Fr. Mike's Musings

A common question that pastors or funeral planners are asked when dealing with family members of deceased parishioners or who are preparing for their own passing is: "Should Catholics be buried in a Catholic Cemetery?" While there is no mandate, it is highly recommended. It is a natural choice for those who share the same faith in life to continue that sense of community in death. When it comes to the issue of death, the sensibilities and needs of Catholics are unique and call for certain practices in the handling and care of the remains of the deceased. Therefore, in the blessed grounds of a Catholic cemetery, there are safeguards – mandated by the Church's Canon Law – which guarantee permanence, reverence, and respect for the remains of the deceased. But, again, it is not a requirement. My gravesite in Carson City is in the city cemetery next to my parents and grandparents, not across the road in Maryknoll Cemetery where one would naturally expect a priest to be interred.

Another question about Catholic burial practices is: "Who may be buried in a Catholic cemetery?" For this question there are set rules and requirements.

Non-Catholic spouses or relatives of Catholics who purchase the right of burial in a Catholic cemetery can be buried there. Catholic cemeteries have a long tradition of dedicated service to the Catholic community including non-Catholic's spouses, children, parents and other relatives.

Are people of all nationalities welcome? Of course. Remember that the very definition of 'Catholic' is 'Universal', meaning everyone regardless of ethnicity or language. Unfortunately, in the past human prejudices have dictated how a cemetery was laid-out regarding these differences.

To use Maryknoll Cemetery in my hometown as an example, there is a small area in the Northeast section of the grounds that was once dedicated solely to the burial of Hispanics. Even today it is called "Mexican Corner". The rest of the grounds were for the use of Anglos and Irish parishioners of St. Mary's (although there is a very small grouping on the North side comprised of Polish families).

Can someone who committed suicide be buried in a Catholic cemetery? Yes. It is recognized that those who die from the act of suicide deserve understanding and compassion. The deceased may have been suffering from a serious psychological issue or overwhelming fear and confusion. Therefore, the Church offers funeral and burial rites for those who have died as a result of suicide.

Fortunately, the "bad old days" of denying proper burial to suicides, divorced persons, and unbaptized children are long-gone and the idea has, hopefully, forever been chucked into the trash bin of history.

A tradition in the history of cemeteries that has faded in practice is the setting aside a portion of the grounds for the establishing of a "Potter's Field". This section would have been dedicated to the interment of indigent or unknown persons who could not have otherwise been able to purchase a gravesite of their own.

This practice has its roots in Scripture as detailed in the Gospel of Matthew, chapter 27 verses 3-8. The purchase of the potter's field for the burial of foreigners by the Temple authorities with Judas' returned monies is seen as his repentance for the betrayal of Christ, and therefore is an act of reconciliation. The continued practice in the early Church is keeping with the sacramental nature of caring for the dead as well as seeing to the charitable care of our less fortunate brothers and sisters.

If there was such a practice at St. Mary in Marne (St. Michael's cemetery is too recent) please inform the parish office. This ground is unconsecrated as it was also the place where unbaptized children were buried. It is my practice, and that of many other priests, to consecrate the ground and to include those buried there in our prayers. It is a part of our charitable concern for our deceased brothers and sisters, and for those children who never had a chance to enjoy a full life on earth.

Every Moment Counts

Jesus tells of an owner who came into the marketplace at any and every hour of the day and found men standing around idle. Why were there no women? One answer is that in the structure of that society, women probably did not hire themselves out as day laborers the way men did. Women did work in the fields, but more in the context of working as a family.

Even though more and more women work outside the home and even though men are doing more work within households, women are still much more likely to perceive the deeper needs of family members and friends. They are taught to be more relationship-oriented and less likely to bury themselves in work to compensate for rough spots in relationships. If human society is to reach its potential, it can do so only by recognizing the gifts of all its members, including the ability to see which relationships are withering for lack of attention and support.

Isn't it true that women are almost always the first

to think of calling someone who is sick? To remember anniversaries? Aren't women frequently the ones first involved—and who involve men—in issues that politicians tend to overlook.

Could we ask, just as speculation, without falling into simplistic stereotypes, whether men are more likely to identify their "work" as what they are paid to do? Are women more inclined to see building relationships among

people and maintaining a pleasant and supportive environment—on the job and at home—as the constant, ongoing "work" of every human being?

Isaiah 55:6-9; Philippians 1:20c-24, 27a; Matthew 20:1-16a

If these generalizations have any truth, God is more like a woman than a man. When Jesus was criticized for healing on the sabbath, he said: "My Father is still working, and I also am working!" (John 5:17). Jesus was at work twenty-four hours a day, every day, because his work was doing the will of the Father at every moment: loving people back to life at every moment, responding with redemptive, life giving love to each moment's need and opportunity.

And this is our work, whether we are at home or on the job, whether we are praying in church, watching TV or eating in a restaurant. Wherever we are and whatever we are doing, we are the Body of Christ; we are his embodied presence, consecrated and sent to continue his work in that place, at that time, under those particular circumstances, as prophets, priests and stewards of his kingship.

The focus Jesus had, which he invites us to adopt, is not on what we do but on what we are. We do not get our identity from what we do on the job; rather, what

we do on the job or anywhere else should be the expression of what we are. Whatever Jesus did or said, at any moment of his life, he was revealing God. Everything we do and say, the way we dress, the expression on our face, our body language, the atmosphere of our homes, all this should reveal the presence of God in our hearts. This is our work: to be the constant, prophetic expression of God's truth; the constant expression, as priests, of God's healing, ministering love for others; the constant expression, as Christ's coworkers and stewards, of God's constant concern to reform and renew the structures of society. Our work, at every moment, is to extend the reign of God.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Twenty-Fifth Week of the Year

Pray daily: Father, guide us, as you guide creation, according to your law of constant love. May we love one another at every moment and grow to that perfection of love which you hold out to us as the goal of every Christian life. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Monday: Luke 8:16-18. "No one after lighting a lamp hides it under a jar, or puts it under a bed, but puts it on a lampstand, so that those who enter may see the light." Is the light of truth and love within you visible at all times, in everything you do?

Tuesday: Luke 8:19-21. Jesus said to them in reply, "My mother and my brothers are those who hear the word of God and do it." Do you look upon the work of God as your family business?

Wednesday: Luke 9:1-6. Jesus summoned the apostles and gave them power over all demons and to cure diseases, sending them to proclaim the kingdom of God and to heal the sick. Are you conscious of having power from God to proclaim divine truth and to heal woundedness? Do you use it constantly?

Thursday: Luke 9:7-9. Herod Antipas heard about all that was happening and he was greatly perplexed because some people were saying that John had been raised from the dead. What in your life and action makes it evident that Jesus is risen and living in you?

Friday: Luke 9:18-22. Jesus said, "The Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, chief priests, and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised." Are you always aware that your real work in life is to be given and sacrificed for others?

Saturday: Luke 9:43-45. "And all were astounded at the greatness of God...[e] veryone was amazed at all he was doing." Are you aware in everything you do that the goodness and greatness of God should shine out in you?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: Ask when in your day you are least aware of Christ's presence in you? Find some physical, visible way to remind yourself of him.

As Disciple: Think about the goal of being offered for others as Christ's Body in everything you do. Is this an example of how God's thoughts and ways are higher than our thoughts and ways?

As Prophet: Ask what truth or teaching of Jesus seems to be most ignored where you live. What can you do to bear witness to it?

As Priest: Do one thing this week which expresses your belief that power to bring healing to the woundedness of others is within you.

As King: Who in your acquaintance seems to be "standing around idle" without a sense of purpose? Who has a gift that is not being used? Think of a way that person's gift could be put to use and suggest it.
