





Fr Mike's Musings

A recent Pew Research Center survey finds that most self-described Catholics don't believe the Church's core teaching on the Real Presence in the elements of the Eucharist. In fact, nearly seven-in-ten Catholics (69%) say they personally believe that during Catholic Mass, the bread and wine used in Communion are symbols of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. Just one-third of U.S. Catholics (31%) say they believe that during Mass, the bread and wine actually become the Body and Blood of Jesus.

In addition to asking Catholics what they believe about the Eucharist, the new survey also included a question that tested whether Catholics know what the Church teaches on the subject. Most Catholics who believe that the bread and wine are symbolic do not know that the Church holds that Transubstantiation occurs. Approximately one-in-five Catholics (22%) reject the idea of Transubstantiation, even though they know about the Church's teaching. The vast majority of those who believe that the bread and wine actually become the Body and Blood of Christ – 28% of all Catholics – do know that this is what the Church teaches. A small share of Catholics (3%) professes to believe in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist despite not fully knowing the Church's teaching on Transubstantiation.

The Catholic doctrine of the Real Presence is the belief that Jesus Christ is literally, not symbolically, present in the Holy Eucharist—Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity. Catholics believe in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist because Jesus tells us this is true in the Bible: "I am the bread of life. Your fathers ate the manna in the wilderness, and they died. This is the bread which comes down from Heaven, that a man may eat of it and not die. I am the living bread which came down from Heaven; if anyone eats of this bread, he will live forever; and the bread which I shall give for the life of the world is my flesh. The Jews then disputed among themselves, saying, 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?' Jesus said to them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of man and drink his blood, you have no life in you; he who eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up at the last day. For my flesh is food indeed, and my blood is drink indeed. He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood abides in me, and I in him" (John 6:48-56).

When Catholics receive Holy Communion, it is an expression of the unity among all those in communion with the Catholic Church throughout the world, who maintain the belief in the Real Eucharistic Presence of Christ. Therefore, only those who believe in the Real Presence may participate in this sacrament of oneness with Christ and His Church. Catholics believe that we cannot celebrate this unifying sacrament with other Christians while there are still disagreements about the Eucharist itself. However, Catholics pray for the day when we can reconcile with other Christians and share in the unity of God's people through the Holy Eucharist.

Because the Eucharist is so important, the Church teaches that there are certain requirements someone must meet to be able to receive the Eucharist at Mass.

The person must be baptized Catholic (Eastern Orthodox are also allowed to receive).

The person must be in a state of grace and has been through the Sacrament of Reconciliation (i.e. not be aware of any unconfessed mortal sins).

The person must have fasted for at least one hour before receiving the Eucharist. Drinking water is okay, but for anything else to be acceptable, it must be medically necessary.

The Eucharist is a great gift that allows us an unparalleled union with Jesus Christ. However, another element of the communion in the Eucharist is communion with the Church. When we receive the Eucharist, we are saying, "I am in communion with the Church that has been entrusted with this Eucharist."

To Save Our Souls

hen Jesus says, "Those who love their life lose it," (John 12:25; Matthew 16:25-26) this is a deliberate play on words. The word he uses for "life" is psyche, which means "soul." It refers to whatever it is that goes out of us when we die and, while we are alive, makes us the unique persons we are. The psyche is the spiritual core in us, the "self" which gives human value to life and survives death. Jesus is saying that if we focus on saving our lives, we will lose the meaning and value of life itself.

This applies to more than physical survival. We can save our business or job while losing the joy prosperity could give us. We can save our country by means which destroy whatever gave the "American way of life" its original meaning and value. We can save a marriage by compromises which kill its soul or seek fulfillment in a way that ruins us as persons.

The lesson of the cross is that crucifixion can be the only way to joy, and accepting the death of something

we desire can be the only way to attain it. The key to this is to understand the role of the psyche in our lives. What does it mean to "save" or "lose" our soul?

It is too simplistic to say, "To save our soul is to get to heaven." Heaven and hell are not places but conditions of being. Our joy or misery after death comes from what

we are. "Heaven" means to enjoy God's own happiness by sharing in God's own life. Our psyche is "in heaven" when it knows and loves in perfect union with God. We are "in hell" when our soul has nothing but itself to know and love. That is why we have already lost or found our souls—ourselves, our lives—on this earth in the measure that we have rejected or accepted union with God through faith, hope and love.

The essential task of life, then, is to save—to preserve from corruption, to bring to total fulfillment—our souls,

that inner core of self in each of us which is the seat of our knowing and choosing. Nothing can replace this or substitute for it. As Jesus said, "What do you gain by winning everything in the world if you lose your psyche, your inner self, in the process?" (Matthew 16:26). And to show how radically he meant—and believed—this, Jesus refused to save himself from the cross, and he refuses to be the kind of Savior whose pledge is to save us from death, oppression, sickness or emotional pain.

He sometimes does save us from these, but that is not what he came to do, and that is not what salvation really means.

Giving this the acid test by applying it to one of the most challenging areas of daily life, Jesus abolished divorce. By doing so he changed the goal of marriage from a partnership aimed at

mutual help and happiness on earth as described in the last chapter of Proverbs, to a school of enduring love. A "successful" marriage is not one in which the spouses make life more enjoyable for each other, but one in which both are learning to love. Even a crucifying marriage is a successful one if both partners are learning how to love, because then they are saving their psyches, their inner selves, their souls. They are becoming like God.

What Jesus promises is the power to save our souls by loving back no matter what happens to us. This is what

he did on the cross, and it is what he does for us as Savior.

This is the only thing he absolutely promises to do for us as Savior: to give us the power to love one another in the same way that he showed his love for us on earth—by loving back no matter what we suffer. We can only do this, of course, by loving God above all things as revealed to us by the Holy Spirit in our hearts.

When Jesus abolished divorce, what he really did was proclaim that we now have the power through grace to do what God alone can do: to speak a word whose effect endures forever. We can speak words of irrevocable commitment, of unconditional love. To do this is to experience what it means to save our soul.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Fifth Week of Lent

Pray daily: Lord, you came that we might have life and have it to the full. Teach me to live by all of your teachings with trust, even when I cannot see how they are enriching or enhancing my life.

Monday: John 8:1-11. "Early in the morning [Jesus] came again to the temple area. All the people came to him, and he sat down and began to teach them." Do you feel called to teach those around you? How could you?

Tuesday: Luke 2:41-51a. Mary and Joseph search for Jesus after leaving him in Jerusalem. They find him in the temple "sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions." In what ways are you being called to listen and learn? Do you make space to listen to God's message from your spiritual community?

Wednesday: John 8:31-42. "I declare what I have seen in the Father's presence; as for you, you should do what you have heard from the Father." In what ways have you heard the Father's voice calling you to minister to others? How much time do you spend "in the Father's presence," thinking about his desires?

Thursday: John 8:51-59. "Very truly, I tell you, whoever keeps my word will never see death." Do you really believe that by losing yourself in love for others you will have a happier life? How can you do this?

Friday: John 10:31-42. "If I do [the Father's works], even though you do not believe me, believe the works, so that you may know and understand that the Father is in me and I am in the Father." Have you ever felt, in ministering to others, that you are truly united with Christ and a child of God? What have you experienced?

Saturday: John 11:45-57. "It is better for you to have one man die for the people than to have the whole nation destroyed." Jesus sacrificed himself for the good of the whole human race. In how many ways, large or small, could you sacrifice yourself for the common good of the different communities you are involved with?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: Ask yourself these hard questions: What are you willing to die for? What are you living for?

As Disciple: Think back: Has sinning enhanced your life? How has it diminished it? Have you ever experienced sin as making you lose your own deepest, personal identity and self?

As Prophet: Wear or put something in your office or room which expresses the fact that Jesus gave a whole new focus to life by dying and rising.

As Priest: Forgive in your heart all who have injured you (by wishing them conversion and life everlasting; not by trying to "feel good" about them). If possible, do something loving for them, for example, by participating in Eucharist one weekday or saying some prayers for that person.

As King: Question in conversation how important "survival" is—for yourself, for the nation, for your school or business. See if survival seems to take precedence over serving God.

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
