithful following the monstrance containing the host with prayers and chants of praise. It would conclude back in the church with incense and benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

This popular devotion was a sign of genuine piety and brought the local Catholic community together. This year's celebration is stripped of all of the externals, the tangibles. We still cannot gather together to celebrate the Eucharist in person. We still cannot physically receive the Body and Blood of Christ. We have been fasting. Fasting and praying.

For most of us, this time of fasting has heightened our awareness of the gift of the community of faith we form, the gift of the real presence of Christ when we gather together in prayer and praise. We hunger to be back. We long to reconnect. Virtual masses and spiritual communion, though helpful, are not satisfying. Not the real thing.

In the Eucharist, we receive the Body and Blood of Christ and we become the Body of Christ as church, as a people of faith. We are united as sisters and brothers. All are welcome.

As a community of faith, as the Body of Christ, we are wounded when any of us is wounded. We are diminished when anyone dies but, most especially, when one dies senselessly as a victim of violence. We are shocked and appalled when that violence comes from those sworn to protect and defend us.

Over these last two weeks, we have struggled to find an appropriate response that expresses solidarity with the legitimate protests in our streets. We have organized a prayer service last Saturday and will have another one Sunday afternoon at 1:30pm. A group that had been in conversation with the parish of St. Charles Borromeo and St Francis De Sales over issues of racial justice and white supremacy has reconnected and will be planning to help us all work for reconciliation. We have united around a Pledge for Racial Justice. Different ministries within our parish have issued their own statement to join their voice to that of so many in righteous indignation and a call to reform.

In the midst of this, we have a moment of grace. After our ministries retreat in February, we invited each of the ministries to reflect on their experience of bias as the object of it and their own bias toward others. We are all sinners. Graced and forgiven sinners but sinners nonetheless. Our national sin is racism, which has supported the privileged at the expense of the oppressed. This sin has tainted all of us and we have the opportunity to do an Ignatian Examen, an examination of conscience and consciousness with the lens of racism and white privilege. It will not be easy, nor will it be comfortable, but conversion never is.

For the foreseeable future, we will develop programs to help us move from examination to conversion to reconciliation. Together we will work to bring about effective change in our hearts, our church and our world. Let us be guided by the Spirit of Pentecost, nurtured by the Body of Christ to respond to the current tragedies with grace and courage to make a new "normal," a normal when all will recognize the dignity of each as a beloved child of God.

Retelling: the focus person describes how they might re-author their narrative in light of listeners' responses (up to 4 minutes);

XAVIER MISSION STATEMENT

Xavier Mission watched in horror and outrage as George Floyd endured nearly nine minutes of torture before his life was snatched away from him. It is profoundly disturbing and shameful that it has taken so long for our collective consciousness to be awakened to the vile realities of racism and police brutality in our country, and to be spurred to action. The knee of America has been pressing down on the necks of black people for centuries, and we stand in solidarity with our brothers and sisters in demanding that they be allowed to breathe.

Xavier Mission recognizes that each one of us has a story, and that every story deserves and needs to be heard. Creating lasting, meaningful, systemic change requires that we get to know each other. It's much harder to kneel on someone's neck, or call the police on a person just going about their life, when you actually know who they are. George Floyd's story was abruptly ended, in many ways before it had begun. The world has borne witness to what happened to Mr. Floyd. Let us bear witness to who he was as a human being.

George Floyd was a big brother. A beloved friend. A father to a six-year-old daughter. He was a man who loved and needed his mother, right down to the very last seconds of his life. Mr. Floyd wasn't perfect. He made mistakes. He struggled with addiction and spent time in prison. But he was given an opportunity to change, and was trying to make the most of it. After he was released from prison, he moved to Minneapolis to escape his tough surroundings and get a fresh start. He found an organization called Turning Point that helped him find a job. Mr. Floyd dreamt of opening a restaurant called 'Convict Kitchen' with his girlfriend. They planned to staff it with exprison inmates — to give formerly incarcerated people such as himself a second chance – and use food available at prison commissaries to make gourmet meals. George Floyd had hopes and dreams. He had people he loved, and people who loved him. His life was valuable, and had meaning. His life mattered.
