



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Fr Mike's Musings

Over the past two weekends a number of our youth in our parish families received their First Communion. It is a time of great joy for these children, their families, and for all of us at St. Mary and St. Michael. These children have been preparing for this moment for quite a while. The was a feeling of excitement and enthusiasm that was palpable when I met with them throughout the course of the past faith formation year. We must extend our thanks to our faith formation

coordinator and to our catechists for creating that atmosphere, because it is meant to be an exciting time in the faith journeys of these children. Pray that they never lose this enthusiasm for Christ in their lives.

The Eucharist is a time to remember what Jesus Christ did for us on the Cross. The bread and wine becoming His Body and Blood are tangible, physical reminders of Christ's love for us. Every time we eat and drink, it is a reminder of the sacrifice of Christ. Just as we depend on food and drink to survive physically, we can only live spiritually through Jesus Christ because of His sacrifice.

At the same time, communion is also a time to examine ourselves and our walk with God, as instructed. Are we walking out our faith and living in an active relationship with Jesus, allowing the Holy Spirit to move in our lives and to sanctify us. Or are we living life according to our choices and only partaking in the Eucharist ritualistically? It's all about communion and fellowship with God. The dictionary describes 'communion' as: "a close relationship with someone in which feelings and thoughts are exchanged:"

The Eucharist is a relationship that is close and special. A relationship where we enjoy the presence of one another and give importance to spending time with them. This could be our spouses or our best friends, or someone we confide in very deeply and closely. Our fellowship with God must be greater than these. Do we love God in such a manner, do we magnify Him, do we long to be in His presence, do we thirst to hear from Him, and value the time we give to God?

How much time we spend with God? Time is a precious commodity that we give to things that mean something to us. We give our time to our work because it pays our bills. We give time to our families because they are special to us, we take time to go on vacations or have "me-time", etc. How much time do we give to fellowship with God? The answer to this question reveals how much we treasure Christ and love God? Is Christ our delight and the love of our lives? We seek to find satisfaction in the things that we want to achieve, but the truth is that we will only truly be satisfied when we are satisfied in Christ.

As we examine ourselves, some of us may feel unworthy to come to Him, thinking that we are not good enough, that we are constantly failing in your walk with God and that we have "blown it" yet again. I want to remind and encourage all of you; this is the very reason Christ died, and that is why He came for us. This is the supreme irony of the Gospel. The only way to be worthy of Him is to admit that we are completely unworthy of Him.

Enter the mercy of God and allow Him to work in our lives as we adore and love Him. The Holy Spirit will transform us into His likeness, day by day. Everything that we do must flow from our heart's desire for God and because of our love for Him. When we realize our unworthiness and the extent of God's sacrifice for us, to rescue us and give us hope for the future, how can we not fall entirely in love with Jesus Christ.

Baptism Commits Us to a Reliving

Jesus triumphs in us....

and we are sent to proclaim

his victory to the world.

n his Resurrection appearances, Jesus teaches his apostles—and us—how to "be Jesus": how to carry Lon his life and mission as his Body on earth. This means, however, that each one of us, in some way, must relive the pattern of his own life, death and resurrection.

Jesus came to be the recurring "Crisis" in people's lives. Again and again, he presented people with challenging choices to make, so that they might grow. After his resurrection he continues: he comes to his disciples on a discouraging day, when the fishing is bad, and without revealing his identity, calls them to an act of faith and hope: "Cast your net on the starboard side, and you will find something."

Today it is we, as the risen Body of Christ on earth, who are sent to call people to faith and hope and growth. In reality it is Jesus doing this in us, but his identity is hidden. Like the disciples, who just saw a man standing on the shore when Jesus spoke to them, people will

not see Jesus obviously visible in us. They will have to recognize his presence through what we call them to do. If we invite them to greater faith, greater hope in the fullness of life, they will know him. We have to believe, and urge others to believe, that Jesus calls every human being to the

fullness of life, that everyone's net should be filled to the breaking point.

It wasn't only his own people that Jesus called into growthful crisis; that he challenged to sometimes painful but always life-giving decisions in faith and hope. We have seen how he called the pagan Magi through a star. He is the "Universal Lord," the Savior of the whole human race. To be authentically Jesus on earth, we must believe that every single human being on the face of the earth—and not just those we easily relate to—is called to and is capable of life in its fullness. off as hopeless, or as hopelessly mediocre, is to betray our mission as Christ's Body on earth.

Life is only living when it translates itself into love. Jesus prepares breakfast on the shore for his disciples. He then says to them and to each one of us, beginning with Peter, "Feed my lambs" To live is to be life-giving. To be life-giving is to love. And to love is to be life-giving as Jesus was: to give one's own life that others might

> live. Like Peter, we are all sus redeems the world and

continues to redeem it in us, his offered Body on earth.

The pattern of Jesus' life led him into conflict with this world. The pattern of Christ's life in us will be the same. It will lead us into conflict: not only with the world outside of us, but with the sin and selfishness and darkness that are within us. Iesus is the crisis who leads us into conflict with ourselves—not so that we might just suffer from it, but so that we might overcome. We have to remember that this Gospel is a story of triumph. When the disciples, in faith and in hope, cast their net again at Jesus' suggestion, the net was filled to the breaking

called to "stretch out our hands" in surrender, to let ourselves be led where we were not choosing to go, until the whole of our lives is consummated in love. Ultimately, it is always as the "Suffering Servant" that Je-



point. Jesus is the "Anointed One," the Messiah sent by God himself. He triumphs. When we live by his word, our lives become full to the breaking point.

Jesus triumphs in us. We were anointed at Baptism and sent into this world, not to be defeated by it, but to overcome. Even in the midst of trials, suffering and surrender, we are the victorious Jesus. And we are sent to proclaim his victory to the world. We are sent as the risen Jesus to be the living sign and expression of his triumph over sin and death and everything that keeps any human being from the fullness of life in grace. This is who we are. This is what Baptism sends us to do.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Third Week of Easter

Pray daily: Lord, I want to be part of your mission. You came and taught and suffered and triumphed. Give me the grace to bear witness to your saving presence and power through every word and action of my life. Amen.

Monday: John 6:22-29: Jesus said, "This is the work of God, that you believe in the one he sent." How often do you actively, consciously, explicitly make an act of faith in Jesus as Savior? Teacher? Victor over sin and death?

Tuesday: John 6:30-35: Jesus said, "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst." Do you have a personal relationship with Jesus? How do you interact with him?

Wednesday: John 6:35-40: "For this is the will of my Father, that all who see the Son and believe in him may have eternal life, and I will raise them up on the last day." How frequently do you look at Jesus in your imagination, seeing him doing the things he did on earth, seeing him interacting with you today?

Thursday: John 6:44-51: "It is written in the prophets: 'They shall all be taught by God.' Everyone who listens to my Father and learns from him comes to me." What draws you to Jesus? What have you learned

about him from the Father? What longing for him is in your heart?

Friday: John 6:52-59: Jesus said, "Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me and I in them. Just as the living Father sent me and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me." How often do you receive Jesus in Communion? How often is Eucharist available to you? How much does it mean to you? What do you think about when you are receiving Christ in Communion?

Saturday: John 6:60-69: Simon Peter answered, "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and are convinced that you are the Holy One of God." Can you say this? Is this why you remain in the Church? Is this why you participate in Eucharist? How do you go to Jesus to hear "the words of eternal life"?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: Kneel before Jesus and formally, explicitly ask him to save your life, here and now, from veering off into destructiveness, distortion, mediocrity or meaninglessness. Decide on concrete ways to keep you conscious of consulting him before every decision.

As Disciple: Ask yourself seriously if you believe Jesus "has the words of eternal life." If you do, make a decision about how you should use the Bible.

As Prophet: Ask what your body language and other behavior during the eucharistic celebration express about your understanding of the Mass. When you enter Church, make a conscious act of acknowledging Jesus' presence in the tabernacle by bowing or genuflecting.

As Priest: Participate in the eucharistic celebration as a priest by Baptism. Remember you are a player. Participate in the liturgy fully, actively, consciously.

As King: Receive Communion at Mass with conscious faith that Jesus has overcome the world. Use the Eucharist to strengthen yourself to keep trying to change things in your environment.
