FROM THE DESK OF FATHER DERIVAN

Today the Church gives us a short gospel, just a few verses. Yet these words say so much. “My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me; and I give them eternal life.” Just a few words, but so important. In fact Pope Francis says, “These few verses contain the whole of Jesus’ message; it is the nucleus of his Gospel: he calls us to share in his relationship with the Father, and this is eternal life.”

Our whole Christian life is about God’s calling, calling us to follow Him, calling us then to show our faith by the way we live, by the love we show to Him and to others, our brothers and sisters in His family, calling us to do what He asks of us and to be ready to do that every day that we live.

The Lord calls us to hear His voice, to listen to Him. Today, dear friends, there are many voices that we hear around us. Some are good voices, the voices of those we love, the voices of friends sometimes asking for our help, the voices of people who have to challenge us, even correct us at times, so that we can be better people. Those are the good voices. But there are the opposite—the bad voices all around us. I think especially of the voices that our young people hear, the voices of music and videos that make life cheap, that do not speak of simple decency and respect. One of the sad things about our technological age is that these voices can be the only ones people hear, not voices, but noise, noise drowning out the voices of goodness and integrity and truth. And in the midst of all of this, the Pope says, the Lord Jesus is calling us, calling us to eternal life. Let me share with you again the Pope’s words, “Sometimes Jesus calls us, he invites us to follow him, but perhaps we do not realize that it is he who is calling. I would like to ask you: Have you sometimes heard the Lord’s voice, in a desire, in a worry? Did he invite you to follow him more closely? Have you heard him?”

Today, dear friends, is called Good Shepherd Sunday because of the Lord’s words in the gospel, the Good Shepherd calling us to hear His voice and follow Him. And Good Shepherd Sunday every year is designated by the Pope as the World Day of Prayer for Vocations. The word “vocation” simply means a calling, a calling from God, a calling in which He asks us to listen and to follow Him. Usually when we hear the word “vocation” we think of the calling of priests or religious brothers and sisters. And that is certainly true. During this past year we have been blessed to have Deacon John Figueroa with us as he prepares in just a few weeks for his ordination to the Priesthood. We rejoice with Deacon John and the other men who will be our new priests. May the Lord bless their vocation and may our prayers help them to live that calling always. But remember it is not only priests and religious sisters and brothers who have a vocation. Every person must hear the voice of Jesus the Good Shepherd. Every person is called to follow Him. Every one of us through our baptism has the calling to be a faithful follower of Christ, each in his or her own way, some as married people loving their families, bringing Jesus more and more to their children; some as single people, either neither married or now alone after the death of a spouse, all called to serve others in Christ’s name. Some have specific callings in serving God and His people—teachers who open the minds of their students to the beauty of knowledge; doctors and nurses and medical personnel who hear God’s call to be His loving hands to those who are sick. Some are hearing the call of Jesus by doing things that no one else knows about, helping a neighbor, listening to someone in trouble, visiting someone who is alone. All of these are God’s callings. And we must be ready to listen. He never stops calling us. We must never stop listening.

One of the children asked me, “Father, how do you know what God is calling you to do?” The answer is simple—prayer and people. We know what God is calling us to do by listening to Him. That is what prayer is most of all—not our talking, but our listening. God speaks to our hearts. He puts thoughts in our minds and, if that happens again and again, perhaps that is God calling us to do something for Him. And then the second thing—people. Very often God calls us through people, through parents and grandparents, through teachers, through friends. Pope Francis says that “behind every calling is the prayer and encouragement of someone, a father or mother, a grandparent, a friend.” God uses other people’s voices to be His voice. And again all we have to do is to listen.

Three years ago Pope Francis canonized Mother Teresa of Calcutta, one of the greatest apostles to the poor who ever lived. The Lord certainly called her through prayer and through people. First, through prayer—as she was growing up, she heard God’s call to be a religious sister, a teacher. But she kept praying and one day she was on a bus in the poor city of Calcutta where literally people were dying in the streets. God was calling her through the people she saw suffering. She heard what she said was “a call within a call,” a call to help the poor. She spent the rest of her life doing precisely that, seeing Jesus in what she called “the distressing of the poorest of the poor.” We do not have the same calling that Mother Teresa had, but we all do have our calling. May we listen to Jesus. May we be ready to hear His call. And faithfully may we follow Him.

FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

A MESSAGE FROM POPE FRANCIS FOR THIS SUNDAY

Today's Gospel offers us some of Jesus' expressions during the feast of the dedication of the Temple of Jerusalem, which is celebrated at the end of December. He is found on the Temple grounds, and perhaps that enclosed sacred space suggested to Him the image of the sheepfold and the shepherd. Jesus is presented as "the Good Shepherd", and says, "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me; and I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish, and no one shall snatch them out of my hand." These words help us to understand that no one can call himself a follower of Jesus, if he does not listen to His voice. And this "listening" should not be understood in a superficial way, but in an engaging way, to the point of making possible a true mutual understanding, from which one can come to a generous following, expressed in the words, 'and they follow me.' It is a matter of listening not only with ears, but listening with the heart!

And so, the image of the shepherd and the sheep indicates the close relationship that Jesus wants to establish with each one of us. He is our guide, our teacher, our friend, our model, but above all he is our Savior. In fact, the following expressions from the Gospel passage affirm, "I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish, and no one shall snatch them out of my hand." Who can say that? Only Jesus, because the "hand" of Jesus is one thing with the "hand" of the Father, and the Father is "greater than all."

These words communicate to us a sense of absolute security and immense tenderness. Our life is fully secure in the hands of Jesus and the Father, which are a single thing: a unique love, a unique mercy, revealed once and for all in the sacrifice of the Cross. To save the lost sheep which we all are, the Shepherd became lamb, and let himself be immolated so as to take upon himself and to take away the sin of the world. In this way he has given us life, life in abundance. This mystery is renewed, in an always surprising humility, on the Eucharistic table. It is there that the sheep gather to nourish themselves; it is there that they become one, among themselves and with the Good Shepherd.

Because of this we are no longer afraid: our life is now saved from perdition. Nothing and no one can overcome his love. Jesus' love is invincible. The evil one, the great enemy of God and of his creatures, attempts in many ways to take eternal life from us. But the evil one can do nothing if we ourselves do not open the doors of our hearts to him, by following his deceitful enticements.

The Virgin Mary heard and obediently followed the voice of the Good Shepherd. May she help us to welcome with joy Jesus' invitation to become his disciples, and to always live in the certainty of being in the paternal hands of the Father.

MAY 15
ST. ISIDORE THE FARMER
(1070-1130)

Isidore has become the patron of farmers and rural communities. In particular he is the patron of Madrid, Spain, and of the United States National Rural Life Conference.

When he was barely old enough to wield a hoe, Isidore entered the service of John de Vargas, a wealthy landowner from Madrid, and worked faithfully on his estate outside the city for the rest of his life. He married a young woman as simple and upright as himself who also became a saint—Maria de la Cabeza. They had one son, who died as a child.

Isidore had deep religious instincts. He rose early in the morning to go to church and spent many a holiday devoutly visiting the churches of Madrid and surroundings areas. All day long, as he walked behind the plow, he communed with God. His devotion, one might say, became a problem, for his fellow workers sometimes complained that he often showed up late because of lingering in church too long.

He was known for his love of the poor, and there are accounts of Isidore's supplying them miraculously with food. He had a great concern for the proper treatment of animals. He died May 15, 1130, and was declared a saint in 1622 with Ignatius of Loyola, Francis Xavier, Teresa of Avila and Philip Neri. Together, the group is known in Spain as "the five saints."

Many implications can be found in a simple laborer achieving sainthood: Physical labor has dignity; sainthood does not stem from status; contemplation does not depend on learning; the simple life is conducive to holiness and happiness. Legends about angel helpers and mysterious oxen indicate that his work was not neglected and his duties did not go unfulfilled. Perhaps the truth which emerges is this: If you have your spiritual self in order, your earthly commitments will fall into order also. "Seek first the kingdom [of God] and his righteousness," said the carpenter from Nazareth, "and all these things will be given you besides" (Matthew 6:33).

Please continue to share the peace and joy of our faith with others. There are so many that are in the need of Jesus. Can you be for all of us a living sign to all our parishioners and neighbors, and tell them for us "we need them and love them". Someone may hear and accept the invitation from you and return home to worship the Lord with us. So please invite a friend, relative, or neighbor to come with you to Church next Sunday. God will do the rest. Let us share our treasure of faith with others.





OUR LADY OF FATIMA

Between May and October 1917, Our Lady appeared six times to three young Portuguese children in a field called the Cova de Iria, near the small village of Fatima, about 70 miles north of Lisbon. The children who received the apparitions had been brought up in an atmosphere of piety. They were Lucia dos Santos, aged 10, and her two younger cousins Francisco and Jacinta. They tended sheep together and often would kneel in the open field to pray the Rosary.

The first apparition took place around noon on Sunday, May 13, 1917 when a brilliant flash of lightning drew the attention of the children. A beautiful Lady appeared clothed in white and asked the children to return the 13th of each month. In these apparitions, Mary asked the children to pray the Rosary daily for the conversion of sinners and asked for devotion to her Immaculate Heart. She asked for prayer, penance and that Russia be consecrated to her Immaculate Heart. She also spoke of observing the first Saturdays of each month by going to confession and receiving Holy Communion to make reparation to the Hearts of Jesus and Mary.

On the day of the final apparition, October 13, 1917, she identified herself as "Our Lady of the Rosary" and the dramatic episode of the dance of the sun took place, witnessed by a crowd of 70,000 people, in which the sun seemed to tumble from the sky. After a lengthy diocesan inquiry, a declaration of the Bishop of Leiria, in whose diocese these apparitions took occurred, approved the devotion to Our Lady of Fatima in 1930. The young visionary Francisco had died on April 4, 1919 and his sister Jacinta on February 20, 1920. The sole survivor, Sister Lucia, was a professed Carmelite nun.

The first structure to be built on the location of the apparitions was a small archway which was soon replaced by a tiny chapel over the spot of the apparitions. When this first chapel was destroyed by dynamite in 1922, a second chapel was built and near to it the Pavilion of the Sick.

The foundation stone for the Basilica of Our Lady of the Rosary was laid on October 13, 1928 and the finished structure was solemnly consecrated by Cardinal Cerejeira, the Patriarch of Lisbon, on October 6, 1953. In the colonnade of the Basilica, there are fifteen altars, in honor of the Mysteries of the Rosary.

On October 31, 1942, in honor of the 25th Anniversary of the apparitions, the Supreme Pontiff, Pope Pius XII (1939-1958) solemnly consecrated the world to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. His Papal Legate, Cardinal Masella, crowned the statue of Our Lady of Fatima on May 13, 1946, the 300th Anniversary of the consecration of the nation of Portugal to Mary Immaculate.

On the occasion of the 50th Anniversary of the apparitions, on May 13, 1967, His Holiness Pope Paul VI (1963-1978) went to Fatima on a pilgrimage of prayer and peace. On that occasion, he published an Apostolic Exhortation, *Signum Magnum*, in which he invited "all members of the Church to consecrate themselves to Mary Immaculate and to put this pious act into concrete action in their daily lives."
