
UNDERSTANDING TODAY'S READINGS

(In order to understand God's love, we need to understand what He says)

Deuteronomy 26:4-10 "He brought us out of Egypt...with his strong hand and outstretched arm..."

Moses spoke to his people in an attempt to guide them to make the one true God the center of their lives. In his time, Jews acknowledged the existence of one God on their Sabbath when they visited the temple, but on other days, they made sacrifices to pagan gods (perhaps hedging their bets because they weren't 100% sure there WAS only one God).

Moses read them the law, instructing them in the words to say and the ritual to follow in bringing the best of their harvest to the one true God. He reminded them that it was the one Lord who delivered them, as he promised, out of Egypt into the land of milk and honey. Their sacrifices were a just return to the Lord, to whom they owed everything. Bowing down in his presence was fitting humility and bringing their first fruits was a proper honor to the one true God.



Romans 10:8-13 "...everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved."

Once again, Paul is attempting to unite the disparate people of the new Christian faith. The Jews believed in the unity of the human person, spirit and body were one. The Greeks believed that the spirit was a separate entity within a physical body.

Paul, born a Jew with a Jewish worldview, sought to unite body and spirit within all new Christians, Jew and Greek alike, to accept the faith that Paul and Christ's other disciples preached. Christ's followers must confess with their mouths that Jesus is Lord and believe in their hearts that God raised him from the dead and they will be justified and saved. Paul reminded them that scripture promises that no one who believes in Him will be put to shame. The one Lord is Lord of all and one need only call his name to be saved.

Today's Psalm: 91

Be with me, Lord, when I am in trouble.

Luke 4:1-13

"You shall worship the Lord, your God, and him alone shall you serve."

Long experience had taught the tempter to try the easiest temptation first, one of having one's human



needs satisfied. It would have been the most understandable to which the human Jesus could fall prey. Perhaps the lesson for us is that the small temptation is just the first step in giving in to more serious ones. If Jesus had used a miracle to

satisfy his very human hunger, he would have acted as the Son of God, instead of the son of man and he would have shaken off the very humanity he had assumed for our sake.

A relentless tempter, Satan returns to Jesus, tempting him a second time with power and glory, a much more serious test. Again, a human longing to make a difference and be honored in this world has been the downfall of many. Satan offers seemingly easy terms to obtain this power – just worship him. But Jesus again resists, recognizing that honor and glory belong to God and to God alone. The lesson in Jesus' words is that power, seemingly cheaply obtained, would be very dear in the end – to spend eternity without God.

The final – and trickiest – temptation is one in which Satan assures Jesus that, if he leaps from the parapet of the temple, God will save him. No, it is not a sin to trust in God, but to expect God to save us from perils we have chosen for ourselves is presumption disguised as trust. If we venture into dangers, whether physical or moral, where no call of duty takes us, unnecessarily placing ourselves in circumstances where nothing but a *miracle* from God can save us, we fall prey to the snares which Satan lays for souls that have survived his simpler temptations.

The three answers with which Jesus overcame Satan are the mottoes we can use to conquer temptations. **Trust God**, by whose will we live. **Worship God**, in whose service we are given everything in this world that is good for us. **Tempt not God**, whose angels guide our feet on the path when it is *His* path, and who knows trust that is not submission to His ways is *tempting* God, not *trusting* Him.
