UNDERSTANDING TODAY'S READINGS

(In order to understand God's love, we need to understand what He says)

Isaiah 50:4-7


"The Lord God is my help... I have set my face like flint, knowing that I shall not be put to shame."

Today's reading describes the call of the 'Suffering Servant' to preach, despite opposition.

At the time of Second Isaiah, a general pessimism had descended upon the Jewish people. However, there was promise in the coming reign of Cyrus, the Persian conqueror, who respected local religions and customs. Second Isaiah pinned great hope upon Cyrus.

The writer of today's reading considers himself a servant who will deliver the word of God to his people. His message is an attempt to raise the hopes of the exiles and to present the possibility of return. The words convey the resistance that the prophet may have felt. God called him to proclaim an unpopular message and the prophet would remain true to his call. When assuming the burden of using his "well-trained tongue", the speaker acknowledges that he is opening himself to criticism and judgement. His critics would try to shame him. Indeed, the prophet would allow them to shame him because he had faith that God would vindicate him.

The Servant would accept denunciation and judgment as part of God's plan. As long as the he remained true to his call, he would stand with honor, not before men, but before God.



Philippians 2:6-11

"...God greatly exalted him...at the name of Jesus every knee shall bend..."

Paul's words today come from a hymn sung in early Christian communities, which reflects their belief in Christ as Isaiah's Suffering Servant.

The hymn began and ended with the divine, but the focus was on Jesus. He was in the form of God, but he did not seek to be equal with God. Instead, he descended to the level of humanity and emptied himself into the form of a servant, "becoming obedient even unto death." He "emptied himself" at his birth and "humbled himself" in the Passion – two pillars of our faith in Christ. God's response to Christ's obedience was that he "greatly exalted him" in his resurrection and glorification. The response of the follower is to worship and to profess faith in the Risen Christ.

The divine Son of God was humble in his birth and death. God was faithful to his Son and to his followers. He gave both eternal life.

Today's Psalm: 22
My God, My God,
why have you abandoned me?

Luke 22:14 - 23:56 "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do."

St. Luke's story of the Passion begins with a gift from Jesus in the form of the Holy Eucharist – a gift of himself for us to experience every day of our lives. The disciples did not understand the magnitude of Christ's gift. As they celebrated the Passover, they did not know how soon he would vanish from their sight. They still saw Jesus in terms of his humanity and, in their own humanity, they could not comprehend what the new kingdom was going to be, nor could they understand that Christ was leaving himself with them in the form of the Eucharist.

Luke's gospel presents the story of Jesus preparing the world for his departure from it as a man. Jesus, the servant who would suffer, would sacrifice himself on the cross for the salvation of the world.

The three scenes in Luke's gospel, the arrest of Jesus, the denial of Peter and the trial before the leadership, are all meant to shame Jesus. Yet, Luke highlighted the shame of his antagonists to a much greater degree. The leaders arrested him under the cover of darkness - like cowards. They unfairly condemned him in a kangaroo court. Along the way, even his first-in-command abandoned him in his very presence. Jesus was alone and rejected. But the shame lay with his abusers. He was innocent. They were the guilty ones.

Luke was an elegant author. In his version of the Passion, the evangelist interwove a series of threes: three scenes, three accusations, three declarations of innocence. The three scenes flow from Pilate to Herod to Pilate. In each scene, the chief priests and the loyal crowd cry out for the execution of Jesus. In each scene, the judging authority declared the innocence of the traveling rabbi. The crescendo built until Pilate acceded to the demands of the mob. Throughout, Luke stressed the innocence of Jesus.

Luke's story ends with another gift, again a gift of Christ offering himself, not in the Eucharist, but on the cross. Unlike the Apostles, we have the perspective of time in which to understand the magnitude of the gifts we have received - Salvation and the Holy Eucharist - both gifts of eternal life.
