

Weekly Message



Since God created human beings, we have struggled to keep our focus on God. We wrestle with the question of "who is God" and foolishly believe some of God's job description can be better completed by us. We wander in different directions, lose our way, think that happiness can be found elsewhere and even construct golden calves to worship. Are we simply too independent or just blatantly stubborn? It's a good question to ask. Even with all of our silliness and distractions, God compassionately and patiently waits. He lets us assert our wills and knows that perhaps one day we will actually wake up and realize how lost we are.

"Since happiness is nothing other than the enjoyment of the highest good and since the highest good is above, no one can be made happy unless he rises above himself, not by an ascent of the body but of the heart. But we cannot rise above ourselves unless a higher power lifts us up ... Divine aid is available to those who seek it from their hearts, humbly and devoutly; and this means to sigh for it in this valley of tears, through fervent prayer (St. Bonaveture)." One of the biggest human struggles is discerning what, exactly, is the highest good. We are ordered to achieve it but if we pursue it with clouded vision, we will never truly find it.

One of the greatest obstacles to God's power and love is a stubborn, closed heart of stone. When we are fiercely determined to set our sights elsewhere for happiness or simply ride the popular currents of the day, we will never satisfy the deep ache and longing within. We know that ache well. It is precisely why we scurry all over the place, attempting to find the next best thing to take away its pain. Nothing in the created world ever can or will. We continue our journey. One day, people may wake up and realize that they are grazing in the wrong pasture and putting themselves in harm's way. When this awakening occurs, it will be a most joyous day as we will see God's wide-open arms waiting to receive us. "Lead me, Lord, in your path, and I will enter in your truth. Let my heart rejoice that it may fear your name (St. Bonaventure)." ©LPi

NATIONAL MIGRATION WEEK 2022 | SEPT. 19-25, 2022

Myth: undocumented immigrants could get green cards if they just tried.

A green card, known officially as a permanent resident card, is an identity document which shows that a person has permanent residency in the United States. Green card holders are formally known as lawful permanent residents (LPRs). It is a common misperception that undocumented immigrants could obtain green cards if they would just get in line and apply through the legal channels. But think about this: someone can marry a United States citizen, have no criminal record, be a wonderful father and husband, file taxes, be a very hard worker, a respected member of his or her community, and never have any contact with immigration. In spite of all those great attributes, many are still permanently ineligible to achieve legal immigration status based on being married to a United States citizen.

"Our friendship was fun, but it's gotten more fun! We experience even more happiness together since we started doing Heavenly Babies. It's more fun when you can share happiness with another person--your best friend or anyone!" says Jolie.

A few months ago, the girls were hanging out at Zoe's grandmother's home, when they noticed a large amount of plastic bags filled with baby clothes in the bedroom and grew curious. Janet Pangborn, Zoe's grandmother, explained that the bags were donations she makes to St. Paul's <u>Heavenly Babies</u> "Baby Shower in a Bag" ministry that provides baby items to new mothers in need. Pangborn, a St. Bruno parishioner, hands the completed bags off to her longtime friend, Susan Fine, a St. Paul parishioner and Heavenly Babies volunteer, who deposits both ladies' contributions in the St. Paul storeroom for distribution.

The girls were riddled with excitement and wanted to know if they could help. After Janet explained what the bags were for and what went in them, the two tenderhearted tweens jumped into action and begged Pangborn to let them help pack the next bundle of layettes. She agreed and once they got a taste of the fun that went into shopping, color-coordinating and packaging, the girls were hooked! They spent many hours this summer elbow-to-elbow with Janet and Susan assembling the newborn gift bags and since then, they've been a powerhouse!

Zoey and Jolie, two soon-to-be middle schoolers, had back-to-back birthdays in June. They made a plan and told their parents in lieu of birthday gifts this year, they just wanted donations—money or supplies—to donate to the Heavenly Babies ministry. No gifts for themselves, just baby clothing for the moms and babies who were starting out with nothing.



"I have everything I already wished for. I just wanted to be able to help fulfill other people's wishes, for them to be happy receiving a gift they wanted," said Zoey. "There's so many people who can't give their babies what they need or wish for."

The girls celebrated their birthdays together and their guests didn't bat an eye at fulfilling their selfless requests. Instead of receiving

personal gifts, the girls were showered with baby clothes, supplies and money to go shopping with. On August 1, Janet took the eager girls out for a day of Heavenly Babies shopping. The compassionate cart-pushers loaded up on pajamas, onesies and other baby must-haves, while careful to choose only

items that were on sale so they could stretch their birthday bucks as far as they could. The ladies hit up Ross, Target, TJ Maxx and a couple of local thrift stores. Upon finishing their successful hunt, they returned to Janet's home where they scattered their finds and began putting them in color-coordinated piles.

It took the duo no time to pack up nearly 60 bags—in all colors of the rainbow, each bag topped off with a soft, plush toy and a bedtime book. On Wednesday, August 3, Janet and Susan arranged for the girls to donate the bags in person to Jennifer Aldrich, Heavenly Babies Ministry leader, and Mary Kral, Director of Adult Faith Formation and Human Concerns. The girls visited St. Paul and learned where their bags go from here and who receives the bags. They got a tour of the Heavenly Babies storeroom and got to read thank you notes

from moms who had previously benefitted from the program.

The girls said they have no intentions of stopping their Heavenly Babies work, but if NBC's Lester Holt offered to host them on an episode of <u>Nightly Kids Edition</u>, they may have to excuse themselves briefly from their work. "We watched that show in school and it would be so cool to be on it and tell people about Heavenly Babies! That's our dream."

When asked for a bit of final advice, we asked them what they would say to other kids about volunteering.

Jolie: "A lot of kids think that helping others is too much work. Seeing people happy isn't work. Pack one bag if you can. One bag is more than no bags. Just do something, anything." Zoey: "Don't just think about it, do it. Lots of kids only want to do things they get paid for. We don't see this as a job. Just ask yourself, 'What can I do?' and you'll see there's lots of stuff."

It's hard to tell who was more excited about the heaping helping of love that the church was entrusted with to share —the Heavenly Babies ministry team or the girls. Their advice holds fast and true for people of all ages. We're all capable of doing *something*. Anything.

We're proud of these girls and their hearts to love others. We're proud of the young people who rise above the crowd to be the hands and feet of Jesus. Please keep them in your prayers.

We're thankful for parishioners like Susan and Janet and the teamwork they exemplify through their friendship. We love seeing our parishes work hand-in-hand to accomplish the missions laid out before them.

We appreciate all of you who give so selflessly of your time, prayers and prosperity. You are the light and love of God here on earth.


