



#### Fr. Mike's Musings

In one of my favorite 'Three Stooges' skits Moe is going door-todoor as a Federal census taker and asks a gentleman the standard questions about his address and his age and then reveals to the hapless homeowner what his feelings are concerning the bonds of matrimony: "Are you married or happy?" While we may find this question humorous (I do) the sacrament of Marriage is a serious matter for the Church.



Throughout history civilizations have placed a sense of sacredness on the union of man and woman. There has always been a vague realization that the deep longing for oneness with "the other" is life-giving, and that this longing bespeaks it as being the source of all life for generations to come. This is why religious rituals and codes of behavior have always been tied to marriage. Jesus gave matrimony a new sacramental dimension as being a hallmark of Christian vocation that has its beginnings in the sacrament of Baptism. The family of God is mirrored in the family of man.

In matrimony a couple is called to live their sacramental bond for the good of not only themselves but also for others that they encounter. By their closeness, a couple affects the lives of others with the love of Christ in their midst. They reveal Christ's love and make it something to be desired to their immediate family members and to the community as a whole. A couple's love not only gives life through the birth of children but also imparts the life-giving presence of Christ to their brothers and sisters in the world.

Matrimony is more than a private arrangement between two people designed to give only satisfaction and joy to one another. It is a sacramental vocation in the Church through which Christ reveals and deepens the mystery of His oneness with us, His Body. In realization of this important aspect of the bond couples, new and years in being, should strive to avoid unrealistic aspects that place "conditions" on the relationship, conditions that often lead to stress and endanger the marriage when they have not been met.

Below is a short list of some myths that can hamper the true happiness inherent in marriage. They are red flags for potential problems in the relationship and they need to be addressed, not ignored or swept under the rug.

\*Marriage should be totally happy all the time.

\*There's never disagreement in a happy marriage.

\*Total honesty leads to marital paradise.

\*Successful marital partners should be like twins who have everything in common.

\*Doing everything together will lead to total happiness.

\*Stability should be the highest priority of a marriage.

\*Always expect to do family rituals the way your family did.

\*There is no place for joy and laughter in marriage; it's all serious work.

\*Make sure to hide your fears and weaknesses from your spouse.

\*Love conquers all and will keep you together.

\*Men and women are from different planets.

\*Conflict will take care of itself if you wait long enough.

\*Remember that you are always right; remind your partner of this frequently.

\*Take credit for everything that goes well.

\*Always blame your partner for your problems.

\*Exaggerate the negative and minimize the positive to help your spouse grow.

\*Never ever forgive your spouse.

\*The only way to express affection in marriage is to have sex.

Living in the reality of human relationships can only serve to enhance the reality of our relationship with Christ. And when this enhanced relationship of true love is exhibited to others their relationships can grow and improve as well. "Are you married or happy?" The answer should be a resounding "YES!" on both counts. It is the truest response couples can give in fulfilling their sacramental vocation.



# The Church Kata-holos

atthew's theme in his Gospel is that Jesus is the promised Son of David, the Messiah. But Jesus is called this only three times in direct address (9:27;15:22; 20:30), twice by blind men and once by this Canaanite woman, who should not have known this Jewish title.

Jesus ignores her. When she falls at his feet and asks for help, he responds, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." This does not sound like Iesus. His mother would have been ashamed of him! But Jesus was not being rude. He knew this woman; she was not the wilting type. Undaunted, she answers, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." Jesus says, "Woman, great is your faith!" and then cures her daughter.

What Jesus did here was to deliberately lead the woman into making an act of faith. Essentially, she acknowledged the truth of God's revelation to Israel by accepting that the Jews are the "children," the chosen family of God. This does not mean she felt inferior! She probably would have insisted to the whole world (Jesus included): "A Canaanite is better than a Jew

any day!" But she acknowledged that for some reason God had chosen them. This was her act of faith.

She did not convert to Judaism. At that time religion and nationality were identified. To accept the Jewish faith meant to accept Jewish culture and

life-style. There was no distinction between religious expression and cultural expression, between religious identity and ethnic identity. And there would not be until the Church became catholic.

The passage to catholicism is described in the Acts of the Apostles. When the Church decided to give the Greek Christians their own leaders (Acts 6:1-7) and AUGUST 20, 2023

to accept converts from paganism without requiring them to become Jews first or to follow the Jewish cultural-religious laws (see Acts 10:1-11:18 and 15:1-29), the Church broke the identification of Christianity with a single culture or cultural pattern of expression. This is what opened the door for Christ's Church to spread "throughout the whole" (kata-holos), which is what catholic means. The Catholic Church is the Church whose teaching and belief are the same throughout the whole world, but whose expression of

> tural forms of every race, nationality and ethnic group.

> There is no such thing, therefore, as a "Roman Catholic Church." There is the Roman (or Latin) rite of the Catholic Church which is just one of eighteen rites recognized as

equal in every way. The Church we belong to is the Armenian-Bul-garian-Chaldean-Coptic-Ethiopian-Italo/Albanian-Latin-Malabar-Georgian-Greek Malankar-Maronite-Melkite-Romanian-Russian-Serbian-Syrian-Ukrainian Catholic Church. Each of these rites has its own rules, government, liturgy and culturally influenced ways of expressing the faith we

this belief is embodied differently in the diverse cul-

all hold in common. And all are equal.

The Catholic Church is not tied down to any one mentality. Catholics can express their devotion silently or by dancing in the aisles; choose bishops by appointment or by majority vote; require priests to be married or celibate; give women public roles in liturgy or reserve these to men. All these choices are cultural, not religious. To be catholic is to refuse to identify religion with a single culture.

At the same time, since religion has to be expressed and all human expression is determined by human culture, being Catholic also means accepting one's own rite and following its rules until they change. One can change rites, just as one can change countries, but everyone has to belong to some culture and accept its rules or just leave the human race. The same is true of any religion incarnated as Church.

# REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

#### Twentieth Week of the Year

**Pray daily:** Lord, you came to draw everything in heaven and on earth into unity under your headship. Open my mind and my heart to accept diversity in the Church so that you can use me to bring about the unity you desire. Amen.

Monday: Matthew 19:16-22. Jesus said to him, "If you wish to be perfect, go, sell your possessions, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." Do you identify religion with observing commandments and customs or with following the words and example of Jesus?

**Tuesday:** Matthew 19:23-30. Peter said to Jesus, "Look, we have left everything and followed you. What then will we have?" What have you renounced to follow Jesus? Is giving up sin enough to make you a follower of Jesus?

**Wednesday:** Matthew 20:1-16. "So, the last will be first, and the first will be last." What practical effect do these words have on your life? How do you respond to them in action?

**Thursday:** Matthew 22:1-14. "But when the king came in to see the guests, he noticed a man there who was not wearing a wedding robe...." If you accept the invitation to the wedding feast and show up, but do not have deep respect and appreciation for what is going on, where does this leave you?

**Friday:** Matthew 22:34-40. A scholar of the law tested Jesus by asking, "Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" What commandment looms largest in your own consciousness?

**Saturday:** Matthew 23:1-12. "The scribes and the Pharisees sit on Moses' seat; therefore, do whatever they teach you and follow it; but do not do as they do." In what ways do you go beyond "cultural Catholicism"? Beyond the example of the clergy, the hierarchy and your peer group?

**As Christian:** Identify the title of Jesus which says the most to you: Savior, Teacher, Friend, Model, Leader, Priest, Victim, Lord or any other.

**As Disciple:** Write down five things that are rule or policy for Catholics in the Latin rite but which do not have to be this way in the whole Catholic Church. Can you name five things that other Catholic rites do which differ from Latin rite practice?

As Priest: In some specific way this week share the "children's food" with someone who does not have what is available to Catholics: the saints, the Mass, a Catholic conference or retreat, the writings of the mystics, a good pastoral letter from a bishop or the pope, or this book!
