Fr Mike's Musings

At this time of year when families are reunited and as we celebrate the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, we reflect on what it is to be a family. The family is the basic unit of society and the Church. It is in the family that we first learn to communicate, and that we learn what is good and bad. It is in the family that we learn what love is because it is in the family that we first receive love. It is in the family that we first learn to forgive and to pray. It is in the family that



we first learn about God and Jesus and Our Lady, It is in the family that we learn to value ourselves and to value everything else, picking up our values from what is said and unsaid by our parents. Our family forms us for many years to come. The future of humanity depends on the family because it is through a family that we all come.

Is our family fulfilling God's plan for our family? We desire our families to be the best possible families for our children so that they get the best possible start in life. It is important to reflect on how our family fulfils God's plan because the family we grow up in influences us for the rest of our lives. When families reflect God's plan, they are mighty. What is God's plan for the family?

"Have you not read that the Creator from the beginning made them male and female and that he said: This is why a man leaves his father and mother and becomes attached to his wife, and the two become one flesh? They are no longer two therefore, but one flesh. So then, what God has united, human beings must not divide." (Matthew 19:4-6) These are very clear words about God's plan for the family. It is a man and woman who become one flesh and what God has united man must not divide.

In the Letter to the Ephesians, we read that husbands are to love their wives as much as Christ loved the Church (Ephesians 5:25). How much did Jesus love the Church? He loved the Church so much that He died for the Church. That is how much husbands are to love their wives; husbands are to love their wives as Christ loved the Church. Husbands are to love their wives as much as they love themselves.

What about parents and children? Again, Ephesians states: "Children be obedient to your parents in the Lord—that is what uprightness demands." (Ephesians 6:1) Do children always love their parents as they should? Or have devolved to the point of where the command is reversed and parents are expected to obey their children. The passage goes on to say, "Parents, never drive your children to resentment." (Ephesians 6:4) So, according to scripture the familial relationship is to be one of cooperation, "giveand-take", rather than one of strict obedience and subservience.

If our families are to be families reflecting God's plan, then they will also be families that put God first. Can we turn off the TV every night to pray together as a family? If faith in God is not what motivates a family, that family is starting-off at a disadvantage. Let us put Jesus in the center of our families: "Let the message of Christ in all its richness find a home with you." (Colossians 3:16)



Portrait of a Family: Blessed Are the Merciful

t seems strange to us that a woman would have to be "purified" after childbirth; even stranger, perhaps, that the reason behind this Jewish law was the fact that birth involves the shedding of blood (see Leviticus 12:1-8).

Isn't it true, however, that blood is always a sign to us that something is wrong? We associate blood with sickness, pain and death—none of which God wanted in his world (see Genesis 3:16-19; Romans 5:12-6:23). It is reasonable, then, that whenever blood becomes visible (or hurt, or sin, or death), God would require some visible act of response on our part to "make sense" out of what does not make sense: to integrate into the universe something that does not belong there. And what is it that gives a value, a role in human life to blood and pain?

It is sacrifice. In her blood a woman gives life to a child. In his blood Jesus gave life to the world.

Through our blood—the sacrifices we make in love—we give life to one another.

Did God require a ritual sacrifice every time blood was

shed in order to teach us that blood and pain are purified of meaninglessness only through sacrifice? The pain we transform into love becomes the wine of the wedding feast. The "hour" of our redemption is the moment when blood is poured out as wine, and the wine is a pledge of love (see John 2:1-11).

This is how priesthood and marriage are one: they are both dedications to giving life through the offering of ourselves. This offering has as its goal the formation of communities of grace. Matrimony is a consecration to forming Christian community in the home; Holy Orders on the level of the local Church. Together they are the sign that the world can be redeemed if we radically offer ourselves to be united in love.

DECEMBER 31, 2023 THE HOLY FAMILY

Sirach 3:2-6, 12-14; Colossians 3:12-21; Luke 2:22-40

Today's Gospel story combines two themes: purification from blood and the presentation/consecration of a firstborn child to God. Because God delivered the Jews from slavery by sacrificing every firstborn son in Egypt, every firstborn male in Israel belonged to God and had

to be "bought back." This was done in two ways: by an offering, and by the consecration of the Levites (Numbers 18:16, 8:16). Of them God said, "I have taken them for myself in place of every firstborn." The tribe of Levi, then, was "sacrificed"

("made sacred," set aside) for priestly service as a sign that they were taken by God in place of firstborn sons.

In Jesus, both themes come together. As firstborn he was consecrated for our redemption (see 1 Corinthians 15:20 ff. and John 17:19). As Priest he overcame sin and death by offering his blood on the cross as the wine of the wedding feast to bring the world together into unity in love.

The Church combines both themes, not only in this one Gospel story, but by celebrating the Purification of Mary and the Presentation of Jesus as one feast (February 2). And by selecting this Gospel for the feast of the Holy Family, the Church calls our attention to the connection there is between the same two themes in fami-

ly life. Every Christian family is a community of people consecrated to the Lord as priests and dedicated to redeeming the whole human race through the offering of themselves—of their blood and pain and sacrifices—in love.

The Levites were offered in place of the firstborn of Israel only. But every Christian baptized into the priesthood of Christ is offered, as Jesus was, to "buy back" every other member of the human race. And the way we live out this offering is by trying to bring about that community—that oneness of all people with each other and with God—which Jesus came to accomplish (see Ephesians 1:10). Christian families exist not just to take care of one another, but to offer, to "sacrifice" themselves to bring about unity in the whole human race. When Jesus teaches, "Blessed are the merciful" (those who help others out of a sense of relatedness), he is calling us to be one family on earth: to consecrate and offer ourselves for this.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Pray daily: Lord, by taking flesh in Mary you made her the Mother of God. By continuing your life and mission in me you have made me the Body of Christ. Join me to you in mind and heart and desire. Amen.

January 1: Luke 2:16-21. "The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen." How do you praise and glorify God in your life? How do you spread the Good News to others?

January 2: John 1:19-28. "This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' he confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, 'I am not the Messiah." Would you answer in the same way? Is Jesus continuing his work as Messiah in you? How?

January 3: John 1:29-34. John said, "The one who sent me to baptize with water said to me, 'He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is the one who baptizes with the Holy Spirit." Has the Holy Spirit come down on you? Does he remain with you? How does the power of the Spirit show itself in what you do?

January 4: Wednesday: John 1:35-42. "Andrew first found his brother Simon and said to him, 'We have found the Messiah' (which is translated 'Anointed'). He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, 'You are Simon, son of John. You are to be called Cephas' (which is translated Peter)." When were you first brought to Jesus? What did he say to you? Did he give you a name? A mission? What is it?

January 5: John 1:43-51. Nathanael said to Philip, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Philip said to him, "Come and see." Do you think anything good can come of you? How good? Why?

January 6: Mark 1:7-11. This is what John proclaimed: "One who is more powerful than I is coming after me. I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thongs of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit." When were you baptized with the Holy Spirit? What effect did it have on you? How is that visible in your life?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: See how you feel saying to yourself, "I am the body of Christ. I am the embodied presence of Jesus in the world."

As Disciple: Read Romans, chapter 12. Relate what you read to yourself.

As Prophet: Examine your room, your home, your workplace. Is there anything visible that is unworthy of the body of Christ?

As Priest: At the Eucharist, offer yourself in Christ and with Christ as his Body. Think of what it means to be offered with him as a "living sacrifice" for the life of the world in everything you do all day.

As King: Notice the living conditions in the parts of town you drive through. Are they worthy of the body of Christ? What about the environment where you work? What do you see in your city which is unworthy of the body of Christ? What can you do about it?

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
