

Fr. Mike's Musings

In the past couple of weeks, I have had the honor of officiating at the marriages of two young couples at St. Michael's. The joy and anticipation of the bride and groom was palpable. But so also was the nervousness and possible trepidation about what exactly they were doing. The lack of surety that most of us have when making major moves in our lives. A genuine lean of



that most of us have when making major moves in our lives. A genuine leap of faith into the unknown.

What is marriage? What is marriage really like? Statistics suggest that "happily ever after" occurs no more than 50% of the time, considering how many couples divorce. Is marriage like the movies, and, if so, which movies? There are so many possibilities! How many marriages are like their parents' marriage? Is that a good thing? What do we think marriage is really like? And why do we think that? Because of what we've read? or dreamed about? Because of our experiences with dating, or because of what we've seen or heard from couples?

Marriage is a pretty common experience. It's all around us; it's existed through most of human history and in almost all cultures. Most people get married at some point in their life. Why do they do that? What are they looking for? What do they hope to get? Why not just live together? Or date forever?

It doesn't matter whether people are single, playing the field, celibate, hooking up, commitment-phobic, in a serious relationship, recovering from a breakup, living together, married, divorced, or widowed. The thoughts and assumptions and opinions and values that each person has about marriage are guiding their actions and influencing their relationships every day. There are lots of words that can be used to characterize those thoughts, such as ideas, dreams, judgments, presumptions, evaluations, or conclusions. Some of those beliefs may be "spot on" and others may be "off the wall."

Experience suggests that a fair number of people, including clergy, have expectations and beliefs about marriage that aren't very realistic. There are lots of ways to say that: messy thinking, distorted cognition, denial, ignorance, and false conclusions, to name a few. And if people start with unrealistic expectations, they are likely to end up very disappointed, whether they are starting to date or in a long-term relationship. They may then experience incongruity between their lived experience and what they expect, or hope for, want, or need; the expectations don't match up with your reality. In addition, American society has radically increased its general expectations of marriage so that many people are looking for the one person who can fulfill their every want and need and provide them with a very high level of life satisfaction until they die.

Over the centuries humanity has collected a large number of irrational beliefs and ideas. We call them myths because they are widely held but false or flawed ideas. Like some myths, they contain some truth (or people would not have held onto them). Therefore, myths continue to guide personal and social behavior. When people believe a "myth" about marriage, it influences how they select the people they date, who they choose to marry and how they interact with their spouse.

A cautionary note; at some point, we may think to ourselves or hear someone assert that "X is not a myth!" We may have heard someone sincerely state that myth, or perhaps we've read it on the internet somewhere, or maybe we know couples like that, and it doesn't seem to be a problem. It's just possible that we believe that myth yourself, and that can be a shock. Just because we can't see that it's a problem doesn't mean it isn't.

Transfiguration of the Lord ~ August 6, 2023

The Feast of the Transfiguration of Our Lord recalls the revelation of Christ's glory on Mount Tabor in the presence of three of His disciples, Peter, James, and John. Jesus Is Victory

he Transfiguration takes place right after Jesus reveals to his disciples that he is not going to save the world in the way they expect, but by dying on the cross—and that anyone who accepts him as Savior must "carry the cross," which means to accept those particular consequences of the sin of the world which happen to fall on us and to respond with love. The power Jesus uses to save the world is the power he gives us to love back, no matter what happens to us.

In this context, after Jesus has revealed the scandalous way in which he is going to save the world, the Father speaks again, as he did at the beginning of Jesus' mission (Luke 3:22, Matthew 3:17) to confirm that Jesus is truly the "Son of God," the Savior he promised to send.

The Transfiguration revealed Jesus in an extraordinary way as the promised "Son of God." His glory as God actually shone out through his human body. But Jesus is also revealed to us as Savior in a constant stream of very ordinary incidents—or which appear to be ordinary until we reflect on them.

"Son of David": Isn't it true that our whole experience of life is different because we know that Jesus has come to fulfill all God's promises to us? Through him we know the beginning and end of our existence. We know that human life and suffering are intelligible. We know that the teachings we live by are not just human speculation. We know that in the ministry of the Church Jesus Christ acts with authority and power to teach us, strengthen and heal us. We know that death itself has no real power over us. And all of this is because Jesus has come as the promised "Son of David."

"Jesus": We realize the significance for us of the name "Jesus," "God saves," in every ordinary experience of the Sacrament of Reconciliation. This sacrament embodies the words, "You are to name him Jesus because he will save his people from their sins."

"Son of God": We don't have to see Jesus transfig-

ured on a mountaintop to experience the presence of the divine. Every time we genuflect before the Blessed Sacrament, every time we receive Jesus in Communion, we know that we are in a live encounter with Jesus as "Son of God." Our adoration of him in faith is also our acknowledgment and our assurance of the power that is his to save us from sin and death. Jesus is a divine Savior who gives divine life and "baptizes with the Holy Spirit," giving us power to live on the level of God.

"Emmanuel": Jesus is God present to us in human ways. His human words in Scripture speak to our hearts. His human actions recorded there reveal his personality to us as truly as if we were physically present witnessing them. He teaches and ministers to us still in his human Body on earth, the Church. Every sacrament is an encounter with Jesus acting humanly to bless us, as is every experience of Jesus acting in and through another human being by grace. These are all experiences of "Emmanuel," "God-with-us."

"Universal Lord": Jesus is not restricted to one culture or language, or even to religious symbols alone. He uses a multitude of "stars" to lead us to himself as he led the Magi. Through how many signs, symbols, chance encounters and events does he inspire us, guide and enlighten us every day? If we are alert to his action in our lives, we experience him daily as the "Universal Lord" whose messenger voices, like the stars themselves, extend from one end of the universe

to the other, addressing every human heart.

The Transfiguration was a mystical vision. But if we look with eyes of faith at our environment, everything is transfigured. Then we will see the glory of Jesus shining through our everyday experience, and we will know him for the Savior he is.

Pray daily: God our Father, gifts without measure flow from your goodness to bring us your peace. Our life is your gift. Guide our life's journey, for only your love makes us whole. Keep us strong in your love. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Monday: Matthew 14:22-36. Peter said to him, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." When did you most recently take the risk of responding to something you thought might be an inspiration from God? How did you feel afterwards?

Tuesday: Matthew 15:1-2, 10-14. Jesus said, "[l]t is not what goes into the mouth that defiles a person, but... what comes out of the mouth that defiles." Are you as careful about what comes out of your mouth as you are about what goes into it?

Wednesday: Matthew 15:21-28. Jesus said, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." Has Jesus ever refused to give himself to you? Have you ever refused to give yourself to someone you did not think was worth it?

Thursday: Matthew 16:13-23. "From that time on, Jesus began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and undergo great suffering at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised." When do you accept pain,

trouble or sacrifices for others? What is your attitude toward this?

Friday: Matthew 16:24-28. "[W]hat will it profit them if they gain the whole world but forfeit their life? Or what will they give in return for their life?" Do you see the Eucharist as nourishing your life? For what are you willing to trade or give up Eucharist?

Saturday: Matthew 17:14-20. "For truly I tell you, if you have faith the size of a mustard seed, you will say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move; and nothing will be impossible for you." Have you given up on anybody? How much have you prayed for that person?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: Ask what could separate you from the love of Christ. Do something about it.

As Disciple: Take as much time each day as you take for your coffee just to sit down and let Jesus feed you with his words.

As Prophet: Target one person each day for whom you will do something freely, with no conditions before or after, just to give the kind of love God gives to you.

As Priest: Name something that you have to share, no matter how small or insignificant, and share it with someone, asking God to multiply its effect. You can share your faith, your gifts of ministry or your material resources.

As King: Identify something in your environment-at home, at work, in your circle of friends, in your city-that you have come to accept as hopeless. Ask if there is one thing, no matter how small, that you can do to make the situation better. Draw strength from what Saint Paul wrote: "No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us" (Romans 8:37).
