

Fr Mike's Musings

The Apostles returned to Jerusalem after Jesus' ascension and gathered in the 'Upper Room' where Jesus had celebrated the Last Supper. This was the very same room where Jesus appeared to the Apostles on Easter Sunday evening. John tells us in his Gospel that they had the doors locked on Easter Sunday because they were afraid. They locked



themselves in because they were terrified. They may have been thinking that what happened to Jesus might happen to them next. Now, waiting in prayer after Jesus' Ascension, the Apostles were joined in prayer by Mary the mother of Jesus, and other disciples.

What happened at Pentecost? After receiving the Holy Spirit, the Apostles left the 'Upper Room' and began preaching. When we continue reading "Acts" we see Peter preaching about Jesus at Pentecost after receiving the Holy Spirit. As a result of Peter's preaching, we read that three thousand people asked to be baptized.

Look at the transformation in Peter because of receiving the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. When Jesus was being questioned before the Sanhedrin, Peter denied Jesus, and out of all the Apostles only John went to the Cross. But now, because of receiving the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, Peter has been transformed. He is not afraid anymore. He is fearless. Later in "Acts" we see Peter preaching again, and as a result he was brought before the Sanhedrin and warned not to preach about Jesus. When Peter was released, what did he do? He went right back to preaching!

When we see Peter in the Gospels, we would never imagine this happening. But after receiving the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, Peter is almost unrecognizable. We see this very clearly in one incident later in "Acts". The Apostles were working many miracles just like Jesus, and people were bringing their sick out onto the streets as they passed by, hoping that at least Peter's shadow might fall on the sick as he went past. Peter grew and grew spiritually after receiving the Holy Spirit. He was not afraid of persecution for the sake of Jesus anymore. When Jesus was being questioned by the Sanhedrin, Peter denied three times that he knew Jesus because he was afraid of persecution, but after Pentecost, he was no longer afraid of persecution. As a result, the Church grew and grew and grew and grew.

When we see this enormous change in Peter, we can ask ourselves: "Are we like Peter in the Gospels, afraid to be seen as someone associated with Jesus, or are we like Peter in 'Acts', unafraid of persecution because of being a follower of Jesus?" Obviously, our ideal is to be like Peter in "Acts" after receiving the Holy Spirit, no longer afraid of being associated with Jesus but proud to be seen to be with Him. If we are not yet proud to be seen with Jesus, proud to be Catholic, we need to pray for more of the Holy Spirit in our lives, to pray for more of what Peter received at Pentecost. Fortitude is one of the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit. Certainly, in this culture we need fortitude to be good, practicing Catholics.

We would have Heaven on earth if we lived by the fruits of the Holy Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Just as we can ask ourselves if we are like Peter in the Gospels or like Peter in "Acts", we can also ask ourselves how much more of these fruits of the Spirit do we need in our lives. We all need to pray for more holiness and spiritual strength in our lives, and these will be given if we become more like "Acts Peter" rather than continuing to live our faith as "Gospel Peter".

Sared in Hope

hristians live in two time frames: the eternal, in which the salvation of the world has been accomplished; and the temporal, in which redemption is still taking place.

From the viewpoint of eternity, we see all of time, all of human history from its beginning to the end of the world, in one glance. It is like looking at the moon: we see the whole thing at once. Then time is like a circle: we see the beginning, the end, and everything in between as present to us now.

But from the viewpoint of the time we live in on this earth, we only see as present the time we live in now. Past events are just a memory, and future events have not happened yet; they do not exist. To us who are living in it, time is like a straight line, and we only experience a little at a time. It is experienced the way someone walking on the moon would feel only the ground that is actually underfoot.

In liturgy we celebrate an eternal event that is still taking place in time. When Jesus was offered on Calvary every person who would ever be baptized "into Christ" was present in the body that died on the cross. That is why our sins are not just "forgiven" but "taken away." It is because we, with our sins, were "in Christ" when he died. We died in him, and in that death our history was over; our sins ceased to exist.

And when Jesus rose, we "co-rose in him" to live as sharers in his divine life, free from sin, as his risen Body on earth. In liturgy we celebrate the eternal fact that Jesus has "overcome the world" once and for all, and by his death we are saved. (See Colossians 2:12 and 3:1; John 16:33.)

But in time Jesus is still "overcoming the world" in us. In time we are still being purified of the woundedness of sin, and we who have "died to sin" cry out with Saint Paul, "who will deliver me?" from slavery to the darkness and passions we still experience. From the viewpoint of eternity, the death of Jesus has made us free, saved us and redeemed us from all darkness and View this bulletin online at www.DiscoverMass.com

sin. From the viewpoint of time, we are still being freed and purified, growing in knowledge, understanding and love. In short, we are saved—but in hope. (See Romans 6:1-11 and 7:14-25; Colossians 1:24 to 2:3; Ephesians 3:14-19.)

That is why Pentecost looks in two directions. We look backward and celebrate the gift of the Spirit poured out on the Church. But we also look forward to the work the Church is sent to do by the power of that Spirit. We celebrate the fact that the world is redeemed, that the Spirit has been given to restore order to the chaos created by sin and to bring back into unity the human race divided by sin into estranged and warring camps. At the same time, we recognize that all of creation is still "groaning" with desire to be set free from the domination of sin and brought to complete fulfillment under the reign of Christ. (See Genesis 1:1-31 and compare Genesis 11:1-9 with Acts 2:1-13.)

The Spirit is given to activate the Church—and precisely to activate the Church to bring about what God has wanted from the beginning; that is, to "bring everything in heaven and on earth together into unity under Christ as head." This unity is not a uniformity that destroys all the richness of diversity; it is a unity which brings together everything and everyone that is different in a unity based precisely on the recognition of Christ in one another. It is a unity in the Spirit brought about by the Spirit of Christ. (See Ephesians and Colossians, chapters 1). In the measure that the Spirit is active in us, we will desire to bring about unity, understanding and peace upon earth: between different races and cultural groups, different nations and social classes; between people divided by different religions and ideologies. The desire for unity is a sign of the Spirit in us; the desire to remain separate and apart is a sign that we are not moved by the Spirit of Jesus Christ.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Tenth Week of the Year

Pray daily: Lord, the more I see your power and awesomeness, the more I wonder at your love. Teach me the mystery of this love, which is greater than your power—which is your power. Show me your heart. Amen.

Monday: Matthew 5:1-12: After Jesus had sat down, his disciples came to him. He began to teach them. Do you believe that the words of Jesus are the words of God? Do you seek them out to reflect on them as the words of God?

Tuesday: Matthew 5:13-16: Jesus said that your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father. Is your way of living so different, so impressive, that it fills people with a sense of awe and wonder that leads to adoration of God? Is it outlandish to think that it might be? Or to aim at this?

Wednesday: Matthew 5:17-19: Jesus said, "Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfill." Could anyone speaking just as a human being make a statement like that? How do your actions show the difference between what the law and the prophets asked for and what Jesus asks for?

Thursday: Matthew 5:20-26: Jesus said, "I tell you, unless your righteousness surpasses that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will not enter into the kingdom of heaven." What do you do that is better than keeping all

the laws of your religion? (That is what the Pharisees focused on doing.)

Friday: Matthew 5:27-32: Jesus taught, "I say to you, everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart." What is the difference between looking at someone with lust or with love? How do you look at people? With desire to use them for your purposes? With an attitude of superiority? With hostility? With indifference? Are all of these as bad as looking at someone with lust?

Saturday: Matthew 5:33-37: "But I say to you, do not swear at all.... Let your 'Yes' mean 'Yes,' and your 'No' mean 'No." Anything more is from the evil one." Are you conscious that because you are the Body of Christ every word you speak is spoken with the lips of Christ? What effect does this have on your way of speaking?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: Each morning this week, when you get out of bed, kneel and place your forehead on the floor in adoration of God.

As Disciple: Begin reading through the Sermon on the Mount, conscious that what Jesus is giving here is a set of guidelines for living on the level of God. From this perspective, do you find his instructions awesome? Inspiring? Are you more encouraged to try to live by them?

As Prophet: Each time anyone around you uses the name of God as a swear word, bow your head in adoration.

As Priest: Each morning, before leaving your bedroom, make the sign of the cross on your lips, consciously consecrating them to speak every word as a word spoken by Jesus Christ.

As King: Make yourself alert to every expression of irreverence around you: irreverence for the person and presence of God; irreverence for people who are, or whom we must presume to be, the Body of Christ; irreverence for nature, which is God's creation, to be used according to God's purpose.

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
