Beatitudes for Families

Blessed are the poor in spirit; theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

The poor include literally poor people in need of basic necessities, and figuratively poor people who are aware of their spiritual poverty, people who acknowledge their need and utter dependence upon God. The reward is the kingdom of heaven. What do we consider to be our family's greatest riches?

Blessed are they who mourn; they will be comforted.

Those who mourn are anyone who is sad or experiencing a loss of any kind. Jesus promises comfort for those suffering. When we suffer we have a choice: to become bitter or more compassionate toward others in pain. How do we find and give comfort in our family?

Blessed are the meek; they will inherit the land.

The meek are people who are humble and patient. A person who chooses other ways to resolve conflicts without resorting to violence is meek. How do we resolve conflict in our families?

Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness; they will be satisfied.

This blessing is for people who hunger for justice in our world. Children have a great capacity to see wrongs and often possess a simple view of complex issues. Perhaps our kids can use their creativity to solve some of the local injustices in schools and communities.

Blessed are the merciful; they will be shown mercy.

Mercy is a word that holds many meanings: forgiveness, kindness, compassion. It is easier to extend mercy to others when you begin with yourself. With mercy, you receive back the more you give. Instead of keeping track of mistakes within our family, how can we see God's grace within our imperfect family?

Blessed are the clean of heart; they will see God.

Who better to be clean or pure of heart then little ones? Of course they see God because there is nothing clouding their vision! The clean of heart can also be people who single-mindedly see God first in all situations and people. How can we find God in our every day lives?

Blessed are the peacemakers; they will be called children of God.

What risks do we take to make peace? Jesus asks us to be peacemakers. As God's children, we must continue to work for unity and understanding. Our families are microcosms of the world Peace begins at home. How do we handle conflicts are home?

But we learn from Jesus, and through practice in our family, we see that doing the right thing is what it really means to be a follower of Jesus. How can our fami-

ly help each other to do the right thing?

Jesus teaches the crowd the way to happiness Luke 6:17, 20-26

Last Sunday we heard Jesus call Peter to be His disciple. Jesus then travels with Peter and the other disciples, and Luke reports acts of healing and the call of Levi, the tax collector. Jesus also replies to questions from the Pharisees regarding fasting and the observance of the Sabbath. In the verses immediately before today's Gospel, Jesus is reported to have chosen 12 men from among His disciples to be apostles. Apostle is a Greek word that means "one who is sent."

Today's Gospel reading is the beginning of what is often called the Sermon on the Plain. We find a parallel to this passage in Matthew 5:1-7,11 that is often called the Sermon on the Mount. As these titles suggest, there are differences and similarities between these Gospel readings.

When spoken from the mountaintop in Matthew's Gospel, we can't miss the impression that Jesus is speaking with the authority and voice of God. The mountaintop is a symbol of closeness to God. Those who ascend the mountain see God and speak for God; recall the story of Moses and the Ten Commandments. As Luke introduces the location of Jesus's teaching, Jesus teaches on level ground, alongside the disciples and the crowd. Luke presents Jesus's authority in a different light. Jesus is God among us.

Another distinction found in Luke's version is the audience. Luke's Sermon on the Plain is addressed to Jesus's disciples, although in the presence of the crowd; Matthew's Sermon on the Mount is addressed to the crowd. In keeping with this style, the Beatitudes in Luke's Gospel sound more personal than those in Matthew's Gospel: Luke uses the article "you" whereas Matthew uses "they" or "those." There is also a difference in number. Matthew describes eight beatitudes; Luke presents four, each of which has a parallel warning.

The form of the Beatitudes found in Luke's and Matthew's Gospel is not unique to Jesus. Beatitudes are found in the Old Testament, such as in the Psalms and in the Book of Wisdom. They are a way to teach about who will find favor with God. The word "blessed" in this context might be translated as happy, fortunate, or favored.

As we listen to this Gospel, the Beatitudes jar our sensibilities. Those who are poor, hungry, weeping, or persecuted are called blessed. This is, indeed, a Gospel of reversals. Those often thought to have been forgotten by God are called blessed. In the list of "woes," those whom we might ordinarily describe as blessed by God are warned about their peril. Riches, possessions, laughter, reputation . . . these are not things that we can depend upon as sources of eternal happiness. They not only fail to deliver on their promise; our misplaced trust in them will lead to our demise. The ultimate peril is in misidentifying the source of our eternal happiness.

The Beatitudes are often described as a framework for Christian living. Our vocation as Christians is not to be first in this world, but rather to be first in the eyes of God. We are challenged to examine our present situation in the context of our ultimate horizon, the Kingdom of God.


