

#### **Easter Sunday**

Easter Sunday, is the greatest of all Sundays, and Easter Time is the most important of all liturgical times. Easter is the celebration of the Lord's resurrection from the dead, culminating in his Ascension to the Father and sending of the Holy Spirit upon the Church. There are 50 days of Easter from the first Sunday to Pentecost. It is characterized, above all, by the joy of glorified life and the victory over death expressed most fully in the great resounding cry of the Christian: Alleluia! All faith flows from faith in the resurrection: "If Christ has not been raised, then empty is our preaching; empty, too, is your faith." (1 Cor 15:14) The word "Easter" comes from Old English, meaning simply the "East." The sun which rises in the East, bringing light, warmth, and hope, is a symbol for the Christian of the rising Christ, who is the true Light of the world. The Paschal Candle is a central symbol of this divine light, which is Christ. It is kept near the ambo throughout Easter Time and lit for all liturgical celebrations. #### Fr. Mike's Musings

Happy Easter! He is Risen! This week I'm going to take a little break from detailing the why's and wherefores of our shared Catholic faith so that we may all reflect on this glorious event in that faith, the very mo-



ment when we became new. New in faith, new in hope, and new in a charitable outlook for all of mankind. This of course is the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from death, the undeniable revelation of the promised Messiah to the world.

Christians believe that true life comes through death and that Jesu paid the price of suffering and dying with counting the cost. What is commemorated this week, beginning with Palm Sunday, is that just as Jesu passed from this life to eternal life, through His suffering and dying for us, we also hope to pass from this world into God's Kingdom by means of our own sufferings and physical death. Our Lord desires to return us to Himself. This is at the center of the 'Good News' of the Gospel message. God wants to be one with His children eternally.

The Gospel narrative is a simple faith-filled story of God hearing us and answering our pleas by sending His Son to show the world how much He truly cares. The secular world constantly tells us not to believe, gives examples time and again that we are not saved but condemned-wars, famine, hatred, disease, so on and so forth, assail our sensibilities daily. Instead of crying 'ALLELUIA!' we are more inclined to mutter; "My God, My God. Why have you forsaken me?"

However, when we awakened this morning, the great revelation of Easter was waiting in visage of the risen Christ, and the promise of a new world flooding our battered and weary hearts. We are presented with the same sight that the Apostles and Mary Magdalene saw that first Easter morning. Nothing else should capture us more this day but an overwhelming sense of joy. The joy of promises fulfilled, that our trust is God, in spite of the world's pessimism, is rewarded beyond measure. We can dispose of our cynical outlook and skeptical reasoning, toss-out our distrust of others and lack of love and forgiveness. Why? lesus Christ has risen for all to see. His promises to mankind are proven to be true. Sin and death can no longer hold us back from journeying to the full experience of eternal life with Our Father.

But the message of Easter is yet incomplete, and difficult. To fully receive and live the 'Good News' is to probe deep within our being and rid ourselves of any remnant of those things that hold us back, that keep us from transforming into a new creation through Christ. The Easter message requires us to renounce Satan's temptations that cause to separate ourselves from Christ and to reattach the chains of sin and death. Unless we do this, we deny the saving power of the Resurrection and cast ourselves back into the realm of doubt and hopelessness. Easter compels us to see where we need to be cleansed of any and all sins, rooting out our vices and allowing the boundless love of Jesus Christ to overtake us completely. In return, we gain a rebirth to a life in this world and in the next, a life that is greater than anything we have a right to hope for or our feeble minds could imagine. This promised life is so far beyond our capacity for words that the best we have been able to do over the centuries is to joyfully shout 'ALLELUIA!'-but that, my friends, seems to be enough.

May the peace of Christ and the bounteous grace of our God be with you and yours on this blessed Easter Sunday. AMEN, ALLELUIA!

#### This Sunday's Gospel Reflection:

Many women and men followed Jesus from the beginning of his ministry, heard his teaching, and witnessed his healing actions. Jesus' crucifixion and death destroyed their hope that he




was the messiah. Easter blows the minds of Jesus' followers. They experience lesus risen and alive. These disciples become eyewitnesses of Jesus' new life. Mary Magdalene brings the beloved disciple and Peter to see that Jesus' tomb is empty. The beloved disciple sees the empty tomb and immediately believes Jesus is risen. Mary Magdalene can't stand to leave Jesus' tomb with his body missing; she hears the Risen Jesus speak her name and believes. Mary Magdalene becomes the witness to Jesus' other friends. She announces to the whole community: "I have seen the Lord." Peter and the whole community of Jesus' followers pray together, still afraid and locked together in a room. Jesus comes and gives them peace and forgiveness. They believe and become his witnesses. Thomas doubts that Jesus is risen until he sees and touches lesus for himself and believes. Jesus' friends become witnesses that God raised up Jesus to new life. Today it is our turn to be witnesses to lesus' new life. Let us go into our first week of Easter and share the Good News of Easter with others.

# "He Saw and Believed"

hen John entered the empty tomb, he "saw and believed." The body of Jesus was not in the tomb. His body was risen. The Incarnate God, the Word-made-flesh is still alive and with us. This is our basic faith.

When Peter explained Christianity to the Romans at Cornelius's house, he called for faith in four basic truths: (1) Jesus is the Christ, the one anointed by God with the Holy Spirit and power; (2) he was sent to deliver us from the devil's oppression and reconcile us to God; (3) God raised Jesus from the dead and made him judge of "the living and the dead"; (4) the Church is commissioned to preach and bear witness to Jesus. All four of these truths are implicit in the Resurrection. John read them all in the "wrappings on the ground" of the empty tomb, which no longer held Jesus' body.

What the Resurrection says to us is that God has affirmed Jesus and all he taught; that he has accept-

ed his death on the cross to "take away the sins of the world"; that he has glorified Jesus; that Jesus is "seated at the right hand of the Father" as Lord and King, with power to judge every human person and to share his glory with all who believe in him. To believe in the Resurrection is to know Jesus as the savior who has power over sin and death, can reconcile us to God, raise us from the dead, and give us the fullness of life and joy both in

this life and forever. That is why Jesus' Resurrection is the source of the *hope* we have in our own resurrection and glorification.

urrection is the reality of the Church. Paul says we "died with Christ" and "were raised in Christ" because at Baptism we became the Body of Jesus offered and resurrected. We "offered our bodies" to him that he might live in us and continue his human, embodied presence on earth. Because Jesus is risen, he lives now in us, his Church. And in us he continues his "ministry of reconciliation."

> Every letter attributed to Saint Paul has the words grace and peace in the greeting. Peace is the word Jesus used to greet the disciples after his Resurrection. Jesus is the source of our peace because it is through him and in him that we have been reconciled to God-not only in forgiveness, not only in love, but in that union of one shared life which we call grace-the favor of sharing in God's life. God's

love totally purifies us, embraces us and unites us to the Trinity in an unreserved sharing of mind, will and heart.

"All this," Saint Paul tells the Corinthians, "is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation" (2 Corinthians 5:18). "All this" is implicitly expressed and contained in his Resurrection. "All this" is the reason why we should believe in God's love for us and love him back with confidence, in unreserved surrender and abandonment of all we have and are to him.

And "all this" comes to us through Jesus Christ, who loved us and gave himself up for us. "All this" invites us to surrender our lives to Christ and to live in a loving relationship with him in everything we do.

Saint Paul told the Colossians: "If then you were raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth, for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with him in glory."

# **REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS**

#### **Easter Week**

**Pray daily:** May the risen Lord breathe on our minds and open our eyes that we may know him in the breaking of the bread and follow him in his risen life. Amen.

**Monday:** Matthew 28:8-15. Jesus said, "Go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me." Jesus told those who saw him after the Resurrection to tell others about him. Whom have you invited to come and see Jesus present and acting in his Church?

**Tuesday:** John 20:11-18. Jesus said, "Go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Do you treat everyone in a way that reflects your belief in the Father of Jesus—your belief that we are brothers and sisters to each other?

**Wednesday:** Luke 24:13-35. They said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?" These two disciples immediately set out and told the apostles how Jesus was revealed to them in the breaking of the bread, the Eucharist. Have you ever felt your heart "burning" inside you at Mass? In prayer? Have you shared this experience with others?

**Thursday:** Luke 24:35-48. Jesus told the apostles that it was written that "the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed...to all nations... You are witnesses of these things." How do you share what you know about forgiveness of sins? Whom do you know who needs to hear it?

**Friday:** John 21:1-14. Jesus said, "Cast the net to the right side of the boat...." After they cast the net, they were unable to pull it in because of the number of fish. How are you trying to bring people into the boat that is the Church?

**Saturday:** Mark 16:9-15. Jesus told the disciples, "Go into all the world and proclaim the good news." How do you share in that evangelizing ministry?

# LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

**As Christian:** In one or two lines write down what you have "seen and believed" of Jesus Christ.

**As Disciple:** Read a Gospel passage used this week and imagine how Jesus would explain it to you. See if your heart is "burning within you."

**As Prophet:** Change something in your life-style to make it express better the truth that you are the risen Body of Jesus.

**As Priest:** Ask one or two Christians what makes Jesus real to them. Be ready to say what makes him real to you, if asked.

**As King:** Show your faith in the power of the risen Lord by trying to change some situation you are involved in—at home, at work, in your social life, in civic life.

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
