

Fr. Mike's Musings

The growing shortage of foodstuffs and the attendant rise in prices has been sending waves of apprehension throughout the world. For many it is not a question of simply tightening their belts, but of day-to-day survival. Those of us fortunate enough to be where food is relatively plentiful and to have more than adequate means to purchase it still should remain concerned about our less-fortunate brethren around the globe. So, it is only natural that the subject of food would be on our minds as we celebrate the Feast of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ—Corpus Christi.

The scripture reading for this weekend do not ignore the plight of the hungry and the importance of food for survival, but they emphasize the spiritual meaning of the sustenance that Gid provides to His people. The First Reading states that man does not live by bread alone. Jesus quotes this passage from Deuteronomy when He rejected the temptations of the Devil in the wilderness as He was preparing to begin His ministry. Thus, the poor of the world have a God-given right to both tangible and spiritual bread and wine. The "poor" being not only those in material poverty, but also those lacking in faith and spiritual fortitude.

Most of the people reading this article will have partaken of the Eucharist at the weekend Masses. You will have received the Body and Blood of Christ, a great privilege as well as a great challenge. The privilege is due to the fact that we are the recipients of God's inestimable gift of faith. Jesus is with us and within us through the Eucharistic presence. Before we receive this sacred meal we collectively proclaim: "Lord, I am nor worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul shall be healed." Jesus responds (albeit silently): "I know that you are unworthy but come forward nevertheless; trust that my grace is sufficient for you. Take my Body and my Blood unto yourself."

The Eucharist is a challenge because it dares us to live in imitation of Jesus, in the service of others. It dares us to give our lives in love as He has done. This challenge is issued to all baptized Catholic Christians, not just those in religious life or the so-called "professional" believers. We are to take what we have been given, the Lord Himself, and share His love with all we encounter in life.

There is a story related to me by one of my instructors in seminary, Fr. Patrick O'Malley, that tells of a young man he encountered early in his priesthood (ca. 1960). This man never come forward at Communion although he was always at Mass on Sunday morning. He would leave at Communion, only to arrive at the church for Mass on the following Sunday. Fr. O'Malley took him aside one morning and asked why he never received the Eucharist. The young man answered honestly, but somewhat sheepishly: "I know that if I were to receive, I would have to change my ways." I am certain that Fr. O'Malley challenged students and congregation members with this tale right up to his dying day in 2011.

When we receive the Body and Blood of Christ, we are indeed called to change our ways. We are called to enter even deeper into a sense of holiness and take on a greater concern for others. This challenging feast marks our re-entry into "Ordinary Time" in the Church's calendar, but this seasonal name is somewhat misleading. It is a time to fully put our faith into action. For many this will prove to be "extraordinary", to say the least. But it is what is required of us when we enter in communion with the Lord present in the Eucharist—His most precious Body and Blood.



Flesh That Gives life

Then Jesus took bread and wine at the Last Supper, preparing to say the words which would transform them into his Body and Blood and establish the sacrament of Eucharist forever, he knew he was bringing to fulfillment a thousand-year promise. In the desert, centuries before, God had fed his people with a strange food that rained down from heaven. The people called it manna, which means, "What is this?" (See Exodus 16:15). This was the preview of an even more mysterious food from heaven, which Jesus was now preparing to give: his flesh for the life of the world.

The Eucharist is a clear sign of an incomprehensible reality. The mystery it speaks is beyond our understanding, but the blessing it promises is obvious to the smallest child. The greatest genius could not explain the Eucharist, but only a fool would fail to make use of it. Even while our wondering hearts repeat, "What is this?" we are able to "taste and see that the LORD is good" (Psalm 34:8).

We need not understand the Eucharist fully to receive it, but we must receive Eucharist to appreciate it. The Eucharist is given to be experienced. Those who receive it frequently will recognize it for what it is: Jesus' flesh for the life of the world: Eucharist is available to all who believe; Eucharist is experience for all who receive.

The promise implicit in the manna was made explicit by Jesus when he said, "I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats of this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh." The meaning is clear: Jesus is food. His body is food that gives life. And the life his body nourishes in us will continue forever. "Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me." The Eucharist is the living Body of Jesus given to us as food: his flesh for the life of the world.

Jesus added: "Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them." Eucharist is interpen-

etration. It is union. It is closeness. It is sharing in the thoughts of Jesus Christ, in his desires, in his passion to be one with us, to be united to us. It is an embrace of love. In Eucharist Jesus gives us his body, his flesh, to penetrate our being, to expand our hearts, to fill us with his life and make us one with him. In Eucharist Christ says to us, "Open your inmost self to me, receive me, take me into your body, be one with me, surrender to my passion, let down your defenses, abandon yourself to unrestrained union with me, give yourself to me as I am giving to you, receive my body, be my body, eat my flesh and be my flesh-my flesh for the life of the world!"

We receive Eucharist in the context of celebrating the passion of Jesus Christ: the passion in which he delivered himself to torture and death for us that we might have life in an ecstasy of joy with him, with the Father, the Spirit and with all who have given themselves to be Christ and be "in Christ" forever. But our ecstasy comes from his agony; our possession of God from his surrender to men. In the Eucharist we celebrate life through death, conquest through surrender, total fulfillment through total abandonment.

Before we receive Jesus in Communion, we are invited to unite ourselves with Jesus, "the Lamb of God," offered for the sins of the world; to offer ourselves with him and in him "so that sins might be forgiven;" to offer ourselves in love to friends and enemies alike; to offer ourselves in vulnerability and defenselessness that all divisions might be overcome; to die as many grains of

wheat to become one bread; to unite ourselves to him in his act of love on the cross and to give our flesh with his: one body, one flesh, for the life of the world.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Tenth Week of the Year

Pray daily: Father, you sent your Word to bring us truth and your Spirit to make us holy. Through them may we come to know the mystery of your life. Help us to worship you, one God in three Persons, by proclaiming and living our faith in you. Amen.

Monday: Matthew 5:1-12. "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." How does the recognition of our inadequacy help us to grow in faith? In hope? In love?

Tuesday: Matthew 5:13-16. "You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored?... You are the light of the world... [L]et your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven." When, where, how is your faith reflected in your actions? Do you experience this as life?

Wednesday: Matthew 5:17-19. "[W]hoever breaks one of the least of these commandments, and teaches others to do the same will be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but whoever does them and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven." Which commandments is Jesus talking about here? Why does it take far more faith to believe in Jesus' commandments than in the Ten Commandments God gave through Moses?

Thursday: Matthew 5:20-26. "...if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift [before the altar] and go; first be reconciled

with your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift." When you seek reconciliation with someone, how is this an act of emptying yourself as Jesus did in his Incarnation?

Friday: Matthew 5:27-32. "If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away..." How does your faith make your priorities different from those of the society in which you live?

Saturday: Matthew 5:33-37. "Again, you have heard that it was said to those of ancient times.... But I say to you "How would you describe the difference between the Sinai Covenant (Ten Commandments) and the New Law of Jesus?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: Let Christ save you from some fault by raising you to a divine level. For example, avoid unkind words by dedicating your speech to God each morning, dedicating yourself to give life by expressing to others Jesus' love.

As Disciple: Search the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7) for three examples of the way Jesus calls us to act, not just as good human beings, but on the level of God.

As Prophet: Do one specific thing-at home, at work, in your social life-which will reveal the grace "of our Lord Jesus Christ" in you.

As Priest: Consciously show the love of God to one person each day at work and at home. If you live alone, show it to yourself!

As King: Make a list of the people you deal with regularly. Note the ones with whom you experience the "fellowship (communion) of the Holy Spirit." Ask what you can do to increase your union of mind, heart and will with the others.

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
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
