

Fr. Mike's Musings

Matter that is on our minds is that of our passing from this world to the next—Death. Whether it inspires a sense of dread or is seen as a welcome beginning it is something that all of us will face at sometime in our existence. Our first encounter with death was usually with the passing of a friend or family member, but did the thought of our own mortality enter into our minds at that time? Probably not. These thoughts usually don't occur to us until much later in life. When they do crop-up we also tend to have ideas of how our "mortal coil" (bodies) will be dealt with. What will our funeral service be like? What will be the disposition of our remains entail? We will be looking at these questions from the Catholic perspective over the next few weeks.

The resurrection of Jesus is the culminating truth of the Christian faith, preached as an essential part of the Paschal Mystery from the very beginnings of Christianity:

"For I handed on to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures; that he was buried; that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures; that he appeared to Cephas, then to the Twelve (I Corinthians 15:3-5)

Through His death and resurrection, Christ freed us from sin and gave us access to a new life,

"...so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life" (Romans 6:4).

Furthermore, the Risen Christ is the principle and source of our future resurrection:

"Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive" (1 Corinthians 15:20-22).

It is true that Christ will raise us up on the last day; but it is also true that, in a certain way, we have already risen with Christ. In Baptism, actually, we are immersed in the death and resurrection of Christ and sacramentally assimilated to Him. United with Christ by Baptism, we already truly participate in the life of the Risen Christ.

Because of Christ, Christian death has a positive meaning. The Christian vision of death receives privileged expression in the liturgy of the Church. By death the soul is separated from the body, but in the resurrection, God will give incorruptible life to our body, transformed by reunion with our soul. In our own day also, the Church is called to proclaim her faith in the resurrection.

Following the most ancient Christian tradition, the Church insistently recommends that the bodies of the deceased be buried in cemeteries or other sacred places. In memory of the death, burial and resurrection of the Lord, the mystery that illumines the Christian meaning of death, burial is above all the most fitting way to express faith and hope in the resurrection of the body. By burying the bodies of the faithful, the Church confirms her faith in the resurrection of the body and intends to show the great dignity of the human body as an integral part of the human person whose body forms part of their identity. She cannot, therefore, condone attitudes or permit rites that involve erroneous ideas about death, such as considering death as the definitive annihilation of the person, or the moment of fusion with 'Mother Nature' or the universe, or as a stage in the cycle of regeneration, or as the definitive liberation from the "prison" of the body (Gnostic Heresy).

Burial in a cemetery or another sacred place adequately corresponds to the piety and respect owed to the bodies of the faithful departed who through Baptism have become temples of the Holy Spirit. Through the practice of burying the dead in cemeteries, in churches or their environs, Christian tradition has upheld the relationship between the living and the dead and has opposed any tendency to minimize, or relegate to the purely private sphere, the event of death and the meaning it has for Christians.



Speaking the Iruth in Love

ccording to Saint Paul, the only thing we owe to anyone is love. This is a rule of life which frees us from false demands, and thereby asks more of us than any person could through social pressure. To let ourselves be dominated, manipulated or intimidated by others is the easy way out, even when we tell ourselves that we are acting out of love. Love never acts through or responds to an abusive use of force, whether physical or emotional.

Love must be based on truth because in God (therefore in reality) love, truth and goodness are all one; reality follows the same rule. That is why God tells us through Ezekiel that love requires us to tell people when they are doing wrong. But we constantly give ourselves excuses not to do this.

How many people tell their pastor if they think he is doing something wrong? How many priests write their bishops every time they think he is taking a wrong direction? How many bishops are honest with the pope? Ezekiel would say to us, "If you told your pastor, your bishop or the pope what you think about his decisions, and if he pays no attention to you, God will not hold you responsible. But if you see mistakes

they are making and say nothing, you will be held responsible for all the damage that is done to your parish, to your diocese, to the Church." The same principle holds with family and friends, business associates and politicians. We are not

responsible for what another person does, but we are responsible for lovingly telling others the truth as we see it. And if we do not speak out when we should, we, too, are responsible for all the evil that is done.

Jesus adds something to this principle. "When you tell others what you think they are doing wrong," he says, "do not go in with power. Go in defenseless, vul-

nerable." The process he teaches for resolving differences is the exact opposite of what we usually do.

Usually, when we disagree with what someone is doing, we first talk about it to others. We criticize; we complain; in effect, we gather a lynch mob. We try to make sure that if it ever comes to a confrontation, we have a lot of support at our backs. Then we try to get others to talk to the person or we appeal to higher authorities, saying, "Don't use my name!"

Jesus tells us that our first step should be to go to the person, one on one, and say what we think. This way we have no power; we are vulnerable. This makes

> us more likely to question rather than to accuse, to speak softly instead of yelling, to seek agreement rather than capitulation. This procedure is less threatening and more effective. But we find it a scary thing to do, espe-

cially if the person we are talking to seems to have more power than we do: power to take action against us, to make us look stupid with quick words, to make us look bad by pointing out our own faults.

There is no human power greater than truth spoken in love, but this power does not protect us from retaliation. It is the only power Jesus chose to use to

save the world; when Pilate asked, "Are you a king?", Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to *testify to the truth*. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice" (John 18:37). Then Pilate ordered Jesus to be crucified.

Jesus does not promise we will not suffer for speaking the truth. But he says, "If you seek to save your life on this earth, you will lose it. How do you profit if you gain the whole world and lose your own soul, your self, your person?" We are not on earth to save our lives—or our jobs or our relationships with others if we have to suppress the truth to keep them—but rather to "testify to the truth." The identity we are creating for ourselves, the person we will be for all eternity, is determined by that.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Twenty-Third Week of the Year

Pray daily: God our Father, you redeem us and make us your children in Christ. Look upon us and give us true freedom. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Monday: Luke 6:6-11. Jesus said to them, "I ask you, is it lawful to do good or to do harm on the sabbath, to save life or to destroy it?" Are you afraid to ask challenging questions in response to false values or promises?

Tuesday: Luke 6:12-19. Jesus spent the night in prayer to God. When day came, he called his disciples to himself, and from them he chose the Twelve, whom he also named apostles. Were you chosen and sent to spread the truth, the words of Jesus, just as explicitly as the apostles were? When? How do you do it?

Wednesday: Luke 6:20-26. "Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude you, revile you, and defame you on account of the Son of Man." How often does fear of public opinion keep you from expressing what you know is true?

Thursday: Luke 6:27-38. Jesus said, "Do not judge, and you will not be judged; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned." If you hear something bad about someone, can you avoid judging unless you go to the person as a friend to get the other side of the story?

Friday: Luke 6:39-42. Jesus said, "Why do you see the speck in your neighbor's eye, but do not notice the log in your own eye?" How often does talking honestly to others about faults you think you see in them lead you to discover things in your own attitudes that need correcting? Is this good for you? Does it help you appreciate others more?

Saturday: Luke 6:43-49. Jesus said, "[F] or it is out of the abundance of the heart that the mouth speaks." If you are afraid to say to others what you really believe and think, are you really in touch with your own self? How can fear of losing relationships with others cause you to lose relationship with your own self?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: Ask what you fear more than losing your relationship with Jesus. How can you act against this fear?

As Disciple: The first time this week you find yourself feeling critical of someone, try to find where in the Gospel Jesus says something about what that person is doing.

As Prophet: Think back on what you said or did when you felt critical. Is there a better way you could have handled it or can handle it the next time?

As Priest: Ask how, without giving offense, you can communicate to a person toward whom you felt critical the attitude of Jesus you found in the Gospel. Do it in a loving, nurturing way.

As King: Ask what three things you would like your pastor or bishop to do for the Church. Tell him this by word or letter. Or do this with someone at work or in government—or simply with a friend who could be making a greater impact on the world.

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
