of Jesus risen to off else am I waiting?



## Feast of Corpus Christi

The Feast of Corpus Christi is the commemoration of the Sacrament of Eucharist, the Sacred Body and Blood of our Lord. The Eucharist



was instituted on Holy Thursday at the Last Supper and serves as the beginning of the Holy Triduum. The solemn and somber nature of the passion and

death of our Lord keeps us from celebrating the most important treasure of our faith. Corpus Christi is celebrated as the Sunday after Trinity Sunday, which closes the Easter Season.

The celebration of Corpus Christi began early in the fourteenth century by carrying the Blessed Sacrament in a solemn liturgical procession. This public celebration was recognized and approved by the Council of Trent (1545-1563). The consecrated host is contained in a

monstrance and was carried from town to town. This public display of the Blessed Sacrament gave everyone a chance to profess their belief in the Eucharist as the true Body of Christ. The procession was accompanied by religious figures, civil leaders, military honor guards, craftsmen from the trades, musicians and other dignitaries. These processions became lavish community celebrations of faith in the true presence of the Eucharist. Today the processions are usually made to four points on Parish grounds. These four points symbolize "carrying the Eucharist to the four corners of the world." The procession begins in the church after communion at the celebration of Mass and culminates back in church with benediction and reposition of the Eucharist in the tabernacle.

The processions are accompanied by ringing of church bells, brass bands, and in some communities firing of salutes. The faithful kneel in adoration at designated stops at churches,

grottos, cemeteries and other places of reverence.

These celebrations in honor of the Feast of Corpus Christi are still widely held throughout Europe, North and South



America.

Pope John Paul II encouraged the celebration of these public processions in his Apostolic Letters (2004-2005, Year of the Eucharist). It is a public profession of the very core of our faith; the Eucharist as true Body and Blood of our Lord.

This year we will celebrate Corpus Christi as our namesake, Blessed Sacrament.

Kids ages 5-10 are invited to attend. The tunes will be cranked up and bodies will be movin' and groovin' as we learn about Jesus' love for us and how we are called to serve our families, friends, neighbors and community. **Summer RE**. Summertime may be a good fit for your family to take advantage of faith formation offerings.

Many households struggle with busyness and lots of activities get piled up on Wednesday nights through the year when school is in session. The Waterloo Catholic parishes collaborate to offer a religious education program from 9am-noon on Monday-Friday, the last two weeks of June for kids attending public schools. The sessions will be held, June 17-28 at St. Edward parish. Experienced catechists will guide the youth through the curriculum used in the 9 month model.

If you have a second grade student, it is important for you to know that you will need to participate in your parish First Reconciliation & First Communion program when it is offered during the school year.

If you have a student who is in third grade, or older, who has not celebrated sacraments, he/she will need to participate in a sacramental preparation program during Winter 2014.

Families participating in the summer program are encouraged to attend weekend masses, participate in any of our school-year offerings, such as FIRE nights or prayer services and those with students in 2nd grade will need to attend the Sacrament

preparation meetings.

The sessions will be fun and engaging. Contact Lori Zabler or Barb Duggan to learn more, 235-9430 and to obtain registration information. Registration fees are \$80/child. Registration deadline is May 31, 2013.

Summer CORE. High school teens who are busy with many extracurricular activities have a summer time opportunity to attend the prerequisite religious education classes. Our Archdiocese sacramental guidelines state that two years of high school theology are necessary to begin the immediate phase of the Confirmation preparation. One week of classes from 9 am-3pm Monday-Friday, June 17-21 OR June 24-28 is equivalent to CORE classes held during the educational year. There will be faith learning experiences in and out of the classroom during this session. If you have a son or daughter who is desiring to be confirmed and needs CORE, consider enrolling them today. Registration fees are \$80/teen. Registration deadline is May 31, 2013. Call Barb Duggan for more information.
