





Priesthood Discernment Meetings



Fr Mike's Musings

Having promoted the Old Testament up to now we must admit that there is a progression from the Old to the New Testament whereby legalistic observance is superseded by new perception of the spirit of love which underlies the Law and must be the true yardstick of its application into our faith lives. Dei Verbum, the Second Vatican



Jesus always confirmed the validity of the Ten Commandments but relativized the importance of the oral Jewish laws. The Jewish cleanliness rules are to be found in the book of Leviticus, those on clean and unclean food in Leviticus Chapter II are a good example of this relativization. In dramatic contrast to the cleanliness rules in Leviticus, Jesus in Mark 7:14-23 pronounced all foods to be clean. Contact with a corpse made one unclean according to Numbers 19:11-19 but Jesus took the dead daughter of Jairus by the hand (Luke 8:54 and Matthew Chapter 9). Jesus also took liberty with regard to the Sabbath laws by curing others and allowing His disciples to pick corn on the Sabbath (Mark 2:23-3.6 and Matthew Chapter 12 and Luke Chapter 6).

According to Leviticus Chapters 13-14 leprosy and skin diseases made one unclean but Jesus touched the lepers when healing them (Mark 1:40-45 and Matthew Chapter 8 and Luke Chapter 5). We do not see the laws about priests and sacrifices being observed in the New Testament, but the moral teaching of the Prophets is still considered valid. But most of the Old Testament does have a value on its own and should not be devalued merely because it is composed before the time of Jesus and the early Church.

If we never read the Old Testament we would miss out on a fine and edifying piece of literature. Most people, Christian and non-Christian alike, agree that the Book of Job is the finest reflection on the mystery of human suffering. There are some Old Testament passages which children especially love: think of how popular the musical "Joseph and his Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat" is or the animated film "Prince of Egypt".

If you have not already found your favorite passages in the Old Testament, I hope you do during this course of re-reading the scriptures, and I hope you enjoy your reading of the Old Testament and that it strengthens you in your relationship with God. St. Augustine encapsulates the relationship between the Old and New Testaments with a beautiful analysis of the two: "The New is concealed in the Old Testament, the Old is revealed in the New." Christians trace their lineage from the Jews, and the Jews recorded their faith history in the Old Testament. To disregard the Old Testament is to disregard ourselves as a people of faith, rooted in the past that prefigures and guides us to our future destiny in and through Jesus Christ, the Lord.

The Anger of Jesus

hen Jesus drove the hucksters and money-changers out of the temple, was this the same Jesus who extended the commandment "You shall not kill" to forbid even anger, insults, and interior contempt for others (see Matthew 5:21-26)? Is the Jesus whom we see knocking over tables and driving out animals with a whip the same Jesus who said, "turn the other cheek" and "love your enemies" (Matthew 5:38-48)?

Actually, what Jesus gives us here is an example of how to live out his teaching on anger. As one of the "capital sins," anger is a source of much evil. But this means abiding, chronic and usually unacknowledged anger which distorts our attitudes and infects our behavior. This happens when we let our anger "grow" in us. In itself, however, anger is just a natural reaction that is part of the human nature God created. There is no fault at all in feeling angry, any more than in feeling hungry or cold or scared. Like every emotion, anger can be put to good uses or bad. In today's Gospel Jesus shows us how to use anger as an expression of love.

Love seeks union of mind and heart. Love works through communication. Expressing anger can say to another how strongly one feels about something—even about that person. What father who appreciates how beautiful his daughter is could hear her use ugly words and not get angry? Anger that is a revelation of one's own heart for the sake of evoking a beautiful response

from another's heart is love. Anger which just tries to silence—or to kill—another is not. Anger can energize us, bring us to life and empower us to act. If the expression of our anger brings others to life in a good way, and aims at this, it is love.

To act out of anger in a way that kills something in another which could have blossomed into life is bad.

MARCH 3, 2024

3RD SUNDAY OF LENT

Exodus 20:1-17; 1 Corinthians 1:22-25; John 2:13-25

Jesus' anger in the temple showed how much he cared about people, and it was directed to bringing about a change of heart in those to whom he expressed it. Jesus did not insult the merchants. By quoting Scripture to them he acknowledged their faith and the bond he had with them as fellow Jews (see Matthew 21:13; Mark 11:17). By saying they had turned God's house into a

"den of thieves" he was not saying they were bad people but reminding them of how good they were called to be. When a mother tells her son his room "looks like a pigpen" she is saying precisely that he is not a pig and should not live like one. By expressing the anger he felt, Jesus was trying to show people what they were doing and how bad it was, so that they would change.

Jesus did no violence, either to persons or property. He knocked over tables full of money—which would not break. He picked up some pieces of rope and used them to drive out animals. He told the dove sellers to take their birds outside, but he did not release the doves to fly away. The violent expression of his feelings was for the sake of communication; it was not violence directed against

anyone.

Jesus tried by his gesture in the temple to bring his enemies to truth, as he taught in the Sermon on the Mount (see Matthew 5:24-25). It was not going to work, and when it didn't, he did not fight but let them "destroy the temple" of his body on the cross (see John 2:18-22). Jesus did not use anger to destroy others, but in the hope of bringing others to life, even when he knew it would lead to his own death.

Jesus was not a man who stood meekly by and let evil go unchallenged. He did not use violence to overcome evil, but he did take forceful measures against it. What he used above all was the testimony of the truth, to which he gave force through the passionate expression of his own feelings. The gentleness and respectful love of enemies he teaches is not an excuse to stand by and do nothing about evil. It is a call to risk speaking the truth and even to accept our death in an effort to bring people together in unity, love and peace.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Third Week of the Lent

Pray daily: Lord, teach me to put aside all anger except that which comes from love. And teach me to use anger to affirm others' value, never to insult them.

Monday: Luke 4:24-30. "There were also many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Elisha, and none of them was cleansed except Naaman the Syrian." Read Naaman's story in 2 Kings, chapter 5. How did the slave girl help him? Whom could you help in the same way?

Tuesday: Matthew 18:21-35. 'The servant who had been forgiven a huge debt found one of his fellow servants, who owed him a very small amount. He started to choke the man, demanding, 'Pay back what you owe." Are you more likely to seek out and deal with people who owe you (or have wronged you), or to notice and take care of those whom you can help?

Wednesday: Matthew 5:17-19. "Whoever does [the least of the commandments] and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven." Is your focus

as a Christian just to keep God's law yourself—or to help others keep it? How can you "teach" others?

Thursday: Luke 11:14-23. "Whoever does not gather with me scatters." Is it the person of Jesus that you try to bring people into contact with? Or do you just talk about "religion" and "the Church"? What is (and is not) the difference?

Friday: Mark 12:28-34. "The second [commandment] is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself." If you left the Church, how would you want others to "seek you out"? Do you welcome others' efforts to involve you more in your parish? Why?

Saturday: Luke 18:9-14. "The Pharisee prayed, 'O God, I thank you that I am not like other people: thieves, rogues, adulterers, or even like this tax collector." When you see others' faults, are you more likely to judge and condemn them or to try to help and heal them? Is your basic attitude that of a judge or a minister of Christ's healing love?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: Each time you get angry, ask how you can respond to the situation in a way that shows you are aware that Jesus, not you, is the Savior of the world.

As Disciple: List the three things that make you angry most often. Opposite each, list the value that you are trying to defend with your anger. Ask if there is a better way to defend it.

As Prophet: Each time you get angry or show impatience, do something loving for someone immediately afterwards (not necessarily the same person who made you angry).

As Priest: Each day go out of your way to do something loving for someone who has made you angry recently or frequently does so.

As King: See if you can change or remove one thing that irritates people or makes them angry where you live or work.

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
