
#### **BAPTISMS**

#### FROM THE DESK OF FATHER DERIVAN

Our gospel for this Fourth Sunday of Advent is the gospel of announcing. We call it that—the mystery of the Annunciation—the Angel Gabriel sent from God to announce to Mary that God the Father asked her to be the one through whom Jesus His Son would come into the world, the mother from whom Jesus would bring about our salvation. Some of the saints said that when the Angel asked Mary to be the Mother of Jesus, the whole world, indeed heaven too, held its breath waiting for an answer. What would the humble Mary say? Here was this young girl, probably twelve or thirteen years of age, being asked the most important question ever asked of a human being. Would she be the Mother of the Savior? The great St. Bernard, the great apostle of Mary, said that at the Annunciation it was as if God was knocking on the door, waiting for Mary to answer. And she did. Mary said "Yes," not only a one word "Yes," but a "Yes" that expressed itself in this way, "I am the servant of the Lord. Let it be done to me according to your word." We could say that this gospel is a double announcing—the Angel announcing God's plan to Mary and Mary's announcing that she was ready to accept God's will, ready to be the Mother of the Son of God.

This was the announcing. But it was not the only announcing. Someone else received an announcing. Like so many other holy people in the Scripture, this man received his announcing in a dream. The angel spoke to him and announced that the child Mary would have would be the Son of God. Of course I am speaking of St. Joseph, Good St. Joseph, the humble carpenter of Nazareth chosen by God to be the husband of Mary and the foster father of her Son. Here was the angel's announcing to Joseph. Listen to the holy words:

"Joseph, son of David,
do not be afraid to take Mary your wife into your home.
For it is through the Holy Spirit
that this child has been conceived in her.
She will bear a son and you are to name him Jesus,
because he will save his people from their sins."
When Joseph awoke,
he did as the angel of the Lord had commanded him."

Joseph accepted the announcing, just as Mary did. Joseph was ready to do his part in God's plan of saving the world, just as Mary was. Here is this young man, not the old man in some of our pictures, but a young man not much older than many of our young men in our families. He was ready to do his job, not just the job of the carpenter, but the job of bringing Mary to Bethlehem, the job of being there for Jesus' birth, later on the job of protecting Mary and Jesus from the murderous threats of King Herod, the job of helping Jesus to prepare for His mission as the Savior of the world.

I think the most important thing about St. Joseph is that he welcomed Jesus and made him his own. Of course, he was only Jesus' foster father. He knew that. But it did not matter. When the angel announced to Mary that Jesus would be her own, so too the angel invited Joseph to make Jesus his own too. And we are invited to do the same. The angel announces Jesus to us on this final Sunday of Advent. And Jesus waits for us to announce that we are welcoming Him, just as St. Joseph did. Turn to St. Joseph today. He will help you to make Jesus your own.

There is a beautiful Christmas song honoring St. Joseph. We can imagine Joseph singing these words on the first Christmas night. It is called "Joseph's Lullaby:"

Go to sleep my Son This manger for your bed You have a long road before You Rest Your little head

Can You feel the weight of Your glory?
Do You understand the price?
Or does the Father guard Your heart for now
So You can sleep tonight?

Go to sleep my Son
Go and chase Your dreams
This world can wait for one more moment
Go and sleep in peace

I believe the glory of Heaven is lying in my arms tonight But Lord, I ask that He for just this moment Simply be my child

> Go to sleep my Son Baby, close Your eyes Soon enough You'll save the day But for now, dear Child of mine Oh my Jesus, sleep tight

#### THIS MONDAY IS RECONCILIATION MONDAY:



Each year, during Advent and Lent, Cardinal Dolan has directed all churches to have a "Reconciliation (Confession) Monday" with several hours for the opportunity for confession. Here in our church confessions will be heard from 3PM until 9PM tomorrow (Monday) December 21. We invite you to take this opportunity to come to confession as you prepare for Christmas. If you have been away from the sacraments, be assured that Our Lord is waiting for you with His mercy and love. Please bring this information to others who may wish to "Come Home for Christmas."

Some simple points about making your confession:

- 1. Prepare by examining your conscience, thinking of serious sins since your last confession and any other matters you wish to confess.
- 2. During this pandemic, we are not able to use the regular confessionals. You will see that we have two "confession stations," one by the sacristy and the other in the front by the baptismal font. Of course, please make sure you have your mask.
- 3. Those who are waiting for confession should stand at a respectful distance to preserve confidentiality, observing the proper social distancing as marked by the blue tape in the aisles.
- 4. When you enter the confession station, you may either kneel or stand. Wait for the priest to greet you with the Sign of the Cross. Then say, "Bless me, Father, for I have sinned. It has been ... since my last confession."
- 5. Speak loud enough for the priest to hear you, but not so loud for other people to hear.
- 6. Simply confess your sins.
- 7. The priest will give you a penance, prayers to say or something to do.
- 8. Then recite the Act of Contrition (several forms are listed below).
- 9. The priest will give you the absolution which is the forgiveness of your sins.
- 10. When you leave the confessional, spend a few moments in your private prayer. Recite your penance and thank God for His mercy and forgiveness.

Several Acts of Contrition (select one to say in your confession);

My God, I am sorry for my sins with all my heart. In choosing to do wrong and failing to do good, I have sinned against you whom I should love above all things. I firmly intend, with your help, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid whatever leads me to sin. Our Savior Jesus Christ suffered and died for us. In His Name, my God, have mercy. Amen.

or

O my God, I am heartily sorry for having offended Thee, and I detest all my sins because of Thy just punishments, but most of all because they offend Thee, my God, Who art all-good and deserving of all my love. I firmly resolve, with the help of Thy grace, to sin no more and to avoid the near occasions of sin.

or

Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on me, a sinner.

#### **DECEMBER 20, 2020**

#### MESSAGE FROM OUR HOLY FATHER POPE FRANCIS FOR THIS SUNDAY

This Sunday just before Christmas, we listen to the Gospel of the Annunciation (cf. Lk 1:26-38).

In this Gospel passage, we notice a contrast between the promises of the angel and Mary's response. This contrast is manifested in the *dimension* and *content* of the expressions of the two protagonists. The angel says to Mary: "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus. He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High; and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his father David, and he will reign over the house of Jacob forever" (vv. 30-33). It is a long revelation which opens unprecedented possibilities. The Child that will be born to this humble girl from Nazareth will be called Son of the Most High. It is not possible to conceive of a higher dignity than this. And after Mary's question in which she asks for an explanation, the angel's revelation becomes even more detailed and surprising.

On the other hand, Mary's reply is a short sentence that does not speak of glory. It does not speak of privilege but only of willingness and service: "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word" (v. 38). The content is also different. Mary does not exalt herself before the prospect of becoming the mother of the Messiah, but rather remains modest and expresses her acceptance of the Lord's plan. Mary does not boast. She is humble and modest. She always remains the same.

This contrast is meaningful. It makes us understand that Mary is truly humble and does not try to be noticed. She recognizes that she is small before God and she is happy to be so. At the same time, she is aware that the fulfillment of God's plan depends on her response, and that therefore she is called to accept it with her whole being.

In this circumstance, Mary's behavior corresponds perfectly to that of the Son of God when he comes into the world. He wants to become the Servant of the Lord, to put himself at the service of humanity to fulfill the Father's plan. Mary says: "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord"; and the Son of God upon entering the world says: "Lo, I have come to do thy will, O God" (Heb 10:7). Mary's attitude fully mirrors this statement by the Son of God who also becomes the son of Mary. Thus Our Lady shows that she is in perfect accord with God's plan. Furthermore she reveals herself as a disciple of his Son, and in the Magnificat, she will be able to proclaim that God has "exalted those of low degree" (Lk 1:52) because with her humble and generous response, she has obtained great joy and also great glory.

As we admire our Mother for this response to God's call to mission, we ask her to help each of us to welcome God's plan into our lives with sincere humility and brave generosity.

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#### THE CHRISTMAS PAGEANT - ARE YOU A PLAYER?



It's standing room only for that late afternoon Christmas Mass featuring a "live" Christmas Pageant. A quick glance around demonstrates that more than "family" of the youngsters with a role in the Pageant fill up those pews. There are the Vigil Mass "regulars," of course. And surely the relatives of children participating, coming early, cameras in hand.

And there are others, often people rarely seen at Mass in any season. They may well be Catholics who have not been to Mass for a long time for reasons known to them and the Lord. They may also be people with no faith commitment, but curious about the Church. What better time to come and take a look? Christmas, the birth of the God-Man, and a liturgy where the Pageant makes the "story" that much more real.

While pundits ponder the why's of the Christmas Pageant "turnout," St. Francis of Assisi would find it no surprise at all. With a producer's eye for a "natural" event like this, Francis understands that the Pageant is about real people, flesh and blood versus statues, literally bringing the Greatest of Stories to life once again.

For the celebration of the Incarnation is all about Jesus taking on body and soul in this world - and then never really leaving. The Presence of the Almighty. Here. Now. That quiet, powerful, loving Presence, perfectly at home in the midst of the unpredictable chaos that shadows any "standing only" event. The Savior came into the world in a way no one expected.

And like the First Christmas in Bethlehem, or the Pageant St. Francis organized in the Italian mountains, the local parish Christmas Pageant will be a special moment of grace. Some effects are evident; others, known to God alone.

And those of us who attend see and hear the whole thing. The nervous girls on the edge of the crowd. The smiling little boy gazing off into space. The elderly gentleman with tears in his eyes.

For we are players in our own way. Not just spectators - or tele-viewers, waiting for the next commercial. We are here, present, as the Gospel proclaims the wonderful Good News first heralded over two thousand years ago.

It is a sacred moment, in our own time, with energy enough to carry us into a New Year and beyond. Even with the heat of a crowded moment. The "traffic jam" that awaits our departure from church. The greeting of old and familiar faces in this special crowd, as well as old and sacred memories. There's nothing quite like it. Expect perhaps, the heart-felt "Merry Christmas" to one another, on the way out of Church and back into the world Jesus came to make holy.

DECEMBER 21st SAINT PETER CANISIUS Priest and Doctor († 1597)

Peter was a native of Nijmegen, Holland, at that time part of the Diocese of Cologne. His father, a burgermeister, hoped to see him settled in the law, but Peter turned to theology. He was drawn to the Jesuits while attending a retreat given by Saint Peter Faber, one of the order's founding members. He soon became a sought after teacher and advisor.

In 1549, Peter accepted a mission to Germany, then in the throes of the Protestant Reformation. Peter made a personal pledge to "live and die" for the German people, and all his efforts—teaching, counseling, and preaching—were aimed at renewing and reviving the faith of the Germans. With great energy and fervor, Peter responded to the challenges posed by the Reformers with a diverse output of writings, including his influential catechisms. He founded universities, drawing in both Catholics and Protestants with his sound approach.

And everywhere he went, he succored the poor and visited the imprisoned.

According to Pope Benedict XVI, in all his encounters with Lutherans, Peter had an "ability to combine harmoniously fidelity to dogmatic principles with the respect that is due to every person." Peter is lauded as the "second Apostle to Germany," after Saint Boniface. He was made a Doctor of the Church in 1925.

Loving Father, through the intercession of Saint Peter Canisius, ignite within my heart zeal for the preaching of the Gospel.
