



Fr. Mike's Musings

In the minds and hearts of the Hebrew people, God's greatest gift to them is the Mosaic Law. The love and respect for this set of laws are unmatched anywhere in human history. To observe the law is to find the meaning of life, happiness, and true divine blessing.



The substance of the law is God's revealed teaching for of humanity. The original law is embodied within the Torah—the last five books of the Hebrew Bible, the Pentateuch. Within the Torah is

God's expressed will for His people. Through the centuries other commentaries and addendums to the law came into being and were applied to all facets of life in the Hebrew world.

Jesus comes along announcing, "I have come not to abolish the law but to fulfill it." (Matthew 5:17) This statements added a whole new set of directives to the already heft 970+ statutes of the Mosaic Law. While remaining respectful of the legal traditions of His people, Jesus invites His followers to go beyond the law. Jesus desires His listeners to observe and to be guided more by the spirit of the law rather than by its literal text. Evidence that God does not force His will on anyone.

God holds free will for everyone in high regard. But in choosing to obey the laws of one's faith and conscience will lead to a life of peace, harmony, and blessings. Not choosing to do this brings about restlessness and an unsurety of what to expect, if anything, in the life beyond this world.

The lesson we should take from our Gospel this week is to take note of the continuity between two legal models—the Law of Moses and the Law of Jesus Christ. This continuity instructs us that our living faith is not simply encompasses by the Ten Commandment, the Decalogue, but by our will to live beyond them in the model of Christ. Jesus desires us to examines our internal motives in all of decisions and actions and to ask God's guidance and grace when faced with indecisions or doubt. We are not only to avoid sin, but to structure out lives along the law and the message and example of Christ in the positive pursuit of good.

This is at the core of adhering to Christ and His fulfillment of the law. We continue a line of faith wrought by our Hebrew ancestors at the foot of Mt. Sinai, continued and expanded upon through the ministry of Jesus, and still calls us to obedience to the will of the One whose love for His people transcends all of human and cosmic existence. With this on our minds and in our hearts who could not feel the least bit privileged to know that we are the heirs of His eternal love and of the promise of eternal life.

Religious Education

This Sunday's Gospel Reflection:

"Do you promise to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, so help you God?" We've all seen court scenes where a bailiff asks a witness to place one hand on the Bible and the other hand in the air and take an oath of honesty. In some ways, it's a lot like Jesus' instructions for us in this week's Gospel. Imagine that you and your friends are g You dare your friend to take a basketba

Imagine that you and your friends are goofing around. You dare your friend to take a basketball out of your neighbor's yard. Your friend takes your dare, steals the item, and you both play with it at your friend's house. You hide it in your friend's garage.

The next day, your parents get a call from the neighbor saying their basketball is missing, and they saw you leaving their yard with a friend. They think you took it. When your parents ask you if you stole it, you say no you didn't. Technically, that is the truth. You didn't steal it; your friend did. In your head, you know that you are answering the question completely. However, in your heart you know that you are part of the theft, and by not saying any more, you are also part of a lie. That is what Jesus is talking about in this week's Gospel. The Ten Commandments instruct us not to kill. Jesus says that is not the complete message. Not only don't kill, but don't be violent. Not only don't be violent, but don't even think violent thoughts against one another.

The same is true of other commandments.

It is not enough to follow through by not stealing. We are not to be jealous of what others have. We are not to think about taking something that is not ours. We are to live honestly with both our heads and our hearts. Jesus asks us to live "the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth."

Questions of the week: Why do we need laws and rules? Why do laws sometimes change? Why does Jesus add to the Ten Commandments? What is a rule that you will try to follow this week?



Choices Beyond Choice

he most wonderful and yet the scariest thing about being human is our freedom of choice. Because we are free, we can love or hate, do good or evil, choose happiness or misery forever. Sirach says God has set before us "fire and water...life and death." What we choose will be given us.

Sirach says something else very significant: "If you choose, you can keep the commandments." God does not force anyone to sin. We can never say that we are so weak or wounded that we cannot love, that we cannot refuse to do evil.

But, as a truck going seventy miles an hour down-hill cannot be stopped immediately, habit or passion may make us, for all practical purposes, unable at a particular moment to avoid something we have set ourselves up to do. We can even be programmed because of abuses we have suffered to react to certain situations without thinking, without free choice. Fear can make us react automatically. This is not choosing evil and sin but rather suffering the effects of evil and sin.

What we can do, however, and must do to accept our humanity, is work toward freeing ourselves from the habits, conditioning and knee-jerk reactions which cause us to act in evil, self-destructive ways. There are, for example, Twelve Step Programs for addiction to alcohol, drugs and sex—and for woundedness caused by someone else's abuse of these. We must take care not to let our feelings of fear or

anger become so strong that they overwhelm us. We are responsible for doing everything we can to become free, to avoid letting ourselves get to the point where

we lose control.

Jesus, however, calls us to act in ways that are beyond human freedom, ways made possible for us only by God's grace. In the Sermon on the Mount, he changes the commandments from laws of good human behavior into laws for acting on God's level. It is no longer enough not to kill; we must love one another as God loves us. It is no longer enough to avoid adultery; we must see each other as God sees us: as

the Body of Christ and temples of the Holy Spirit. It is no longer enough not to lie; we must be as honest with each other as God is with us, realizing that our words, like God's words, are sacred because we are sacred.

Just as human choices depend on human understanding, divine choices depend on divine understanding. We humans choose freely only when we choose on the basis of what

we understand—normally, on the basis of reason. But when we have become divine by grace, by sharing in the life of God, we understand not by human reason

alone but by the light of faith. A fully alive faith shares in God's own act of knowing; we can have such knowledge only by sharing in God's own life by grace. The same gift of grace which enables us to see by the power of God's light allows us to choose through the power of God's love. In this way the gift of grace, sharing in the divine life of God, empowers us to live on the level of God. Acting on God's level is the morality taught by Jesus, beginning with the Sermon on the Mount.

Saint Paul presumes all this when he speaks of the "wisdom" he expects to find only in the spiritually mature. The ideals, the values, the attitudes which Paul preaches as the teaching of Jesus are simply beyond the range of natural understanding. The "wisdom of this world" regards them as plain foolishness, absurd. And that gives us a new choice: to follow the wisdom of the world or the wisdom of the cross, darkness or light, death or life. What we choose will be given us.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Sixth Week of the Year

Pray daily: Lord, you came to give us life, life to the full. Inspire and strengthen us to take responsibility for the choices that give shape to our souls. Direct us by your love in all that we choose to be and to do. Amen.

Monday: Mark 8:11-13. Jesus sighed from the depth of his spirit and said, "Why does this generation ask for a sign? Truly I tell you, no sign will be given to this generation." What greater sign can there be of God's grace to you than your choices?

Tuesday: Mark 8:14-21. Jesus said, "Watch out-beware of the yeast of the Pharisees..." Clinging to legalism as the Pharisees did is a way of escaping the responsibility of choices by blindly obeying the letter of the law. Do you do this at times?

Wednesday: Mark 8:22-26. Jesus laid his hands on the blind man and asked, "Can you see anything?" The man replied, "I can see people, but they look like trees, walking." When Jesus laid hands on the man's eyes

again, the man saw clearly. What kind of encounter with Christ will help you see clearly when you make choices? How do you seek this encounter?

Thursday: Mark 8:27-33. Jesus asked his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" After they offered various answers, he asked them, "But who do you say that I am?" How have you personally chosen to interact with Jesus? Who, what is he for you?

Friday: Mark 8:34-9:1. Jesus called the crowd and his disciples and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me." The key question is, do you really want to follow Jesus? How closely? How much is it worth to you?

Saturday: Mark 9:2-13. Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here." Have you ever explicitly said to yourself, "It is good that I am in the Church!"? Can you say it now?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: Describe in one sentence why you choose to follow Jesus.

As Disciple: Write down what helps people recognize that you are not a believer in name only but rather are a disciple, a student, of the teachings of Jesus Christ.

As Prophet: Each day this week make one choice which is based not just on the Ten Commandments, on what is right or wrong, but on some more generous and demanding ideal taught by Jesus.

As Priest: Perform some daily act of kindness for someone else, a conscious act of expressing the healing, helping love of Jesus who is within you, acting through you.

As King: Reconsider some rule or policy you obey but do not feel comfortable about. Accept responsibility for deciding whether this rule or policy reflects the highest ideals of Jesus. Discuss the situation with someone you consider wise.

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






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
