Fr Mike's Musings

"I want patience and I want it now," or so the joke goes. Fine. But we must remember, the purpose of Advent is to wait. Did you ever stay awake on Christmas Eve as a child and sneak into a hiding place in order to see the Christmas tree being decorated? I surely did. I was impatient. We kids also had big felt stockings hung on each of the doors to our rooms and I remember during the night trying to keep an eye open to see Santa putting goodies into it. Did I keep my eyes open all night? No. I woke in the morning to find a bulging stocking, mysteriously full, having arrived by magic. So, I had gone to sleep instead of patiently spying. Patience is not often a virtue of the young.

Gerard Manley Hopkins, the Jesuit poet, has a poem on patience that speaks to Advent.

Patience, hard thing! The hard thing but to pray, but bid for, patience is! Patience who asks, wants war, wants wounds; weary His times, His tasks; to do without, take tosses, and obey. (Patience is difficult because it grows only in

Rare patience roots in these and, these away, Nowhere. Natural heart's -ivy, Patience masks our ruins of wrecked past purpose. There she basks purple eyes and seas of liquid leaves all day.

(Like ivy it gradually covers the failures of our lives with quiet beauty.)

We hear our hearts grate on themselves; it kills to bruise them dearer. Yet the rebellious wills of us we do bid God bend to Him even so.

(Our hearts are like stones chafing on each other, bruising themselves at a greater cost. Yet, we ask God to bend our defiant wills to Him.)

And where is He who more and more distils delicious kindness?—He is patient. Patience fills His crisp combs, and that comes those ways we know. (Comparison of God to the bees who—patiently—fill up honeycombs.)

Our most beloved plans and purposes often come to ruin, just like ancient buildings. But patience resembles beautiful ivy, Hopkins says, gradually spreading its way over the rubble, making it a picture of quiet composure. The phrase, "purple eyes and seas of liquid leaves," doesn't just remind us of how ivy looks, it bathes us in the luxury, the peace and the relief of such a sight. Hopkins portrays patience as "delicious kindness," a honey that fills the combs of our lives. A gift to us.

God's kindness provides us with comfort and also time to prepare—an allowance of days, weeks, years, and even a lifetime—to get ready, to desire, and gradually, along the way, to receive. With patience. Even though infants demand their every wish be granted right now, our adult humanity is simply too deep to get an instant fill-up.

If there were nothing worth waiting for, then patience would be silly. The birth of Christ into this world and into our hearts is well worth the wait. We know that His birth has happened already. But also, in a surprising way, it has not happened at all. We are still uncharitable to our neighbors. We still hide the truth from those who love us. We envy and lust after what is not ours, and there is horrendous evil all around us in this 21st Century. We need the birth of Jesus into our hearts, into the world. And so we bask in the patience of Advent.





Openness to Change: Blessed Are Those Who Mourn

ny new beginning means accepting change. Growth presupposes change. And any acceptance of Jesus Christ—or any deeper, more fulfilling acceptance of him—takes place in an act of simultaneously opening and delivering ourselves to change.

When John the Baptizer appeared on the scene "proclaiming a baptism of repentance," he was preaching change. He was saying that only change can "lead to the forgiveness of sins." And only change can lead us deeper into relationship with Jesus Christ. Only change can free us from what holds us back from the fullness of life. Only change can open us to the clarity his light gives to our lives, to the joy his love brings to individuals and families, to working days and weekends. Only change can make peace possible in the world. Change is the price we pay for life.

The strange thing is that we fear change more than pain! Psychologists say that animals will change their habits rather than endure pain, but humans won't. I heard this in a class and did not believe it. Years later I

asked a practicing psychologist about it, who said, "I see that every day!"

"People will endure the pain of an unsatisfying marriage for years rather than open themselves to changes by seeking counseling." Many people prefer to endure physical pain as long as they can instead of seeing a doctor and perhaps having to adapt to an unknown diagnosis or treatment. How many times have we all chosen to put up with some pain or dissatisfaction we are used to rather than take the risk of making a major change in our lives?

2ND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11; 2 Peter 3:8-14; Mark 1:1-8

What is behind this is fear of the unknown; fear of facing something we do not want to face; fear of knowing something we do not want to know; fear of a challenge we may not want to meet. We make a proverb of the ostrich who buries his head in the ground at the approach of danger in order to feel safe, but we do the same thing. We "put our heads under the pil-

low" by burying ourselves in distractions: in TV or social media, in work, in talking with others, in anything that blocks out the questions we do not want to hear, the options we do not want to think about. We

make sure we do not have time to pray.

That is why the spiritual life is always, in some sense and to some degree, a call to "go out into the desert." There are voices that cry in the desert—voices like that of John proclaiming the good news of change, the good news of repentance and "life to the full." Voices that cannot be heard in the "city," where there are bright lights to blind us and street bustle to deafen us and idols available to take the place of God.

When Jesus says, "Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted," he is inviting us to go out into the desert, to listen to the voices we think we do not want to hear, to open ourselves to that wind of change which is the gentle breeze or the roaring tornado of the Holy Spirit. He is saying, "Look at those things you are afraid of, think the thoughts you are suppressing, face the pain, the dissatisfaction in your life: there is a solution!" Blessed are those who face all the things they have to mourn, for they—and they alone—will find peace, will find comfort, will find joy.

This is not just good psychological advice. The promise of Jesus is not based on the good, homey wisdom that it is better to face reality than to bury your head in the sand. The assurance of comfort Jesus gives is a promise he makes only because "the reign of God is at hand." Jesus does not say just because we face our problems everything will be all right.

He says that redemption, deliverance, healing, the fullness of life is at hand; that all this is present in our world now, is offered—he offers it. There is comfort for those who face the truth of this world only if they believe in the truth of Christ.

And even then, only for those of us who are willing to open ourselves to change.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Second Week of Advent

Pray daily: Lord, you came that we might have life and have it to the full. Teach me to look clearly at what diminishes my life, believing that through interaction with you all things can be turned into good.

Monday: Luke 5:17-26. Some men brought on a stretcher a man who was paralyzed. When Jesus saw their faith, he said, "Friend, your sins are forgiven you." Would you have preferred to hear these words or "Stand up and walk!"? Why? What afflicts you more: sickness, failure, or distance from Christ?

Tuesday: Matthew 18:12-14. "If a shepherd has a hundred sheep and one of them has gone astray, does he not leave the 99 on the mountains and go in search of

the one that went astray?" What do you feel is most missing in your life? How are you going in search of it?

Wednesday: "Take my yoke upon you and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls." What is the difference between taking Christ's yoke and learning from him? Which are you more conscious of doing?

Thursday: Matthew 11:11-15. "Let anyone with ears listen!" What is the difference between hearing Jesus' words and listening? Which do you do most often during Mass?

Friday: Matthew 11:16-19."We played the flute for you, and you did not dance; / we wailed, and you did not mourn." When have you reacted with feeling to something Jesus said? What seems to influence your reaction?

Saturday: Matthew 17:10-13. "Elijah has already come, and they did not recognize him, but they did to him whatever they pleased ... Then the disciples understood that he was speaking to them about John the Baptist." Are there things you have come to see in the Gospels that you did not understand before? Is this because you changed?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: At the end of each day this week, look back and pick one thing that Jesus would want you to mourn over and one thing he would want you to rejoice in.

As Disciple: Try to think of some words or examples of Jesus that cast light on what you mourn over and what you rejoice in.

As Prophet: Visibly express in some way your mourning or your rejoicing each day. Try to express the Christian reason for it.

As Priest: Comfort someone who is mourning.

As King: Try to change one source of annoyance, anger, discouragement or sadness in the environment where you live or work.
