



Fr. Mike's Musings

You may have noticed that there are now signs on the fire doors at St. Mary noting that these are for emergencies ONLY. However, these are being used with increasing frequency by those who seem to think that they have somewhere more important to be and simply cannot wait for the final conclusion of the Mass. Is McDonald's going to run out of coffee? The game requires your presence immediately. The golf course (beach, campground, etc.) will vanish from the face of the earth in the next fifteen minutes? I know that these examples come across as being snide in their tenor, but it is difficult to fathom what could possibly take precedence over Jesus Christ and His presence in the Eucharist.

Watching a person leaving immediately from Holy Communion, you wonder if the person is sick (valid reason). Was there an emergency? But no, after a while, you realize that the situation is not uncommon. Much like habitually arriving late for Mass, it may be discourteous, impolite and irreverent, but it is not uncommon in our parishes.

In the course of events, it seems odd that we can't organize our lives in such a way that we can attend Mass in its entirety. It isn't as if we are spectators at a stage play or ballgame and decide to show up at the bottom of the second inning or arbitrarily leave before the event is over. At the play or the game, neither the actors nor the players leave before the curtain goes down or the last out is made. Similarly, they are on hand when the curtain goes up or the first pitch is made. During the Mass, we are the players; we are the participants.

If we are invited into the presence of a president, a queen or the Pope, wouldn't we arrive before the dignitary and stay until the function is complete? It's protocol, respect and good manners. Doesn't God our Creator, who gave His life for us, deserve the same respect? What if Jesus asked us to attend the Last Supper; would we come late or leave before the meal was over? The Mass begins with the entrance procession and hymn. It ends with the dismissal. Everything in between is the Mass.

There was a time in Church history when people rationalized that their Mass obligation was satisfied if they attended the offertory, the consecration and holy Communion. Any such thinking was eliminated with the Second Vatican Council. Sacrosanctum Concilium (Constitution of the Sacred Liturgy), reads: "The two parts, which in a certain sense, go to make up the Mass, namely, the liturgy of the word and the eucharistic liturgy, are so closely connected with each other that they form but one single act of worship. Accordingly, this sacred Synod strongly urges pastors of souls that, when instructing the faithful, they insistently teach them to take their part in the entire Mass, especially on Sundays and feasts of obligation."

The <u>Code of Canon Law</u> likewise claims, "On Sundays and other holy days of obligation the faithful are obligated to assist at Mass." And the <u>Catechism of the Catholic Church</u> repeats the exact words of canon law regarding our Mass obligation. The first precept of the Catholic Church also tells us that we are obligated to attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation. There is no ambiguity here. None of these documents even hint or remotely infer that we can arrive late or leave early or that it's somehow OK to miss part of the Mass. In the words of Yogi Berra, "It ain't over till it's over." It is over when the celebrant has physically departed from the nave (congregational area) of the church.

Setting aside for the moment the mentioned documents and laws of the Church, there are other reasons for arriving on time and remaining until Mass ends. Those moments before Mass when we walk into this holy place, go to our knees before the throne of grace and revere our merciful God are moments to express our love. This is a time of personal preparation to meet God in the Eucharist. Likewise, the time after participation in holy Communion is a special period of reflection. We have just received the Body and Blood of Christ and to simply walk out makes a mockery of this glorious treasure. By showing up late or leaving early, we not only trivialize the real presence of Jesus, not only trivialize the Eucharist, but we also miss the full richness of the Mass. Remember who it was who left the Last Supper before it was over, and his fate? Do we really want to imitate that example of "discipleship" in our faith lives?





Is the Dope Catholic?

he guiding principle of Christian spirituality is to understand Jesus as "fully human, fully divine." This is the rule preachers, theologians and other individuals must navigate by to remain on course amid the diverse currents and shifting winds of changing cultures. And the "rule of the rule" is "never 'either-or'; always 'both-and."

The Church teaches that Jesus made Peter the head of the universal Church. Because both Peter and Paul died as witnesses to the faith in Rome, the Church recognizes the bishop of Rome as heir to that office. But every bishop is true head of the Church in his own diocese, holding authority directly from Christ, not as a delegate or branch manager for the pope. Although the pope as bishop of Rome has supreme teaching authority in the Church, every bishop is the chief teacher in his diocese. Just as the whole Church remains united through union with the bishop of Rome, every diocese remains united as a faith community through union with its bishop. If we see ourselves as faced with the choice of following either the pope or our local bishop, we are in trouble.

We are on track when we try to follow *both* the bishop *and* the pope. In practical terms, this means that if we ignore papal teaching and focus exclusively on our local bishop's preoccupations, we are not Catholic. On the other hand, if we look to the bishop of Rome for leadership and ignore what our own bishop is pointing to on the local scene, we are not Catholic either. And most of us tend to do one or the other: We take sides by choosing what to read and hear.

What do we do when there are differences of opinion in the Church, as there are about birth control? Suppose our bishop does not agree with a particular direction in which the pope is leading the Church (which we may see as "right," or "left," "forward" or "backward")? What if our bishop disagrees with a policy the pope supports, for example, the exclusion of married men from the ordained priesthood? As loyal Catholics should we line up behind our pope or behind our bishop?

To keep on track, we must accept fully the divine au-

thority of both pope and bishop while at the same time fully accepting their human limitations. The Gospel shows us in one and the same scene Jesus giving to Peter the "keys of the kingdom," supreme authority in the Church, and Peter immediately teaching error and trying to lead the Church down a path contrary to the way of God. Jesus has to say to him, "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me; for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

We reconcile apparent contradictions by precision. We preserve our belief in the divine presence of God teaching through pope and bishop by asking very precisely, "Is he speaking here and now under the conditions required for divine guidance?" We believe, for example, that the pope is infallible when he uses his full authority as pope. But when he is not formally defining a doctrine as the revealed truth of God, the pope himself would warn us not to take his teaching as infallible. To accept ordinary papal teaching as totally divine, as if there could be no mix of human error in it, would be making ourselves more Catholic than the pope.

The same is true of directions and policies, whether of popes or bishops. To be authentically Catholic we must give full value both to the divine guidance God promised to our teachers and to the human limitations under which they, like us, continue to act and to do their best.

This is the glory of the Church: we don't get angry

or rebellious or lose our faith in God or in the Church because a particular pope or bishop leans—as we do—to the right or left, or seems to be going too fast or too slow. We accept the human in our Church's teaching and government without ever denying the divine. We respect the divine in the human and accept the human in the divine. And we glory in the mix!

Monday: Matthew 23:13-22. Jesus said, "Woe to you, blind guides, who say, 'Whoever swears by the sanctuary is bound by nothing, but whoever swears by the gold of the sanctuary is bound by the oath." What effect do the big buildings, rich art works, pomp and ceremony in the Church have on you? Are you judging reality by its wrappings?

Tuesday: Matthew 23:23-26. "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites. For you tithe mint, dill, and cumin, and have neglected the weightier matters of the law: justice and mercy and faith." Which commandments do you think of most often? How often do you confess sins of not showing mercy, of not making judgments according to the mind of Christ about the needs of those around you?

Wednesday: Matthew 23:27-32. "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you are like whitewashed tombs, which on the outside look beautiful, but inside they are full of the bones of the dead and of all kinds of filth." Do you judge values by appearances—importance by dress, dignity by titles, acceptability by signs of success? When and with whom do you do this? What is the result?

Thursday: Matthew 24:42-51. "Who then is the faithful and wise slave, whom his master has put in charge of his household, to give the other slaves their allowance of food at the proper time?" What is it that inspires you to trust Church leaders (laity and clergy)? What makes you feel trust in business and professional people? In politicians?

Friday: Matthew 25:1-13. "Then the kingdom of heaven will be like this. Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom." When you go to various Church services, what are you looking for? Are you consciously seeking an encounter with Jesus?

Saturday: Matthew 25:14-30. The king in today's parable said, "[T]o all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away." How can you lose your spiritual gifts by not using your human gifts and talents?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: Ask yourself what external thing in your religion you like most: building, decoration, music, statue, devotional practice or something else? How does this particular thing affect your relationship to Christ?

As Disciple: Read an encyclical of the pope or a pastoral letter from your bishop.

As Prophet: Begin asking what each Church title, dress or gesture expresses and whether what each one expresses is real.

As Priest: Identify three "ritualistic" forms of self-expression in your personal life—words or gestures you frequently use—and ask if you mean and do what you express.

As King: Ask what one thing you can do here and now to bring the Church's external expression a little more into conformity with its interior truth, values and reality.
