



Fr. Mike's Musings

In Roman Catholicism the leaders of worship and the custodian/ administrator of the Sacraments of the Church are called priests, and ancient term to denote persons delegated to be the spiritual guide or touchstone for a system of belief. Faith traditions throughout the history of the world and its peoples have relied on priests to guide believers in transitory journeys from whatever realm the system in question holds to be the goal of both the temporal and spiritual existence in the universe. Therefore, it is not unusual for this term for a spiritual master to have been adopted by those who adhere to the beliefs and tenets of Catholic Christianity. But there are in fact o forms of priesthood that exists within the Church, and both forms have a heritage that predates the existence of either Christianity or Catholicism—the "priesthood of the faithful" and the "sacramental priesthood".

The word "priest" comes from the Greek "presbyteros", meaning "elder", and refers to one who is authorized to perform the sacred rites of a religion, one who is mediator between the people and the Divine. In the Old Testament priests came from families that could trace their lineage directly to Aaron, the brother of Moses, or generally to the tribe of Levi. As consecrated ministers they held a special place for leading the people in worship. But there was also a "priesthood of the people" as all of the Hebrew people were dedicated to God and were expected to participate in the sacrificial rites conducted by the consecrated priests.

The early Church knew that Jesus established and ordained priesthood through His delegation of the Twelve Apostles to minister to the growing number of His disciples, the ordinary believers. But this Church also recognized a "priesthood of the faithful" in accordance with the traditions of their Jewish forebearers. This form of priest was tasked by virtue of their Baptism to give witness to their faith in Christ through their lives and interactions in the world. What they lacked, however, was the direct mandate and responsibility to continue Christ's mission through the administration of the Sacraments as was given to the original Apostles.

The Second Vatican Council in the Dogmatic Constitution of the Church taught that the baptized faithful are deemed to be a "common priesthood". This state differs from the ordained priesthood but still participates in the continuing mission and ministry of Jesus. The faithful exercise their "common priesthood" by joining in the offering of the Mass and the Sacraments, through prayer and a devotional life, and by witnessing Christ in the world through that life of faith.

This implication of faith means that Catholics come to Mass not as mere spectators, but as people who are offering their lives to God through their belief in Christ. This also means that our prayers are part of the priestly prayers offered in the Eucharistic sacrifice. Whether we are praying individually or communally, we are joining ourselves directly to Jesus who always is at our side.

The "common priesthood" or "priesthood of the faithful" means that Christ depends on his current-day disciples to continue his mission on earth. All of our thoughts, words, and actions are to become a part of and a witness to the loving action of God among His people in the world. Paired with the actions and prayers of the "sacramental priesthood", the desire of God to bring all peoples to Himself through Christ can come to fruition, but only if this role is embraced and implemented fully by those who realize their role in the continuing mission of Jesus Christ and His Church.

light in Darkness

Jesus called us the light of the world. On the day of our Baptism a candle, lit from the paschal candle, which symbolizes Christ, was given to us or to our godparents. We were instructed to keep the light of faith brightly burning until the day of Christ's return.

On that day the light of Christ was enkindled in our hearts; we became bearers of his light to the world. We were sent to let his light shine in us like a lamp set on a lampstand or a city built on a hill; to proclaim from the housetops what is whispered in our hearts; to speak in the light of day what we hear in the quiet darkness of our hours of prayer.

The light in us is a light shining in the darkness. We are sent into a world which loves the darkness of its own distorted light; a world of false values and distorted priorities; a world where people have "loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil" (John 3:19); a world which rejected Jesus, the Light of the world, and prefers to live in darkness and the gloom of death. This world will reject us as soon

as we let the light within us illumine the darkness of its ways.

All around us, like Jeremiah, we will hear "many whispering." Our situation may not be as terrifying as what Jeremiah faced: "Terror is all around!/ Denounce him! Let us denounce him! / ... Perhaps he can be enticed, / and we can prevail against him, / and take our revenge on him." But we will be able

to respond with Jeremiah, "The word of the LORD has become for me/ a reproach and derision all day long... All my close friends are watching for me to stumble" (20:8, 10). The light that shines in the darkness is not welcome in a world that prefers darkness to light. It is

only the pure of heart who will see God.

But Jesus tells us, "[H]ave no fear... Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul... Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. And even the hairs of your head are all counted. So do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows." If we acknowledge Jesus before others, he will acknowledge us before his heavenly Father.

We live in an age of cover-ups. Evil is done in high places; laws are broken by those sworn to uphold them. Truth is suppressed while half-truths are fashioned into lies; news stories are slanted. Reputations are dragged through the mud and "dirty tricks" seem to be a part of every political campaign. Often, the higher one rises in business or politics, the lower one's

credibility falls. We are accustomed to the "administrative lie." We easily disregard "official versions." We know that news reports and commercials are financed by the same people and that money speaks louder than truth. But Jesus tells us, "nothing is covered up

that will not be uncovered...nothing secret that will not become known." John's Gospel tells us, "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it" (1:5).

Saint Paul reminds us: "[S]in came into the world through one man, and death came through sin, and so death spread to all because all have sinned." In the same way, through one person, Jesus Christ, life came into the world, and his life is the light of the human race, the true light, which enlightens everyone. The life Jesus gives is spreading to all because his light is shining in all who believe. "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it."

The world was not created in darkness. The darkness of any society is created by innumerable individual acts of sin: of deception, distortion and deliberate entry into darkness which become a way of life. In the same way, society can be brought into light and life by innumerable individual acts of witness. As the words of Jesus are made flesh in us, we become the light and renewal of the world.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Twelfth Week of the Year

Pray daily: Lord, you are the light of the world, and you send us to be the light of the world. Let me love your light. Call me out of darkness into discipleship. Invite me to learn your heart. Amen.

Monday: Matthew 7:1-5. "Do not judge, so that you may not be judged. For with the judgment you make you will be judged." Do you judge the policies, customs and behavior of your society by the light of Christ's teachings or by what is accepted practice?

Tuesday: Matthew 7:6, 12-14. "In everything do to others as you would have them do to you; for this is the law and the prophets." Is this the standard you use in dealing with others at home? At work? In your social life? In the city?

Wednesday: Matthew 7:15-20. "You will know them by their fruits. Are grapes gathered from thorns, or

figs from thistles?" How do you pick your models? By their achievement of success in this world? By their popularity? Their social prestige? What does Jesus mean by "their fruits"?

Thursday: Matthew 7:21-29. "Everyone then who hears these words of mine and acts on them will be like a wise man who built his house on rock." If you build your life on what others do, what they think or expect of you, what are you building on? How long can it last?

Friday: Matthew 8:1-4. A man suffering from leprosy approached, knelt before Jesus, and said, "Lord, if you choose, you can make me clean." Do you want this for yourself? Do you believe Jesus can do it? That he wants to? Have you asked him to do it? When?

Saturday: Matthew 8:5-17. Jesus said to the centurion, "Go; let it be done for you according to your faith." Would you be willing to accept this deal? To what extent do you believe in and base your life on Jesus' promises?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: Each day do one thing consciously and deliberately according to Christ's ideals that is a "break" with what is taken for granted in our society or in your own milieu.

As Disciple: Each morning read a few verses from the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5—7) and try to live them out that day.

As Prophet: Each day this week try to give those around you a "clue" that you are a Christian, without saying it in words.

As Priest: Look into your heart; see what gifts you have for helping people and then consciously use one gift each day to minister to someone.

As King: For one day, notice who the people are who influence your decisions and behavior. Count how many times it is Jesus.
