



Fr. Mike's Musings

Although it may sound flippant to put it this way it must be acknowledged that when the subject of A hallmark of priestly life is celibacy, the living in a state of not marrying and of abstaining from sexual activity. The roots of celibacy are found in the New Testament. Christ Himself lived in celibacy. Jesus spoke of those who "...renounced marriage for the sake of the Kingdom of Heaven." (Matthew 19:12) Paul praised celibacy as a means of fully

focusing on "...the things of the Lord." (I Corinthians 7:32-34) In 1139 the Second Lateran Council made celibacy mandatory for priests of the Latin/Western Rite of the Church. Those priests of the Greek/Eastern Rite Catholic Church who are married or those of other faiths who have converted and have been ordained to the priesthood may remain married but cannot remarry if their spouse precedes them in death. This rule concerning marriage and remarriage is what is currently applied to Deacons in the Latin Rite Church.

Celibacy offers an opportunity to imitate the celibate life of the Lord and it frees priests from many earthly concerns (family obligations) allowing them to devote themselves to the service of Christ and His people. Celibacy is a positive surrender of oneself, not a negative renunciation of "pleasure", this is like matrimony which is a positive choosing of the good of one's spouse, not just a simple renunciation of other partners or companions. The celibate life is a constant reminder to the priest that Jesus Christ is first in his heart and the source of his strength. Celibacy creates a need that can only be filled by Jesus as it demands a strong prayer relationship between the priest and Christ, just as marriage demands frequent communication between the husband and wife.

A life of celibacy also allows the priest to interact and relate to the many families in his care, and it is a way for Jesus to fulfill His promise:

"Amen, I say to you, there is no one who has given up house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or lands for my sake and for the sake of the Gospel who will not receive a hundred times more now in the present age...and eternal life in the age to come." (Mark 10:29-30)

Catholic priests are traditionally addressed as "Father". This popular tile suggests a familial relationship between the priest and the laity, as well as the attitude of sacrifice and generosity with which a priest should serve his people. Some people criticize Catholics for using the tile "Father", stating that Jesus forbade when He admonished His followers to "...call no one on earth your father." (Matthew 23:9) But given the context it is clear that Jesus is speaking against false attitudes of pride and presumed superiority. If this passage were to be taken literally, the term "father" could not even be used in reference to one's own male parent.

In the end the life of the Catholic priest is not about titles or honors, but rather it is about the sacrifices a man is willing to make for the sake of Christ and His Church. While celibacy precludes entry into marriage, the priest is in a sense married. In scripture Christ is the symbol of a bridegroom taking the Church as His bride and as such our relationship with Him mirrors that of a married couple. The people/laity are by virtue of their baptism have become the embodiment of the "bride", and as the priest serves the Church 'in persona Christi' (in the person of/ representing Christ) he therefore assumes the role as the "bridegroom" of the Church. Like any marriage there are the proverbial bumps-in-the-road, but when both parties are earnestly living and working for the good of one another those bumps will be overcome and, as is sung in the familiar hymn, charity and love will prevail and God will be found.




School Supply Drive

"Come to Me ... "

hat, in a sentence, is the mission of the Church, of the parish? What did Jesus come to do?

Saint Paul says God's plan is "to gather up all things in [Christ], things in heaven and things on earth" (Ephesians 1:10). Yes, Jesus came to establish peace between us and God, peace among individuals, races and nations. But the source and support of this peace is one thing alone: *knowing God*, being united in mind, heart and will with God. Jesus came to reveal his own heart to us so that we might know God and, by knowing him, love God and one another as Jesus does. "[L]earn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls."

The problem is, no one can know the heart of Jesus except God. "No one knows who the Son is except the Father..." or "who the Father is except the Son..." (Luke 10:22). Only God can know God completely, totally. The mystery of the Christian religion, and all of its

power, rests in this one fact: that through the gift of grace God has made us all *filii in Filia*, "sons in the Son," sharers in the divine life of Jesus Christ, participants in his own divine act of knowing and loving God and therefore able to be one in mind, will and heart with him. The mission of Jesus and the Church is to bring every mind, heart and will in heaven and on earth together into unity through union with the mind and heart of Christ.

This is peace: "[L]earn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls."

Ironically, we look to governments and armies to maintain peace by making war. But God taught us to look to a king, a true savior, who comes "triumphant JULY 9, 2023

and victorious" by coming to us "humble and riding on a donkey." He will banish the war chariot and the war horse; the battle bow will be cut off. "[A]nd he shall command peace to the nations; his dominion shall be from sea to sea... to the ends of the earth." If we learn from Jesus, who is gentle and humble in heart, we will find rest for our souls. We will find peace.

If we live "according to the flesh," Saint Paul says—that is, according to the spirit of this world, the preju-

dices of our upbringing, the natural tendency which is in us all to fight fire with fire, to take an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth, to defend ourselves by retaliation and threat of even more violent retaliation—then quite simply, "we will die." The way of the world is death. The way of violence is death. The way of dependence on arms is death. The way of defending our lives by dealing death to others is already death to our

souls. "For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it" (Matthew 16:25). Take it or leave it: spirit or flesh, the way of life or the way of death. We can follow the darkness of this world into violence and death or we can

learn from Jesus who is "gentle and humble in heart" and we find rest for our souls.

Are we fulfilling our mission as Church when we encourage children to play "killer" with toy guns, to play "war" with toy soldiers, tanks and planes? When we let our hearts approve the violence of the "good guy" who kills the "bad guy" on TV? When we applaud troops who commit themselves to kill on command anyone an officer or a president points to as a "bad guy" who threatens our country?

The mission of the Church is to unite every heart on earth with the heart of Christ. But we are the Church. Every Christian family is the Church assembled on the level of the home. Every group of Christian friends is the Church assembled for recreation or celebration. Every business or office where there are Christians is the Church assembled for service to the world. In every place and situation, at home and in the city, at work and at play, our mission is to help each other recognize Jesus, who is "gentle and humble in heart," so that we may all find rest for our souls.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Fourteenth Week of the Year

Pray daily: Father, the sufferings your Son endured restored hope to a fallen world. Let the illusion of power never ensnare us with empty promises of passing peace. Make us one with you in gentleness and humility of heart so that our security may come from you and our love may give life, not destroy it. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Monday: Matthew 9:18-26. The woman said to herself, "If I only touch his cloak, I will be made well." If just touching Jesus can heal, what power comes from being united with him in mind and heart?

Tuesday: Matthew 9:32-38. Jesus said, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore, ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." Are you willing to work for peace? What step can you take today?

Wednesday: Matthew 10:1-7. Jesus gave his disciples authority to cast out unclean spirits and to heal every disease and every infirmity. What power do we as Church have today to cast evil out of the world and heal suffering? How can you share in this work?

Thursday: Matthew 10:7-15. "Take no gold, or silver, or copper in your belts." Do you really need money, power, earthly resources in order to live a Christian life?

Friday: Matthew 10:16-23. "See, I am sending you out like sheep into the midst of wolves; so be wise as serpents and innocent as doves." Do you rely on intimidation and force to defend yourself? Or do you use your mind to discover peaceful means to reconciliation through reflection and prayer?

Saturday: Matthew 10:24-33. "A disciple is not above the teacher, nor a slave above the master." If Jesus did not use force or violence, should you?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: Ask what in your life does or could show that you rely on Jesus as the only true Savior of human life on earth.

As Disciple: Check your gut reactions to war news and to the "good guys" violence on TV. Compare this with specific words of Jesus that seem to address the issue.

As Prophet: Check to see how many things in your home explicitly or implicitly glorify or condone violence. Begin making everything in your life bear witness to Jesus, man of peace.

As Priest: Try to "turn the other cheek" consciously once a day, not just in passive endurance but as a positive expression of redeeming love.

As King: Think of some gentle, peaceful step you could take to start changing something in your environment that is not in accord with the mind and heart of Christ.
