A GOOD DAY TO REMEMBER...

Today we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family.

Yesterday as we celebrated Christmas, I am sure most of us might have spent some time with family members. I also connected with family, with my siblings through video calls. The centrality of the family at Christmastime is perhaps because, at some deep level, we are aware that at the heart of this feast of Christmas is a family, what we call the Holy Family, whose feast we celebrate today.

When we refer to the Holy Family, we think of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. Yesterday it was so beautiful to see the many young parents – who have been bringing their children to the church to pray – bring them to visit the manger. In bringing their children to the church in this way, parents are following in the footsteps of Mary and Joseph in Luke’s gospel. They would have brought their young child, Jesus, to the local synagogue in Nazareth from the earliest days of his life.

In Luke’s gospel, they are depicted as bringing Jesus all the way to the Temple in Jerusalem in keeping with the requirements of the Jewish Law. Their faith in God was central to the lives of Mary and Joseph, and they wanted to initiate their child into that same faith. Bringing their child to places associated with the worship of God was one of the ways they did that.

We have a most beautiful church here in this village. We are blessed with lovely stained-glass windows, attractive shrines of Joseph and Mary on both sides of the altar, striking Stations of the Cross... all of these can easily speak to children’s religious imagination.

Even more than the fabric and objects of the church is the amazing prayerfulness of our church. That is what I felt when I came first from Ann Arbor’s

A Good Day to Remember...

huge modern church to our St. Mary's church. The faith of many generations of worshippers has left an impact on the atmosphere of this church. Bringing children to such a space for Christmas and every Sunday cannot help but nurture their emerging faith.

We speak of the home and family as the "domestic church." It is in that family setting, above all, that the faith is "caught" by children. Yet, our parish church is a space that can nurture faith in another way. It brings the domestic church into contact with the Church of the generations. It is a space where the faith of each one of us is nurtured, regardless of our age.

When Mary and Joseph brought their child, Jesus, to the Temple that day in Jerusalem, it certainly nurtured their faith, and through them the faith of their young child. They had the good fortune to meet two elderly worshippers, Simeon and Anna.

Simeon is spoken of as upright and devout, someone on whom the Holy Spirit rested. And Anna is described as a prophetess, someone who was deeply steeped in God's word and could proclaim it to others. The Lord touched the lives of Mary, Joseph, and their child in and through these two older people of faith.

They both affirmed the identity of the young couple's child. Simeon declared the child to be a "light to enlighten the pagans, and the glory of your people Israel." Anna announced that the child was God's response to all who were looking forward to the deliverance of Jerusalem. The long journey of Mary, Joseph, and their child from Nazareth to Jerusalem had not been in vain. It brought them into contact with two wonderful representatives of the wider faith community through whom God touched the lives of this young family.

When parents bring their child to our parish church, they won't necessarily meet a Simeon or an Anna, although their equivalents can be found in our church at various times of the day. Yet, when a family or when we as individuals come to our parish church, even outside the times when people gather for Mass, we are coming in contact with the wider community of faith, with the Simeons and Annas of our day, and with the community of faith who are now in heaven. I also have come into contact with some in these past eight years. some of whom have already gone from

Simeon and Annas of this parish to be with the Lord.

Among that community of faith who are now in heaven and whom we remember in a special way today are the parents of Jesus: Mary and Joseph. Both are represented visually in our church on both sides of the altar. We come into contact with the Holy Family when we come to our church, and we are also reminded of our own honored place within this Holy Family. Through baptism, we have become members of Jesus' family – his brothers and sisters who can look to God his Father as our Father and to Mary his mother as our mother.

Dear brothers and sisters, today on the Feast of the Holy Family, it is a good day to remember our own families of origin, the family into which we were born, within which, to varying degrees, we grew to maturity. It is a day to give thanks for all that was good in our family of origin. We give thanks for the care that nurtured and nourished us when we were too weak and vulnerable to take care of ourselves, for the many sacrifices that were made so that we might have better opportunities in life than earlier generations.

Today's feast is also a good day to ask the Lord to help us to forgive what needs forgiving in our experience of family, a day when we ask Him for the freedom to let go of whatever resentments may be oppressing us, a day when we pray to Him for the healing of any hurts that family members may have inflicted on us. †

Looking for an Anchor for Stability?

These days it sometimes feels like we're living in the Twilight Zone – and maybe we are! Yet God's word is the same, yesterday, today and forever. If you need an anchor to bring some stability into life, the Bible has been safe mooring for thousands of years to Jews and Christians.

St. Mary parish will begin a different kind of Bible study on Jan 27th called "The Bible Timeline." It makes understanding Scripture easy for the average Christian. It was designed for people who avoid reading the Bible because they just can't connect with it.

There are three ways you can participate:

- 1) **IN-PERSON** sessions with video and discussion;
- 2) **ONLINE REAL-TIME STREAMING** of the in-person sessions;
- 3) **ONLINE SELF-STUDY**, anytime at your convenience via computer or smartphone.

Your cost is only \$25 because the parish is covering a third of the actual cost. If you miss a session, you can view it online anytime. The sign-up fee includes 1-year access to the online videos, a Bible Timeline chart that chronologically shows the 14 books of the Bible used in the series, and a study guide that helps you key-in to Bible essentials.

The in-person sessions will meet on consecutive Thursdays beginning Jan. 27, in five clusters of 4-5 sessions each, spread over 7 months.

A Note about January 1, 2022: What is and what isn't...

The "Holy Day," Holy Hour, & First Saturday

TYPICALLY: January 1st is always a significant day! In the life of the Church it is usually a holy day of obligation: It is the Octave (8th) day of Christmas and the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God (our Lady's greatest title!). Also here at St. Mary's we typically would have a Holy Hour of Eucharistic Adoration before the vigil Mass on Dec. 31. Additionally this year, January 1st is First Saturday.

HOWEVER, THIS YEAR: While ordinarily a Holy Day of Obligation, in the United States this is not the case when this Solemnity falls on either Saturday or Monday. However, Fr. Bosco will celebrate Mass on the holy day at 8:30am for all who desire to come. This also will be a First Saturday Mass for those who keep that devotion. And there will be a time of Eucharistic Adoration following the morning Mass.
