

Weekly Message



Gospel Meditation

Encouraging Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Pope St. John Paul II rightly taught, "To believe in Jesus is to accept what he says, even when it runs contrary to what others are saying. It means rejecting the lure of sin, however attractive it may be, in order to set out on a difficult path of Gospel virtues." Acceptance, rejection, suffering, betrayal, fear, reluctance, persecution, and painful, undeserved and unjust death are all played out in dramatic fashion today. Jesus spoke of God's unconditional love, mercy, and forgiveness. Who doesn't like hearing about love, especially God's? Jesus did not have backs turned on him, face intense suffering, and succumb to a horrific death because he spoke of God's love. All of those things occurred because of the implications of actually believing in God's love.



God's love comes with an intimate and equal bond with love of neighbor. This moves the believer outward to truly see their brothers and sisters as equals and compels them to work for a world that mirrors God's kingdom: a world based on justice, peace, mercy, and forgiveness. Sometimes, people want to keep God's love to themselves and use it solely for their own benefit. When they only want to use God's love to justify their own intentions and for their own projects, problems occur.

Sin makes something hurtful, destructive, and self-serving look very attractive and justifiable. The lure of sin creates friends who begin to believe the lie that the sin expounds. This is what happened on Calvary. When you begin actually doing what Jesus is saying and translate love into action, it inevitably will upset popular and longstanding conventions and structures. Many of these serve to protect status, foster personal gain and success, and further divide those who have from those who do not. Most people who hear the Gospel are attracted to what they hear, at first. When they realize that it means standing apart from popular opinion, even if that opinion is against the Gospel and sinful, they cower back in fear and join the throngs shouting, "Crucify him!" There is an ambivalence found in many believers as they struggle with whether their belief is strong enough "to set out on the difficult path of Gospel virtues."

It takes a lot of courage to admit that the system is broken. It takes even more courage to point out the sin. And it takes an unbreakable love of God to then accept the consequences of doing so. ©LPI



Lenten Disciplines of Fasting & Abstinence

Catholics in good health ages 18 to 59 are required to fast and to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Fasting consists of eating only one meal, with the possibility of two smaller snacks that do not add up to a single full meal.

Catholics age 14 and older are to abstain from meat on all Fridays in Lent.

Adult Faith Formation

In the Gospel reading at the beginning of the Palm Sunday service, put yourself in Luke's version of Jesus riding into Jerusalem: Jesus was preceded by people like you throwing their cloaks on the road in honor. Those around you are proclaiming *praise aloud with joy for all the mighty deeds they had seen*. You look nervously around, because in Roman-occupied Jerusalem, this scene could easily be shut down with force by Roman soldiers. The Pharisees are nervous and caution Jesus to rebuke His disciples. Jesus' response speaks volumes: *"I tell you, if they keep silent, the stones will cry out!"*

The stone reference is from the book of the prophet Habakkuk 2:11: In a vision directed against rich and powerful tyrants who built their homes and cities on bloodshed and injustice, and who try to remove themselves from the consequences of their behavior, God says, 'the stone in the wall shall cry out and the beam in the frame shall answer' about their wickedness. So too here. If those who are willing to *give all that they have to follow Jesus* are silenced, the created world itself will shout out in witness of Jesus' kingship and the justice it will bring. Praise God! (Source: Liturgy Training Publications).



Draw near to Jesus by putting yourself into the scenes of the readings over the next week. From the joyful entrance into Jerusalem to the moment His body is laid in a rock-hewn tomb, be present to every moment. And let's not be silent: invite someone to come with you to one of the Holy Week services or Easter Sunday, phone a friend and tell them how God is working in your life and tell them how you see God in them in your life. *If you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.* (Romans 10)

Faith Formation

I have a great love for stories. I always have. I love epic stories where good defeats evil and the hero is willing to take risks and sacrifice for the sake of those s/he loves. And, if I am being extremely vulnerable with all of you, part of me dreams of writing the next Lord of the Rings or Harry Potter type of novel. The one that endures and resonates with each and every generation. In a way, **I long to be a part of a great story.**

However, **every time I receive the Eucharist, I should be reminded that I am a part of the greatest story ever told.**

We have been grafted into the family tree of not just anyone, but of God - bringing us into His story.

And His is an epic story!

His story speaks of a beauty that was inscribed into who we are and who we were meant to be. It shows us the length that Jesus was willing to traverse to rescue each of us from the bondage of sin, shame and evil. This story brings life to the dead, and transformation from sinners to saints.

His story tells us that there is more love in a single drop of His blood than the whole world, for all generations - past, present and future - could hope to contain. And **His desire to be with us culminates with His humility to become our food.**

In science, when we talk of the food chain, the prey is considered lower than the predator. And then Jesus becomes our literal (and not symbolic) food. **He through whom all creation has come into being, is now becoming His creature's food.**

Every time we receive the Eucharist, the greatest story ever written or thought of is etched into our lives. We are given the opportunity to enter into a life changing encounter that formed the hearts of two millennia of saints. Each one an irreplaceable, eternal soul revealing the face of God. Many transformed those around them... some changed the world. **We are invited to take part in THAT story. It's the story of the ages and for the ages... and it's our story, too.**

Venerable Archbishop Fulton Sheen, unlikely winner of a Primetime Emmy Award, once said, **"The greatest love story of all time is contained in a tiny white Host."** This tiny white Host carries within it the God of the Universe who has stopped at nothing to be one with us. There is nothing we can do other than open our hearts and lives up to Him. *We cannot earn this... we can only receive it.*



And our lives then become a reflection of that yes... that love. We become what we eat... or at least we become more like what we eat. We are brought into Jesus.

And may we become ever more like Him.

Communion For The Homebound


Since COVID began we have had an increase in the number of parishioners taking communion to the homebound and we applaud everyone for helping with this ministry. Being able to receive the Eucharist when we are incapable of being in Church or when we have health issues brings joy and community to all involved. There are, however, rules we must follow when distributing the Eucharist outside of Mass. I ask that all who participate in this ministry follow the Church procedures so we do not violate Church law.

First, please request from the parish or purchase an approved pyx that either a deacon or a priest can bless for you (required). Be sure you take the Eucharist directly to the recipients as soon as possible after leaving the Church and do not leave the Eucharist outside of your possession at any time. When you carry the Eucharist please be reverent and do not engage in any activity that would be inappropriate or disrespectful. Please clean and consume all fragments of the Eucharist within the pyx immediately after communion has been delivered and remember **never** can you take the Eucharist overnight.



When giving communion please recognize you are providing a very important ministry. Be considerate and respectful to all you with whom you come in contact. And lastly, begin with prayer and end with prayer as you deliver communion to the homebound.

We are grateful for your service as ministers of the Church to our separated sisters and brothers in our community. Remember they are always in our prayers and in our hearts until we can all meet again in person. Thank you, Deacon Joe Senglaub
