



Fr Mike's Musings

Happy Father's Day to all who have fathers or stepfathers, who had fathers or who are fathers. These holidays of our culture are not exactly high holy days of the Church, but they do give us reason to pause, to pray for and to reflect on the fathers whom we honor. A few weeks ago, we honored our moms. Today, on this Father's Day, we are doing



the same – honoring our dads, living or not, on the altar of God during Mass and invoking our Heavenly Father's blessings on them. Modern America appears to be unique in honoring fathers on a special day. Today we celebrate, congratulate and pray for the men who continue to reflect the divine qualities of fatherhood as they lovingly establish, nourish and maintain their families. Fathers are a blessing, and we thank them for blessing us with lives of dedication, endurance and love.

But while the idea of fatherhood is a good one, the reality we see is sometimes quite different. Some fathers abandon their children, beat them, ridicule or ignore them, abuse them and damage them psychologically for life. Even good fathers have their limits. Unfortunately, we unduly sentimentalize fatherhood, the media often ridicule and make fun of it, and we treat it with contempt. We are reminded time after time of the number of children growing up fatherless because their fathers have abandoned them or their fathers have been unfaithful.

According to the <u>Catechism of the Catholic Church</u>, the vital importance of the father's role comes from the fact that, with his wife, he cooperates with God the Creator in bringing a new human life into the world. Children who are raised with fathers present in the family have much lower rates of delinquency, drug and alcohol use, teen pregnancy, and so on, than those with absent fathers. The father's presence is also a significant positive factor in the children's getting a college education, finding a satisfying job, and making a lasting marriage. A girl's choice of partner and satisfaction in marriage is often directly related to the relationship she has had with her father.

Father's Day is a day to remember, acknowledge and appreciate the "World's Greatest Dad": OUR HEAVENLY FATHER who provides for us in all ways--practical, emotional, and spiritual. Many of us recite "Our Father" day after day, without paying attention to, or experiencing, the love and providence of our Heavenly Father. Let us earnestly pray the "Our Father" throughout this day, contemplating the meaning of each clause and experiencing the love our Heavenly Father has for us. May all earthly fathers draw strength from their Heavenly Father. And on this Father's Day, please don't forget to pray for us, your spiritual Fathers--men who are called to be the "fathers" of an immensely large ecclesial family (we just can't ground you or send you to the corner to think about what you've done).

Glory be to the Three adorable Persons of the Holy Trinity, now and forever. Amen





Children's Liturgy of the Word: program is offered on Sunday during 8:30 Masses. Children 3-9 years old are welcome to join us each week as we pray, read and explore the Sunday Gospel from a child's viewpoint. We are currently on Summer Break. We will see you in September.

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity.

Ways to explain the Trinity to children:

- **One God, Three Persons:** Explain that there is only one God, who exists as three distinct persons: God the Father, God the Son (Jesus), and God the Holy Spirit. All are fully God and equal.
- The Sign of the Cross: Making the Sign of the Cross is a way to name Christians, using the name of God, who is three Persons in one. This introduces the idea of God being three in one.

Shamrock: St. Patrick used the three-leaf clover to explain the Trinity, showing how one plant can have three leaves, symbolizing how God is one God with three persons.

Elementary Faith Formation: The elementary program is for students in grades 1-5. We meet on Wednesday from 6:00- 7:30 pm. **Middle School Faith Formation:** Grades 6, 7 and 8 meet on Sundays from 9:45-11:15am. Our programs have ended for this school year. We are on Summer break. "In the Image of God"

o say human nature was created "in the image of God" means that basically humans were designed to do what God does. And what God does is be, know, and love. To be human is to be designed for a trinity of being, knowing and loving.

We know, not in the act of taking in sense impressions, but in the act of expressing a judgment about them. How many times have we stared blankly at a hodgepodge of shapes and colors, then suddenly perceived a pattern in them and said (in a judgment), "It's a ____!" The word that fills in the blank is the "word" of decision in which we "know" a being.

The "word" of knowledge is a word we actively "utter" or "breathe out." When we "give existence" to this word in our minds by saying, "It is!" we imitate the act by which God gives existence to a being by say-

ing, "Let it be!" In this act we know what a being is by "recreating" it in our minds in a way that conforms to what it really is in existence.

From all eternity God the Father has been seeing and knowing himself. He knows himself in the act of uttering a "word of knowledge"—"God!" This "Word" which is the ex-

pression of what God is, is the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, God the Son. This is the Word that was made flesh in Jesus.

As the Father knows the Son, and the Son knows the Father, the love they have for each other is the Holy Spirit. The mystery of the Trinity is that Being, Truth and Goodness exist in God as three distinct Persons. What "God" means is a Person who is, God the Father, knowing the truth of what he is and uttering this truth in a Word of knowledge, which is the Person of God the Son, the "Word," and loving the goodness of what JUNE 15, 2025 TRINITY SUNDAY

he is in an act of love which is the Person of the Holy Spirit. Three Persons who exist as one Divine Nature, one God: that is the Blessed Trinity.

When we see intelligibility in something—that is, see that something "would make sense" if understood to be put together the way it is for some purpose

> which would explain all the different parts, we can see that the thing really was designed precisely for this purpose, and was given being for that reason. Then we can give the thing a name, which is to know it as a being.

> The key to it all is purpose. A bunch of stuff that just happens to fall

together or get stuck together in a particular way, but without any intention or purpose in anyone's mind, is not anything—and we don't give it a name. It's just a pile of stuff. But if we judge that something was put together for a purpose which, to somebody at least, seemed good, then we can decide it actually is something and give it a name. To know something as a being, then, means that we see it as intelligible and as good, and make the judgment that it is actually being given existence as a single whole (a being) for the sake of functioning in the way which explains the presence

We know God and ourselves in his image by doing what God does: being, knowing and loving. and pattern of all its parts. Everything we judge to be a being has unity, intelligibility (truth) and purpose (goodness).

We are like God because we can perceive the truth of beings and "breathe out" that truth in a "word" of knowledge, as the Father utters his Word, the Son. And we can perceive the goodness of beings which comes from their purpose, from what they are able to do, and echo the creative act which brought them into being by giving them a name. We know God and ourselves in his image by doing what God does: being, knowing and loving.

By grace we know God through faith, accept him through hope as the purpose and goal of our lives, and affirm his goodness through love. By this we share in God's own life, which is to know and love himself as he is.

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Eleventh Week of the Year

Pray daily: Lord, you have loved me from the beginning of time, and you love me still. Forgive the days, the weeks, the years I have been unconscious of your love. Focus my heart on you, that I might begin now the cry of gratitude that will echo in it forever and ever. Amen.

Monday: Matthew 5:38-42: "But I say to you, do not resist an evildoer. But if anyone strikes you on the right cheek, tum the other also." Does Jesus turn away from us when our indifference to him is like a slap in the face? Can you continue to offer friendship to those who reject you?

Tuesday: Matthew 5:43-48: "You have heard that it was said, "You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy." But I say to you, love your enemies, and pray for those who persecute you." Are you trying to love by human standards of fairness, or by God's standards? Can you be devoted to Christ's love without trying to imitate it?

Wednesday: Matthew 6:1-6, 16-18: "When you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right

is doing, so that your almsgiving may be secret. And your Father who sees in secret will repay you." How many gifts and blessings has Jesus given to you so quietly that even you have not noticed them? Make a point of thanking him every day for his goodness, seen and unseen.

Thursday: Matthew 6:7-15: "When you are praying, do not heap up empty phrases as the Gentiles do; for they think that they will be heard because of their many words." How much time do you spend just being silent before God, reflecting on the words, the love of Jesus, and letting God speak to your heart?

Friday: Matthew 6:19-23: "Where your treasure is, there also will your heart be." Where is your treasure? What do you think about most often with desire? What are you most concerned about losing? How often do you express to Jesus Christ your love and longing for him?

Saturday: Matthew 6:24-34: "No one can serve two masters. You will either hate one and love the other, or be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth." Is serving Jesus Christ the undisputed goal of all your choices and desires? Do you ever feel enslaved by other desires or goals?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: Put a crucifix in a place where you will see it every day. When you look at it, consciously remember what Jesus has done for us all.

As Disciple: Each Friday read a passage from a Gospel account of the passion and death of Christ.

As Prophet: Each Friday do some small act of penance in grateful remembrance of Christ's love.

As Priest: At every Eucharist, when the Body and Blood of Christ are lifted up, offer yourself in Christ and with Christ in reparation for the sins of the world.

As King: Try to think of any damage you may be doing to someone else by your behavior or policies. Change what you are doing and try to repair the damage.

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
