

What does *amen* mean?

It is a word well-known but mostly misunderstood. My concern is that saying *amen* is, for many, so formulaic as to have become meaningless. We are so familiar with the word but do not wrestle with its radical implications. Many of us understand *amen* only to mean “the prayer is over,” as though it were a word we append to our prayers like a kind of liturgical punctuation. *Amen* originates from the Hebrew word *āmēn* (אָמֵן), transliterated into Greek (ἀμήν), passed on into Latin and then other languages like English. It is often untranslated, instead only transliterated, as it is difficult to capture its nuance in one English word. Dictionaries and lexicons go into great detail, but fundamentally, *amen* is used to *mark agreement*, to confirm what has been said before by way of response. The word *amen* is response-seeking and self-involving. When we pray and say *amen*, when we invoke God to act, at the same time we call upon ourselves to act with Him. We say “Yes!” to God’s invitation to partner with Him in bringing about the change we seek. And when we pray and say *amen* with others, the implication of the word is that we bind ourselves to one another and together commit to living in such a way that takes seriously this partnership we share with God.

When we say *amen* after we have cried out to

God that justice be accomplished around the world, we challenge ourselves to take responsibility to fight injustice in our own lives. When we say *amen* after we have interceded for governments and their leaders, we call upon ourselves to live as good citizens with all the responsibilities as well as privileges that involves. When we say *amen* after we have asked God to heal and bring wholeness to our sick friends, maybe we ought to visit them and offer to lay on hands and pray for them in person. If you say *amen* regularly, allow this reflection on the word’s meaning to unsettle you. It is not merely a word of liturgical punctuation; it contains a challenge, an invitation, to live in a new way, to truly partner with God and his people. Before you say *amen*, think about what you are saying, with what you are choosing to agree, and with whom you are choosing to involve yourself. *Amen* is a small word of profound significance.

Qué significa amén?

Es una palabra muy conocida pero sobre todo mal entendida. Mi preocupación es que decir amén es, para muchos, tan formulado que se ha vuelto sin sentido. Estamos tan familiarizados con la palabra pero no luchamos con sus implicaciones radicales. Muchos de nosotros entendemos que amén solo significa "la oración ha terminado", como si fuera una palabra que agregamos a nuestras oraciones como una especie de puntuación litúrgica. Amén se origina de la palabra hebrea *āmēn* (אָמֵן), transliterada al griego (*ἀμήν*), transmitida al latín y luego a otros idiomas como el inglés. A menudo no se traduce, sino que solo se translitera, ya que es difícil captar su matiz en una palabra en inglés. Los diccionarios y léxicos entran en gran detalle, pero fundamentalmente, amén se usa para marcar acuerdo, para confirmar lo que se ha dicho antes a modo de respuesta. La palabra amén es búsqueda de respuesta y participación propia. Cuando oramos y decimos amén, cuando invocamos a Dios para que actúe, al mismo tiempo nos llamamos a nosotros mismos a actuar con Él. Decimos "¡Sí!" a la invitación de Dios de asociarnos con Él para lograr el cambio que buscamos. Y cuando oramos y decimos amén con los demás, la implicación de la palabra es que nos unimos unos a otros y juntos nos comprometemos a vivir de tal manera que se tome en serio esta asociación que compartimos con Dios. Cuando decimos amén después de haber clamado a Dios que se haga justicia en todo el mundo, nos desafiamos a nosotros mismos a asumir la responsabilidad de luchar contra la injusticia en nuestras propias vidas. Cuando decimos amén después de haber intercedido por los gobiernos y sus líderes, nos exhortamos a nosotros mismos a vivir como buenos ciudadanos

con todas las responsabilidades y privilegios que esto implica. Cuando decimos amén después de haberle pedido a Dios que sane y traiga plenitud a nuestros amigos enfermos, tal vez deberíamos visitarlos y ofrecer imponerles las manos y orar por ellos en persona. Si dices amén regularmente, deja que esta reflexión sobre el significado de la palabra te inquiete. No es simplemente una palabra de puntuación litúrgica; contiene un desafío, una invitación, a vivir de una manera nueva, a asociarse verdaderamente con Dios y su pueblo. Antes de decir amén, piense en lo que está diciendo, con lo que está eligiendo estar de acuerdo y con quién está eligiendo involucrarse. Amén es una pequeña palabra de profundo significado.
