

#### Fr. Mike's Musings

#### The Eucharist: Part II

The Church has always believed in the Eucharist. You can find clear teaching on the Eucharist in the Bible and in the early Church Fathers. Even so, the Church's understanding of how the bread and wine become Jesus' Body and Blood has developed over time. Thomas Aquinas, using categories from Aristotle, developed the term transubstantiation to describe this change.

Everything has a substance, what it is in its nature and essence, and accidents, the traits that go along with it. A human being has a substance: you are the same person as an embryo, a toddler, a teenager, and an elderly person. Yet your accidents change: you grow, increase in understanding, cut your hair, develop wrinkles, etc. At the age of 80, no one might be able to recognize you as the same person you were at 18, but you are the same person.

Bread and wine have a substance, that makes them bread and wine. It also has accidents: the taste, touch, smell, and sight of bread and wine. When the priest consecrates the Eucharist, the accidents of the bread and wine remain the same (with rare exceptions occurring in Eucharistic miracles). Yet the substance of the bread and wine have been transformed into the substance of Jesus Christ, in His Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity.

Thomas Aquinas describes this in a spiritual sense by saying that in the Eucharist, all of our senses are deceived except for hearing. We see, touch, taste, and smell bread and wine, but we hear the words of Christ telling us the truth of his presence in the Eucharist.

So, we have a physical and spiritual explanation of what constitutes the being of the Eucharistic matter in our world, but it still leaves us to wonder about terminology Why is the Eucharist sometimes called Communion? Essentially, the Eucharist augments our union with Christ; we are joined in a union with Christ and his Church through the Eucharist.

Also, Holy Communion separates us from sin, wipes away venial sins, and preserves us from future mortal sins. Sometimes people feel a deep sense of peace when they receive the Eucharist. This is a gift from God, too. However, a lack of emotion when you receive the Eucharist does not mean that you are doing something wrong or that you are not receiving the fruits of Holy Communion. Because the Eucharist is so important, the Church teaches that there are certain requirements someone must meet to be able to receive the Eucharist at Mass.

- The person must be baptized Catholic (Eastern Orthodox are also allowed to receive).
- The person must be in a state of grace and has been through the Sacrament of Reconciliation (i.e. not be aware of any unconfessed mortal sins).
- The person must have fasted for at least one hour before receiving the Eucharist.
   Drinking water is okay, but for anything else to be acceptable, it must be medically necessary.

The Eucharist is a great gift that allows us an unparalleled union with Jesus Christ. However, another element of the communion in the Eucharist is communion with the Church. When we receive the Eucharist, we are saying, "I am in communion with the Church that has been entrusted with this Eucharist."



The Risen Jesus promises Mary, Martha, Lazarus, and all of us who believe in him that he will give us life with God forever. Jesus says, "I am the Resurrection and the life." Like Jesus' friend Martha, we believe lesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, the one who has come into the world.

# "Lord, If You Had Been Here ..."

There Jesus is, there life is; where he is not, sin has power to wound and to kill. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." How many people can say today: "Lord, if you had been here, the war that killed my brother would never have happened; the driver who killed my sister would not have been drinking; the hunger and disease that kill children every day would not have been ignored"? How many deaths are due to human cruelty? When we exclude God from our world, from our thoughts and our decision-making processes, we invite selfishness, cruel indifference, destructive greed and violence.

It is not just physical death we are talking about. How many times can we say, "Lord, if you had been here, if you had been speaking through these people, acting in this community, our brothers and our sisters would not have turned away from love or given up

hope. They would not have lost faith in themselves, in other people, in the Church, in God. Something in them would not have died."

Jesus is "the resurrection and the life." But he is this not only in himself but also in his Body on earth. He acts through us. The woundedness we see around us need not "lead to death." We can respond to sin and to sickness of heart in such a way that "the Son of God may be glorified." Jesus' risen pres-

ence in the world can be revealed and his power made manifest through the life-giving, healing love we show to all in need—to victims and violators alike.

When Jesus said, "Let us go to Lazarus," the apostle Thomas said, "Let us also go, that we may die with

him." Thomas spoke as a prophet; Jesus indeed gave life to the world by dying. And we can give life only if we die with him in order that others may live. The dying we must accept is giving our flesh for the life of the world as Jesus did. And this means to give expression in the flesh to truth, to hope, to love.

Jesus came as the Word made flesh. He was the truth of God expressed visibly on earth. In his teach-

ing God's words were "made flesh" in the physical sounds of his voice. In his life-style the values of God were literally embodied. He was killed for bearing witness to the truth. And on the cross, more important than the pain he suffered was the love he expressed through it.

To express ourselves is to be vulnerable. We are afraid to drop all the masks we hide behind, to be ourselves, to reveal ourselves,

to express ourselves. Just as we use clothes to hide our bodies, we often use our bodies to hide our emotions and thoughts. We don't want the "word" of our souls to be "made flesh" in nakedness, even to give life to those around us.

We can give life only if we die with Jesus in order that others may live.

This is what our baptismal priesthood is all about: We were anointed at Baptism to share in the priesthood of Jesus. But a priest has no function except as a minister within a community. To accept our baptismal consecration as priests is to accept our role of active ministry in the community of the Church. And this means giving expression to the truth and love within us by grace. Saint Paul writes, "You are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you." God is revealed through our words and actions so that no one will ever have to say, "Lord, if you had been here...." Every member of Christ has "the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good" (see 1 Corinthians 12:7). This is the fulfillment of God's promise made to Ezekiel, "I am going to open your graves, and bring you up from your graves.... I will put my spirit in you, and you shall live." When we surrender ourselves to let God express his truth, his love through us, Jesus can empower us as a community of priests to "roll away the stone" that keeps others in their tombs, and can say to us, "Unbind them and let them go free."

### REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

#### Fifth Week of Lent

**Pray daily:** Father, help us to be like Christ your Son, who loved the world and died for our salvation. Inspire us by his love and guide us by his example. Amen.

Monday: John 8:1-11. "The scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman who had been caught in adultery... making her stand before all of them." People are frequently exposed in their sinfulness. Are you ready to "stand before" your friends expressing your faith? Do you respond and sing at liturgy? Do you express your faith at work, home and in your social life?

**Tuesday:** John 8:21-30. Jesus said, "[T]he one who sent me is true, and I declare to the world what I have heard from him." Are you willing to tell the world that what you have learned from Jesus in the Church is true? How do you feel when unpopular truths are criticized? To whom are you sent to speak about Jesus?

**Wednesday:** John 8:31-42. Jesus said, "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free." Are you confident that you can make people free by sharing with them Jesus' teaching? Do you do it?

**Thursday:** John 8:51-59. Jesus said, "I know [the Father], and if I would say that I do not know him, I would be a liar like you. But I do know him and I keep his word." How do you show publicly your love for the Father, for Jesus, for Mary? Are you willing to share your experiences of God? With whom?

**Friday:** John 10:31-42. Many came to Jesus and said, "John performed no sign, but everything that John said about this man was true." Do you realize and accept the power you have to bring others to Jesus through the witness of your own faith and life-style? What do people see in your life that indicates that you take Jesus and your faith seriously?

**Saturday:** John 11:45-57. Caiaphas, the high priest, said, "[I]t is better...to have one man die for the people than to have the whole nation destroyed." Is it better that you should suffer for speaking the truth, or that little by little, through everyone's silence, whole nation or culture should accept many falsehoods, prejudices and wrong values?

### SEVERAL SUGGESTIONS FOR LENT

**Prayer:** Try praying with someone this week—at home, at work, on a date—anything from just saying the Our Father together or talking over a Scripture passage.

**Fasting:** Is there anything in your life you could stop doing (or stop not doing!) just because it doesn't express your real values and beliefs?

**Almsgiving:** How could you give someone a gift out of the riches of your faith and religion? What do you have as a Catholic that others may not have but might like to know about? How can you make a gift to others by expressing your devotion in liturgy?
