Fr Mike's Musings

This Sunday we celebrate the men who, after Jesus, were the founding leaders of the Christian community-- Peter and Paul. What is striking about these two leaders, who differed profoundly from one another in character and background, is that both found themselves thrust into the roles of leadership in the early Christian movement by a power beyond



themselves. Peter the denier and Paul the persecutor both found their lives divinely altered and directed in ways they did not plan. Moreover, their lives were divinely supported in ways they could never have anticipated.

Today we focus mainly on Peter—his appointment as leader and his liberation from prison. The scene of his appointment is richly rooted in Israelite tradition and surprisingly playful in its language. When Peter identifies Jesus as "the Christ, the Son of the living God," Jesus tells him that his ability to understand Him in that way came not from human savvy but from divine inspiration. And so, Jesus makes Peter a foundation of the temple of the new community of Israel that He is bringing into existence. In naming him 'Cephas' ("rock" in Aramaic; 'Petros' in Greek, the same root word that gives us petroleum and petrify), Jesus was not invoking a conventional given name common in 1st century Judea; He was creating a nickname with a venerable Hebrew lineage. It was the image used by Isaiah with reference to Abraham and Sarah, the founding couple of the people of Israel, when he said:

"Look to the rock from which you were hewn, to the pit from which you were quarried. Look to Abraham, your father, and to Sarah, who gave you birth; When he was but one I called him, I blessed him and made him many." (Isaiah 51:1-2)

The foundation of the Church, like rock upon rock, builds upon the covenant with Abraham. And just as Isaiah's oracle continues with the promise of divine restoration of Zion, with blessings of fertility and justice, Jesus adds a promise of divine support:

"The gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it." (Matthew 16:18)

The defense of this restored community of Israel will be God's doing, not that of humans.

The account of Peter's miraculous release from prison in 'Acts' dramatically illustrates the fulfillment of that promise. The power of evil in the form of the tyrannical Herod Agrippa has already struck a blow against the Church in the beheading of James the Greater. Peter is apparently next, but he is rescued from prison by an angel. Unlike the leaders of cults, Peter and Paul drew their leadership not from their ability to charm and control others but in their readiness to be charmed and controlled by God, who gave them unfettered freedom, even in prison. The same can be true for us. Give all over to God and we will be truly free.



Is the Dope Catholic?

he guiding principle of Christian spirituality is to understand Jesus as "fully human, fully divine." This is the rule preachers, theologians and other individuals must navigate by to remain on course amid the diverse currents and shifting winds of changing cultures. And the "rule of the rule" is "never 'either-or'; always 'both-and."

The Church teaches that Jesus made Peter the head of the universal Church. Because both Peter and Paul died as witnesses to the faith in Rome, the Church recognizes the bishop of Rome as heir to that office. But every bishop is true head of the Church in his own diocese, holding authority directly from Christ, not as a delegate or branch manager for the pope. Although the pope as bishop of Rome has supreme teaching authority in the Church, every bishop is the chief teacher in his diocese. Just as the whole Church remains united through union with the bishop of Rome, every diocese remains united as a faith community through union with its bishop. If we see ourselves as faced with the choice of following either the pope or our local bishop, we are in trouble.

We are on track when we try to follow *both* the bishop *and* the pope. In practical terms, this means that if we ignore papal teaching and focus exclusively on our local bishop's preoccupations, we are not Catholic. On the other hand, if we look to the bishop of Rome for leadership and ignore what our own bishop is pointing to on the local scene, we are not Catholic either. And most of us tend to do one or the other: We take sides by choosing what to read and hear.

What do we do when there are differences of opinion in the Church, as there are about birth control? Suppose our bishop does not agree with a particular direction in which the pope is leading the Church (which we may see as "right," or "left," "forward" or "backward")? What if our bishop disagrees with a policy the pope supports, for example, the exclusion of married men from the ordained priesthood? As loyal Catholics should we line up behind our pope or behind our bishop?

To keep on track, we must accept fully the divine au-

thority of both pope and bishop while at the same time fully accepting their human limitations. The Gospel shows us in one and the same scene Jesus giving to Peter the "keys of the kingdom," supreme authority in the Church, and Peter immediately teaching error and trying to lead the Church down a path contrary to the way of God. Jesus has to say to him, "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me; for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

We reconcile apparent contradictions by precision. We preserve our belief in the divine presence of God teaching through pope and bishop by asking very precisely, "Is he speaking here and now under the conditions required for divine guidance?" We believe, for example, that the pope is infallible when he uses his full authority as pope. But when he is not formally defining a doctrine as the revealed truth of God, the pope himself would warn us not to take his teaching as infallible. To accept ordinary papal teaching as totally divine, as if there could be no mix of human error in it, would be making ourselves more Catholic than the pope.

The same is true of directions and policies, whether of popes or bishops. To be authentically Catholic we must give full value both to the divine guidance God promised to our teachers and to the human limitations under which they, like us, continue to act and to do their best.

This is the glory of the Church: we don't get angry or rebellious or lose our faith in God or in the Church because a particular pope or bishop leans—as we do—

to the right or left, or seems to be going too fast or too slow. We accept the human in our Church's teaching and government without ever denying the divine. We respect the divine in the human and accept the human in the divine. And we glory in the mix!

REFLECTING ON THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

Thirteenth Week of the Year

Pray daily: Lord, you came to call us to live life and give life to the full. Teach me to love as you love, wanting only to bring all of those you love to the fullness of response to you. For this is life. Amen.

Monday: Matthew 8:18-22: Jesus answered, "Follow me, and let the dead bury their dead." How many social obligations do you go along with that are not life-giving to you or to anyone else?

Tuesday: Matthew 8:23-27: The men were amazed and said, "What sort of man is this, whom even the winds and the sea obey?" Are you so impressed with who Jesus really is that you will do absolutely anything for him? Are you impressed enough to spend some time with him every day?

Wednesday: Matthew 8:28-34: "The swineherds ran away and ... reported everything, including what had happened to the demoniacs. Thereupon the whole town came out to meet Jesus, and when they saw him, they begged him to leave their district." Are you afraid to let Jesus be a part of everything you do? How do you include him in your social life, your student or professional activities? Do you explicitly invite him to come with you wherever you go?

Thursday: Matthew 9:1-8: Jesus asked, "Which is easier, to say, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Rise and walk'?" Which do you want more: physical health or deliverance from the sins that hold you back from giving yourself to God without reserve? What do you most frequently ask Jesus to do for you?

Friday: Matthew 9:9-13: While Jesus was at table in Levi's house, many tax collectors and sinners came and sat with Jesus and his disciples. Whom do you invite to your house? If you gave a party for Jesus, would you invite the same people? Would you be comfortable with the mix? How do you invite Jesus to be part of the dinners or parties you do give?

Saturday: Matthew 9:14-17: Jesus said, "People do not put new wine into old wineskins. Otherwise, the skins burst, the wine spills out, and the skins are ruined." What are you doing to make yourself the kind of person to whom Jesus can say anything? Is he being frank with you now? What is the latest challenge he has given you? What is the last thing he has asked you to do for him?

LIVING THIS WEEK'S GOSPELS

As Christian: Imagine Jesus standing in front of you saying, "Come, follow me." What is your first reaction?

As Disciple: Read the Vatican II document, "The Church in the Modern World" ("Gaudium et Spes"), looking for the way to harmonize radical response to the Gospel with full participation in the life of our society.

As Prophet: Ask yourself what you have been afraid to change in your family or social life, or in your student or professional activity, because of your fear of how others might react. Without being rash, weigh this in the light of Jesus' call to let nothing stand in the way of following him.

As Priest: Think of the last time you felt like "calling down fire from heaven" on someone who was wrong. Ask yourself what would be the gentle, respectful way to help that person change. Is this incompatible with "tough love"?

As King: Notice and identify the things in your environment that encourage the mediocrity of "not making waves." Call this working principle into question in conversation with others and by your own actions.


