


Behold Your King Lent 2023

"Hosanna!
Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord,
[even] the king of Israel."
John 12:13

The great crowd outside Jerusalem was filled with anticipation, Jesus was coming. They had hurried to the city gate carrying palm branches and on seeing him coming towards them on a donkey cried out full-throated, "Hosanna," a word meaning "Save now!" and "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, even the King of Israel" (Jn 12:13)! The promise they and their ancestors had sung for generations was now being fulfilled. In their minds their great oppressor, the Roman Empire, would now be cast down.

Yet, God's kingdom is not like any kingdom of this world and Jesus did not come into the world to be another political leader. This was all illustrated by his riding into Jerusalem on a donkey. Contrary to popular understanding, riding in on a donkey was not simply a sign of Jesus' humility. It was, instead, the fulfilment of an Old Testament promise. The prophet Zechariah would use this imagery saying, "Exult greatly, O daughter Zion! Shout for joy, O daughter Jerusalem! Behold: your king* is coming to you, a just savior is he, humble, and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey" (9:9). Riding on a donkey, Jesus would show himself to be a different kind of king, a king of mercy, one who days later would wear as the symbol of his high office not a gilded crown of jewels, but instead a prickly crown of thorns and who would reign not from a throne of gold, but the throne of an old rugged cross.

This is our king, and he comes for all people. He comes not for the righteous, but for sinners. He comes not only for the rich, but especially for the poor. He comes not only for Jews, but for Gentiles as well. He comes for those who are outsiders, those who are strangers, those who are without hope, those who are lost and searching, those who are rejected and abandoned, and he comes for those with do not know God, even those who have rejected God. He comes to "save now" all God's people. It is this all-inclusive King we honor and behold this Lent and Easter. It is this king whose sovereignty we come under.

As we undertake our Lenten Journey this year, we are encouraged, *Behold Your King* and to embark on a change of life that embraces his way of living, a sacrificial, merciful way of life. In this we are being specifically challenged to *Behold Your King* in our neighbor by undertaking 40 Acts of Kindness in 40 Days. These acts could include donating to a favorite charity, leaving a note in your mailbox for the mail carrier, sending a postcard to friends and family, donating old clothes, baking cookies for the local fire department, giving compliments to strangers, taking a neighbor's (or pastor's) dog for a walk, donating food to a food pantry and more. Be creative but commit to one random act of kindness every day of Lent, beholding in those you serve the face of your king, Jesus our Savior.

Lent is our annual opportunity to renew our commitment as subjects to the King of kings. With this as our goal, may we begin Lent ready to acknowledge Jesus as our king as well as the king of the universe.

Let us embark on works of prayer, fasting and almsgiving all in honor of our king who loves us fully and sacrificed himself for us.



Prayer to Christ our King A Prayer for Lent

As we *Behold [Y] our King* this Lent, we will continue the tradition of concluding our Lenten Masses – weekday and Sunday - with a prayer composed to express our parish theme.

The prayer, found below, will be located on the back inside cover of the *Breaking Bread* hymnal. On Ash Wednesday a prayer card – along with a symbol of Christ our King, a crown of thorns - will be distributed for use at home, serving as a reminder that over all things

Jesus Christ is our king and all things, especially our very lives, are to be made subject to him.

Christ Jesus, I acknowledge You to be the King of the universe.
All that has been created has been made for You.

Exercise over me all Your sovereignty.

Today I renew the promises I made in Baptism, renouncing Satan and all his works and all his empty promises. From this moment forward I promise to lead a truly Christ-like life. In particular, I commit to bringing about the triumph of God and Your Church in my life.

Crucified Christ, crowned with thorns, who suffered and died that all might have life, I offer you all my efforts so that every heart may acknowledge your Sacred Kingly Power.

May the Kingdom of Your peace be firmly established in my life and in the lives of all people. Amen.




LENT: WHAT IS IT?

Lent is a 40-day season (not counting Sundays) when we participate in self-examination, fasting and penance in preparation for our Easter observance. We prepare to renew our baptism – when we rose into our new Christian life – as we celebrate Christ rising from the dead. It is a time of prayer, forgiveness and grace.



Masses during Lent – What is Different?



Lent Color: Purple is used as a sign of repentance.

Prayerful Pauses: Use these times to reflect on our sins and ask for God's mercy.

Music: No "Alleluia" – we "fast" from the joyful songs during Lent while we seriously reflect on God's mercy, his sacrifice and his love. The Mass Setting will indicate the new season. During Lent and Easter the Mass of the Resurrection will be used for the sung Mass parts – Holy, Holy, Holy; Memorial Acclamation; Great Amen; Lamb of God in Lent and in Easter for the Glory to God and for the "Alleluia"

To emphasize the penitential nature of Lent and to ensure the sense of silence called for by the season, we will "fast" from the recessional hymn at the end of our Masses. Instead, the ministers will process out in silence and the congregation is asked to depart in the same manner.

Response to the General Intercessions (Universal Prayer): Christ our King, hear our prayer.

Eucharistic Prayers for Reconciliation: Notice the strong theme of forgiveness and reconciliation.


The Little Black Book (Adults)

To take time for prayer during Lent is to acknowledge that we need help to turn back to God. From daily Mass to the Rosary, from meditation on Sacred Scripture to Centering Prayer, from the Stations of the Cross to Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, the Church encourages us with a wealth of prayer practices.

A very simple way to pray is to sit quietly for a moment before taking up one of the Gospels and slowly reading a passage. After reading the passage, sit with it for a time, savor the Word just read and allow it to touch your heart, then read it again slowly and respond to God.

To assist you with this form of prayer, the Lenten packets contain a copy of the *Little Black Book*, six-minute daily reflections on the Parables of Jesus.





Tick, Tock, It's Lent A 2023 Lenten Calendar for Teens

The daily encouragements in this booklet prompts teens to take just a minute each day to read, reflect, rewind, repent and repost about the Lenten opportunities they have to serve, share and spend time in Scripture. Tick, Tock, It's Lent! provides an up-to-the-minute daily devotional journey throughout the season, encouraging young Christians to express their faith through words and actions.



Veneration of the Relics of St. Pio of Pietrelcina

(Padre Pio)

At the Second Vatican Council, the Church recalled that the "saints have been traditionally honored in the Church and their authentic relics and images have been held in veneration." Similar to how we might keep a cherished possession of a deceased family member, the Church has always preserved the relics of the martyrs and saints. By venerating relics, we give thanks to God for the saints' holy lives and pray for the grace to imitate them. We can also ask saints to pray to God for us, for others, and for our special intentions. However, the Church is quick to remind us that a relic is not magical. It is not the actual object of the relic that brings grace or causes a miracle. **Grace and healing come from God alone.**

On Tuesday, March 7, 2023, the parish will host the relics of St. Pio of Pietrelcina (Padre Pio).

St. Pio of Pietrelcina, better known as Padre Pio, was a Franciscan priest who received the stigmata (wound of Christ) and bore them for 50 years after offering himself to God "as a victim for poor sinners and for the souls in Purgatory," as he wrote. He was the first stigmatized priest in the Church. His many spiritual gifts included bilocation (the ability to be in two places simultaneously), prophecy, miracles, healing, the discernment of spirits, the ability to read hearts and to speak and understand languages without study, the gift of seeing angels, the charism of converting hearts, and the "odor of sanctity" that came from his wounds.

The day will begin with Mass at 8:00 AM in honor of St. Pio. Following the Mass until 4:00 PM the relics of St. Pio will be available in the church for veneration by parishioners. In the words of Pope St. John Paull II, "Prayer and charity – this is the most concrete synthesis of Padre Pio's teaching." As an act of charity towards the poor whom Padre Pio loved, those coming to venerate his relics are asked to bring non-perishable food items to be donated to local food banks in honor of the saint.

How to venerate relics: When venerating a relic, it is appropriate to honor the saint by performing a simple exterior gesture. A person can touch the glass case that houses the relic or simply stand near the relic in a prayerful attitude while invoking the intercession of the saint. The veneration of a relic is meant to be an

external expression of "one's commitment to live the Christian life." Please keep in mind that we do not genuflect before a relic in a similar way to genuflecting before the Blessed Sacrament. Genuflection is a sign of adoring Christ who is truly present in the consecrated hosts kept within the Tabernacle.


3. Scott Hahn's Holy is His Name

FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

Fasting is observed on **Ash Wednesday** (February 22) and **Good Friday** (April 7) by all who are 18 years of age and older and who have not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a day of fast, one full meal is allowed.

Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be

taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices, are allowed.

Abstinence is observed by all persons 14 years of age and older. On days of abstinence, no meat is allowed. Please note that when health or the ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not apply.

Ash Wednesday, all the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday are days of abstinence from all meat.

Note: If a person is unable to observe the above regulations due to ill health or other serious reasons, other suitable forms of self-denial are encouraged.

Fasting and Abstinence practiced as the Church instructs are bodily ways to remind ourselves that we need God above all things. Fasting is also a sacrifice, a gift back to God of our heart's intent to depend more completely on God. The interior free desire to deepen our relationship with God



Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper

Shrove Tuesday Dinner: February 21 5:00 PM - 7:30 PM Pancake Supper in Doran Hall -All are Welcome!

What is Shrove Tuesday? Shrove Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday, has as its past tense the word "shrive," which means to obtain absolution for one's sins. In the early Church, people took fasting so seriously that on the day before Lent began, they "used up" all the rich foods they would not eat during Lent.

Pancakes and Shrove Tuesday: Historically, as the faithful prepared for the beginning of the 40-day Lenten fasting period and forbidden by the Church to eat meat, fat, eggs or

dairy products, families had to use up these foods so that they would not go bad by the time the fast ended on Easter Sunday.

What to do? The Solution: use up the milk, butter and eggs no later than Shrove Tuesday (or "Fat Tuesday"). And so, with the addition of a little flour, the solution quickly presented itself in . . .

Pancakes!



Adults: \$10; Children: \$5; Children under 5 FREE


ALMSGIVING

Hunger is an ever-present reality in Calvert County. Local food pantries regularly experience a great demand for food.



To prepare well for the day we die, we must die now and rise to new life in Christ. Being marked with ashes at the beginning of Lent indicates our recognition of the need for deeper conversion of our lives during this season of renewal.

Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament


Mondays through Thursdays 8:30 AM – 9:30 AM, Divine Mercy Chapel Wednesday Evenings (except Ash Wednesday) 7:00 PM – 8:00 PM, Church First Friday of Lent (March 3) 9:00 AM – 3:00 PM, Church

Eucharistic Adoration is honoring the presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. It involves "the contemplation of the Mystery of Christ truly present before us."

During Eucharistic Adoration we "watch and wait," we remain "silent" in His presence and open ourselves up to His love which flows from the Eucharist.

By adoring Jesus in His Eucharistic Presence, we draw nearer to God becoming more and more who He calls us to be.

Like a magnet, the Lord draws us to Himself and gently transforms us.



The Sacrament of Reconciliation

Our parish will offer the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation on Wednesday evenings from 7:00 - 8:00 PM, along with Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. If you have been reluctant to come to the sacrament, have been away for some time or just found it difficult to get to a Saturday afternoon or morning confession time, this is a wonderful opportunity to reconnect with Christ and His Church.



Confessions will be on Wednesday, March 1, 8, 15, 22, 29, and April 5.

On Palm Sunday, April 2, confessions will also be celebrated from 6:30 PM – 8:00 PM. Extra priests will be available to assist with confessions on Palm Sunday.

(Please note that there are no confessions on Wednesday, February 22, Ash Wednesday, due to the 7:00 PM Mass)

The Sacrament of Reconciliation will also be celebrated on Tuesday and Thursday mornings immediately following the 8:00 AM Mass.

Come and Experience God's Mercy and Forgiveness

Revised Order of Penance


Beginning this Lent, the experience of the Sacrament of Penance will be slightly revised. Starting on Ash Wednesday, the prayer of absolution will include three modifications, making the revised version read as follows:

"God, the Father of mercies, through the death and resurrection of his Son has reconciled the world to himself and poured out [formerly "sent"] the Holy Spirit for [previously "Holy Spirit among us for"] the forgiveness of sins; through the ministry of the Church may God grant [instead of "give"] you pardon and peace. And I absolve you from your sins in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

The revised text was adopted by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops during its Spring 2021 meeting, with the Vatican's Dicastery for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments approving the text in April 2022. As of April 16, 2023, the Second Sunday of Easter, the revised formula for absolution is mandatory.

Stations of the Cross

The Stations of the Cross are synonymous with Lent, Holy Week and, especially, Good Friday. The devotion is also known as the "Way of the Cross", the "Via Crucis", and the "Via Dolorosa".



It commemorates 14 key events on the day of Christ's crucifixion. The majority concern His final walk through the streets of Jerusalem, carrying the Cross. Stations of the Cross will take place every Friday during Lent, February 24 – March 31 at 7:00 PM. On Friday, March 3 we will walk the Way of the Cross with the children of the parish using a special Children's Stations of the Cross format, and on two occasions, Friday, March 17 and March 31 we will commemorate Christ's final hours walking our outdoor Stations of the Cross, weather permitting.

For those unable to walk outside, inside Stations may also be done.

Lent and the RCIA/RCIT/RCIC

Period of Purification and Enlightenment: After having welcomed our Catechumens and those already baptized and seeking to be one with us in full communion at the Rite of Acceptance, they now enter their final phase of preparation before receiving the Easter sacraments. This phase is known as the Period of Purification and Enlightenment.







Rite of Sending: On *Sunday, February 26 at the 8:00 AM Mass* the catechumens and candidates will be addressed, prayed over and for those to be baptized, asked to enroll their names in the Book of the Elect. This is known as the Rite of Sending. It is the catechumens and candidates formal statement of their intent to enter the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Election: Later that same afternoon, the catechumens and candidates will gather at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC along with other catechumens and candidates from all over the Archdiocese of Washington to celebrate the Rite of Election. Once again they will publicly declare their intentions to enter the Catholic Church. They will be received and prayed over by the Cardinal Archbishop.

Scrutinies: The primary way the Church assists the catechumens (those to be baptized) in their conversion process during Lent is through the celebration of the rites called Scrutinies. These ritual celebrations on the Third, Fourth and Fifth Sundays of Lent are communal prayer celebrations around the elect to strengthen them to overcome the power of sin in their lives and to grow in virtue.

To scrutinize something means to examine it closely. The community does not scrutinize the catechumens; the catechumens scrutinize their own lives and allow God to scrutinize them and to heal them. These rituals focus on life, freedom, and salvation. They include prayers and the imposition of hands. At the same time the catechumens are scrutinizing their life and asking God to heal them, each of us are to pray to God asking that whatever makes us weak and sinful will be rooted out of our lives as we move toward the great celebration of Easter.

Reception into the Church Easter Vigil – Saturday, April 8 at 8:00 PM

At the Easter Vigil, the **Catechumens** will be baptized, confirmed and receive the Eucharist for the first time. The **Candidates** will profess their faith and be joined in full communion, then be confirmed and also receive the Eucharist for the first time. Gathered with them may be some adult Catholics who will receive the Sacrament of Confirmation.



As our Catechumens and Candidates journey through these forty days to the Easter Sacraments, may we commit ourselves to praying for them.






