



Fr. Mike's Musings

A question that always arises in parishes around the country at this time of the year is: 'Should Catholics celebrate Halloween?' Because of the concern of many about Halloween's origins, many Catholic parents wonder if it is OK to let their children celebrate the holiday. Let's be clear: Halloween can be traced back to pagan roots, with a focus on the occult, and we should not be ignorant of that fact. But certainly, in a Christian context, the holiday effectively has been baptized, as its current name suggests, as the eve of All Hallows (an older word referring to saints, referenced in the "halo" saints often are depicted as having on account of their holiness). Halloween falls the day before Catholics celebrate All Saints Day, on November 1st. Of course, in American culture, Halloween has taken on a life of its own.

Although Halloween remains associated with the pagan and occult in the minds of many, that does not necessarily mean that Catholics cannot celebrate Halloween as a cultural event. Americans approach Halloween in a variety of ways. The basic activities associated with the annual fall holiday are carving pumpkins and dressing up in costume for trick-or-treating, neither of which is bad in itself. It can be especially fun to play up the aspects of fall and harvest season, with its omnipresent gourds, decorative corn and dried cornstalks.

Halloween's spooky aspect should not be overplayed, however, by people of faith. Evil spirits and demons are real and should not be invoked or celebrated. There should be some element of prayer associated with Halloween in Catholic households, especially asking protection for those who will tinker around with the occult. As the traditional Scottish prayer goes:

"From ghoulies and ghosties
And long-leggedy beasties
And things that go bump in the night,
Good Lord, deliver us!"

It is OK for Catholics to go trick-or-treating, always keeping in mind the importance for moderation and avoidance of gluttony, as well as remembering good manners to set an example for others; not least of which should be polite behavior when asking neighbors for free candy! Dressing up as something mild, like one's favorite sports player, cartoon character or superhero, is a good approach. Michael Myers, Freddy Kruger, or Hitler are not really good costume choices as they glorify gore and horror as opposed to the "scary fun" of the holiday. Even traditional costumes like ghosts, Count Dracula, or the Wicked Witch of the West can be "scary fun" if consideration has been taken about the roots of these characters and how we wish to present them to those we beseech for goodies—evil, bloodthirsty monsters of pagan lore, or good-natured reflections of a spooky season.

It might even be an option to dress up as real heroes, the Saints. This is a time-honored tradition related with Halloween in which more Catholics could participate. First, it helps teach our children. Why not for Halloween take on the persona of someone we should emulate every other day; one of the saints who shows us how to stay on the path that leads to Heaven? Also, it can be a witness to those around us; an everyday, ordinary way to preach without using words. We can make use of Halloween, as we should all things, to evangelize. So yes, Catholics can celebrate Halloween—play acting in costume, garnering a bag of sweet goodies, getting a slight thrill out of getting/giving a fright, and importantly, giving witness to Christ whether by our dress or by our deportment. On Halloween we can give a treat (evangelization) as well as receiving one.

Religion Dure and Simple

hat are parishes all about, anyway? Why do you gather in church on Sunday morning with other people when you could be relaxing at home? Why do you contribute money to your parish's work when you could be spending it on yourself or on other causes? Every dollar you spend, every minute of your time you spend on anything, is a vote. When you spend time and money on your religion, what are you voting for?

Some might say, "It's an insurance premium for life after death; call it 'future life insurance." Others might say, "I just need this to get me through the week. It helps me cope with the things I deal with in my life—things like stress, temptations, loneliness and fear. Call it my 'moral and psychological fitness program."

Others might say, "I need to get refocused. All week long I'm bombarded by secondary stuff. Every time the phone rings, the door opens or a commercial comes on, my attention is drawn to needs that are not fundamental, to values that are not my basic values, to objectives and goals that are not the real purpose of my existence. I just need to get back in touch with the real meaning of life, with the authentic truth that makes life meaningful and good. Religion is my 'existential compass.' I just need to look at it sometimes."

Others might just say, "Religion is the strongest force there is for preserving law and order and morality in this world. I support it the way I support good education and good government. It is something I need and society needs to keep life civilized on earth." Although religion is all of these things, none of them is religion as Jesus taught it. For Jesus, most simply, religion meant loving God with all one's heart, soul and mind.

And since love seeks union, the more authentic our religion is, the more we will be like God in mind, will and heart, and the more we will love every member of the human race—not only as we love ourselves but as Jesus loves each person.

OCTOBER 29, 2023

30TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Exodus 22:20-26; I Thessalonians 1:5c-10; Matthew 22:34-40

Today's reading from Exodus measures true love of neighbor by the stance we take toward aliens, widows, orphans and the poor—in other words, by the love and compassion we show to those we easily marginalize; those with whom we have no natural bonds through family or social grouping; those whom society tends to consider unimportant; those with whom, by cultural standards, relationship is not rewarding. This is to love as God loves.

The goal of religion—of Christ's religion—is to change and keep changing us, until we love God with all our heart, soul and mind, and love every other member of the human race as God loves.

After his visit to the tombs of Archbishop Romero and of the nuns, laywomen and Jesuits who were martyred in El Salvador, Archbishop Rembert Weakland said: "What set these people apart is that they stood for a kind of religion—a religious belief—that influences lives. Religion, for them, was not a case of obeying rules but of influencing lives—and that is very threatening to those who want to keep order. But if religion doesn't influence lives, why bother with it?" (Paul Wilkes, *The Education of an Archbishop*, Orbis Books, 1992).

If our religion simply makes us moral people or what our culture recognizes as "good Christians," we will not influence anybody as Jesus did (that is, bear witness, which is what the word *martyr* means). For that we have to accept those whom society does not

accept, to help others in ways society would call exaggerated. In short, we have to be imitators of Christ, the Lamb of God, and put our bodies on the line daily, just as he offered his body to take away the sins of the world.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Thirtieth Week of the Year

Pray daily: Praised be you, God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. There is no power for good that does not come from your covenant, and no promise to hope in that your love has not offered. Strengthen our faith to accept your covenant and give us the love to carry out your command. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Monday: Luke 13:10-17. When Jesus saw the woman who had been sick for eighteen years, he called to her and said, "Woman, you are set free from your ailment." Do you know anyone who is sick or wounded in any way? What can you do to help?

Tuesday: Luke 13:18-21. Jesus said, "[The kingdom of God] is like yeast that a woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour until all of it was leavened." What effect do you have on those around you? How do you leaven (lift up) their attitudes, values, spirits?

Wednesday: Luke 13:22-30. Jesus said, "Strive to enter through the narrow door." Why is a straight line the narrowest concept that exists? (Ask a mathematician.) What is the difference between "keeping in bounds" (broad or narrow) and directing every choice toward Jesus as imitators of Christ? Which is the "narrower" way?

Thursday: Luke 13:31-35. "Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to it! How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under

her wings, and you were not willing!" Why are people threatened by a religion that asks more than law observance? What more are you giving than obedience to God's laws?

Friday: Luke 14:1-6. Jesus said, "If one of you has a child or an ox that has fallen into a well, will you not immediately pull it out on a sabbath day?" Do you ever use your religion as an excuse for not helping people? For example, do you ever say, "The Church doesn't say I have to do this" when you feel you should do something?

Saturday: Luke 14:1, 7-11. Jesus said, "For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted." In how many different ways could love call you to "humble" yourself?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: Do one thing daily that expresses unambiguously that your whole religion, your entire life, is focused on growing in relationship with Jesus Christ. Daily Mass? Prayer time? A way of loving and serving others?

As Disciple: Read one Gospel through (or one chapter, if time is short), making a list of every reason you find for loving God.

As Prophet: Ask what actions or visible characteristics of your life-style have the most influence on others. How can you make sure that your actions bear witness to the values Jesus lived and taught?

As Priest: Offer yourself consciously with Jesus as Lamb of God before Communion, thinking about what this means in practice for your life. How can you "take away" the effects of sin in your world?

As King: Ask what influence your parish is having on your neighborhood or city. What can you do to make religion in your parish a love of God and others that has an impact on society?
