

Fr. Mike's Musings

This week we begin the final leg of our Lenten journey toward welcoming the Risen Christ at the Easter celebration. This is 'Palm/Passion Sunday' where we recall the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem at the beginning of the Jewish Passover. Being an observant Jew, Jesus delegates some of His disciples to go a find a suitable place where they can celebrate the Passover seder (meal). It is at this "Last Supper" that we have the Lord instituting the sacrament that serves as the source and summit of our Catholic faith. Also, at this meal are sown the seeds of future



dissention in the Christian community, a divide that centers on this very sacrament. Is it Christ really present among us in the accidental guise of bread and wine, miraculously transformed into His Body and Blood? Or is it merely a symbolic remembrance of an historical act?

For someone who is not in union with the Catholic Church, receiving the Eucharist would be a conscientiously false. Likewise, Catholics should not receive communion at Protestant churches. Partaking in the Sacrament of the Eucharist is truly a blessing and an important part of a person's life. In fact, the First Holy Communion of a Catholic person is a huge occasion and milestone. It is essentially the time that we are receiving the Body and Blood of Christ.

The form for the Eucharist is when the priest repeats the words of Jesus saying: "This is my Body..." and "This is my Blood...." And now the matter is no longer wheat bread and grape wine.

There are two stumbling blocks for Christians; the Eucharist and the Cross. These are the same mysteries that have been a cause of division for centuries. The Catechism of the Catholic Church notes:

"The first announcement of the Eucharist divided the disciples, just as the announcement of the Passion scandalized them: "This is a hard saying; who can listen to it?" The Eucharist and the Cross are stumbling blocks. It is the same mystery, and it never ceases to be an occasion of division. "Will you also go away?": the Lord's question echoes through the ages, as a loving invitation to discover that only He has "the words of eternal life" and that to receive in faith the gift of His Eucharist is to receive the Lord Himself." (1336)

Catholicism has been sometimes described as a very materialistic religion. This is because Catholics take created reality seriously. Karl Rahner, S.J., once called Catholic Christians "the most sublime of materialists" because they "neither can nor should conceive of any ultimate fullness of the spirit and of reality without thinking too of matter enduring as well in a state of final perfection." Far from being concerned with a narrow, spiritualized understanding of salvation, about "getting saved," Catholics see grace everywhere, disclosed in nature, symbols, stories, and persons.

One of the documents of Vatican II, 'Presbyterorum Ordinis' (Decree on the Ministry and Life of Priests) addresses the so-called "materialism" inherent in the Sacrament of the Eucharist.

"The other sacraments, as well as with every ministry of the Church and every work of the apostolate, are tied together with the Eucharist and are directed toward it. The Most Blessed Eucharist contains the entire spiritual boon of the Church, that is, Christ himself, our Pasch and living bread, by the action of the Holy Spirit through his very flesh vital and vitalizing, giving life to men who are thus invited and encouraged to offer themselves, their labors and all created things together with him. In this light the Eucharist shows itself as the source and apex of the whole work of the preaching of the Gospel."

The great classic works of Catholic theologians and artists tend to emphasize the presence of God in the world, while the classic works of Protestant theologians tend to emphasize the absence of God from the world. Catholics tend to stress the immanence of God, Protestants God's transcendence. Created reality is itself sacramental, revealing the presence of God, hinted at in a forest of metaphors and lurking in human love. Catholicism sees the body as holy. It honors the Sacred Heart of Jesus, His virgin mother Mary, and her chaste spouse Joseph.

Most of all, the Church draws life from the Body and Blood of Jesus, present in the Sacrament of the Eucharist. The Eucharist has long been the center of Catholic life, uniting His disciples through his body for the life of the world. As Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI said, "The Church is the celebration of the Eucharist; the Eucharist is the Church; they do not simply stand side by side; they are one and the same."

Palm Sunday ~ April 2

Holy Day of Obligation ~ Palm Sunday is the final Sunday of Lent, the beginning of Holy Week, and commemorates the triumphant arrival of Christ in Jerusalem, days before he was crucified. Palm Sunday is known as such because the faithful will often receive palm fronds which they use to participate in the reenactment of Christ's arrival in Jerusalem. In the Gospels, Jesus entered Jerusalem riding a young donkey, and to the lavish praise of the townspeople who threw clothes, or possibly palms or small branches, in front of him as a sign of homage.

An Unassuming Triumph

The key word in Matthew's report of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem is *praus*, which is translated as "meek," "humble" or "without display." Jesus' entry is seen as the fulfillment of Zechariah's prophecy: "Lo, your king comes to you;/ ...humble [*praus*], and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey." This text includes the king among the "lowly," the poor in spirit "whose poverty did not allow them the arrogance and assertiveness of the wealthy but imposed habitual and servile deference." The way Jesus chose to enter Jerusalem proclaimed him as one of these; "This was the only type of Messianic claim Jesus would publicly profess—the claim to be the Messiah who was one of the lowly" (*Jerome Biblical Commentary*, Prentice-Hall, 1968, 30:43, 142).

The description of Jesus as humble or lowly is very important because this entry into Jerusalem was the only triumphal entry that Jesus, the Son of David,

would ever make into David's city. Perhaps Jesus' disciples saw this entry as a preview of the triumphal procession they would have once he defeated all his enemies and took over the government as king. But this was all there would ever be. Jesus would never reign on earth as the Messiah-king they expected. And that is the whole point: He was born poor and lowly, would die poor and lowly and never intended to become any-

thing else. His Kingdom would be a reign established by no other power than the power of truth and love.

Jesus' entry into Jerusalem was in fact a victory parade. He entered as king to establish his reign. But he would triumph by being defeated; he would establish

his reign by dying; the only throne he would ever have on this earth was the cross. If we are going to join the crowd in shouting "Hosanna"—as we do at the *Sanctus* (Holy, Holy, Holy) of every Mass—we ought to know what kind of Messiah we are accepting. The only Messiah who comes "in the name of the Lord" intends to win by losing, to give life by dying, to conquer by lov-

ing and to reign by identifying himself with the poor and powerless.

This is not ancient history; this is now. Jesus still refuses to save the world with what we recognize as power. He still does not use divine force to wipe out disease, crime, poverty, oppression or error. He still tries to convert rather than to control. He still chooses to love instead of trying to look good. As a result, his Church and his followers

on earth make him look like a loser. Jesus still identifies himself not only with the powerless but also with sinners. He works through sinful people: popes, bishops, clergy and laity. He uses a Church which is still trying to understand the gospel after two thou-

sand years of learning by trial and error. Jesus works through human intelligence, teaching truth at a human pace to those who seek rather than impose truth on everyone with a blast of divine enlightenment. He works through human freedom, allowing evil to have its way until evildoers freely turn away from sin. Jesus respects human nature so much that the only way he will establish his reign on earth is through human beings freely cooperating with him, freely uniting themselves to him in mind, will and action.

At Baptism we were anointed as "kings" or sharers in the kingship of Christ through stewardship. We were consecrated to work with him to establish his life-giving reign over every area and activity of human life. But since Jesus chose to respect freedom rather than use force, to convert rather than control, the condition for working with him is a commitment to unconditional perseverance. We must keep trying to transform society, to renew human life on earth through love and powerlessness—regardless of visible results—while, as we say at Mass, "we wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ."

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Holy Week

Pray daily: Almighty Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, you sent your Son to be born of a woman and to die on a cross, so that through the obedience of one man estrangement might be dissolved for all. Guide our minds by his truth and strengthen our lives by the example of his death, that we may live in union with you in the kingdom of your promise. Amen.

Monday: John 12:1-11. Jesus said, "You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me." How do you find Jesus in prayer? In the poor?

Tuesday: John 13:21-33, 36-38. Jesus asked Peter, "Will you lay down your life for me? Very truly, I tell you, before the cock crows, you will have denied me

three times." When do you take risks because of faith and love for Christ?

Wednesday: Matthew 26:14-25. Jesus said, "The one who has dipped his hand into the bowl with me will betray me." In what ways do you express one thing in liturgy and something quite different at work or in your social life?

Holy Thursday: John 13:1-15. "And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God...poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel." Then Jesus said to the apostles, "If I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example...." Do you live your life in service to others-at home, at work, in social and civic life? Is your attitude always one of humble service, not wanting to be first, not asking to be served? Do you recognize and reverence Christ in other people as you do in the Eucharist?

Good Friday: John: 18:1-19:42. Jesus answered Pilate: "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth." How do you testify to the truth through your words and actions at home, at work, in your social and civic life? Is your witness changing things? Is it causing hostility?

SEVERAL SUGGESTIONS FOR LENT

Prayer: Try to spend Holy Week in greater reflection and quiet. Participate in the Easter Triduum services: Holy Thursday, Good Friday and the Easter Vigil.

Fasting: Think about Jesus' Passion, seeing his love expressed. Ask yourself, "What have I done for Christ? What am I doing for Christ? What will I do for Christ?"

Almsgiving: Ask what contribution you can make to improve conditions at home, at work, in your social life, in your city or country. How can you help bring people together into unity and peace according to Christ's desire? (See Ephesians 1:9-10.)
